Each month in this publication we give the date of the next 'Project Day' and say a little about what the volunteers had done on the previous occassion. However, it has been pointed out that what, who, why and where is not always totally clear when it comes to 'Project Day' so I will try and clear-up some confusion.

Firstly, despite for many years being referred to as 'Project Day' the event in general lasts no more than 2hours, hardly a day! So in recent issues of the HHT we have started to refer to it as 'Project Morning'. The morning set aside is normally the Saturday after the Parish Council meeting (second Wednesday of the month at 8pm in Memorial Hall) and the meeting place is the Village Hall car park at 8:30am. The purpose of the meeting is to smarten and tidy up the village, fix any small jobs which need doing i.e. repair a fence, cut-back some hedges or install a gate etc. Alongside these projects a small group of helpers regularly volunteer to litter pick, often either Dux Court Road or Brittannia Road. On occassions we might concentrate on a larger project like painting the bus shelters or installing a notice board. Anyone is welcome to attend (under 16's with parents permission first), and jobs are allocated purely on a 'would like to do' basis and no-one is asked to do anything they do not want to do. We meet back at the Village Hall for a socialable cup of tea and maybe a piece of cake. Before disbanding off home with a sense of pride, that we have helped the village-out for 2 hours in the month, to make High Halstow a nicer place to live.

You will see that the two main projects which the Parish Council are keen to move forward in the coming year is the refurbishment of the play ground and replacement of two bus shelters.

RESUME OF THE MEETING HELD ON 14 JANUARY 2009

All councillors attended the January meeting of the Parish Council, together with 4 residents. The budget for 2009/10 as recommended by the Parish Council's Finance Committee was presented and adopted. This provides for no increase in the precept for next financial year a decrease in real terms. Gary Thomas has explained more elsewhere in this edition of the Times.

The replacement of the playpark was discussed. The bid for lottery funding has been turned down and it was decided to proceed with asking equipment providers to suggest alternative schemes limited to the funding available from the Parish Council about a third of the original sum. Not only is play equipment expensive, the necessary safety surfaces are also expensive and the existing, although adequate for the existing equipment, is not up to current safety standards and will have to be replaced with every new item for play. The Parish Council will at the same time investigate other sources of funding that may become available. Unfortunately many grant providers will not allow local authorities to bid and of course, parish councils are local authorities.

Whilst on the recreation ground, it was reported that the football team who had asked to play on the pitch had found accommodation at the school. The Parish Council will also be in touch with the Cricket Cub about requirements to allow a colts team to play on the ground.

Those of you who live on the "Wilcon" estate noticed during last year that there were two landscape maintenance teams at work. This was confusing to everyone. Essentially, the landscaped areas that were adjacent to the roads had been adopted by Medway Council and as such were (and still are) being maintained by the Parish Council's contractors under the agreement with Medway Council. The other communal areas have not been handed over and were being maintained by the developer, now after various company take-overs, Taylor Wimpey. We negotiated with Taylor Wimpey and from January 1st have a contract with them to maintain these areas. This means that it is all being done by our contractor Turfsoil and when the areas are finally adopted, the transition will be seamless. We have also negotiated to replant the buffer zone at the rear of properties in Cardigan Close; however the planting scheme has to be costed and approved by Medway Council who own the land and it may be that we do not obtain the approvals in time for this winter's planting season. Councillors discussed the implications on maintenance of the Christmas Lane roundabout if the appeal for sponsorship is taken up by an unknown party.

The Parish Council is moving forward with replacing bus shelters and Carl Mitchell will be contacting more manufacturers.

During the report by the police representative, it was mentioned that the police intend to carry out a speed check in Christmas Lane.

Finally, we are pleased to report that £300 was raised for Demelza House by Santa during his visit just before Christmas.

Use antibiotics wisely

That's the message this winter as residents look to keep infections away.

NHS Medway is urging the community to think twice before reaching for antibiotics as the magic potion to cure all illnesses.

Antibiotics are medicines used to treat infections caused by bacteria.

Primary Care Trust Antibiotic Pharmacist Janice Moorekite said: "If you take antibiotics for the wrong reasons the bacteria in the body will build up a resistance to it and the antibiotics will not work to treat illnesses in the future."

People should take the advice of either their doctor or pharmacist and take medicines as prescribed until the course is complete. Bacteria, including some which can cause hospital infections such as MRSA, builds up a resistance to antibiotics the more they are used.

Janice added: "We know coughs and colds get better just as quickly without antibiotics. Antibiotics do not work against colds or flu." The doctor will only prescribe antibiotics when they are needed such as when a patient has a kidney infection or pneumonia. Soldiers, Sailors and Skylarks

The RSPB is inviting Kent Residents to discover a different side to the River Thames with a new walking guide. Readers will discover the wildlife of the North Kent Marshes, as well as a hidden waterway, and the tale of some secret prehistoric treasure.

The new walk takes you to the beautiful Thameside bay of Higham Bight, an RSPB reserve home to swirling flocks of dunlin and the calls of curlews, and a Bronze Age burial mound of Barrow Hill. It is near here that a secret stash of gold coins hidden inside a hollow piece of flint was discovered, an early money box perhaps or an attempt to hide stolen treasure?

RSPB Community Officer Carol Donaldson who created the trail, with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund said "Gravesend's history has always been linked to the river but just outside town a wider landscape exists where the air is still full of the songs of skylarks. I hope the guide will encourage people to appreciate this hidden side of the River Thames.

The Soldiers, Sailors and Skylarks trail begins in the historic town of Gravesend whose waterfront once bustled with sailors and fisherman. The walk then leads along the River Thames past the RSPB Shorne Marshes Reserve to Shorne Fort.

Originally built to repel invasion by France, the Fort was landscaped in 2008 by the RSPB with the help of Gravesham Borough Council and Ibstock Corey.

On the return journey, walkers can discover the hidden remains of the Thames and Medway Canal, now a wildlife sanctuary.



Museum of London, Docklands

Using stories of trade, commerce and migration, this 200-year old warehouse shows the long history of London as a port. With archaeological finds, unusual objects, fascinating tours, films, and events, this certainly is one of the capital's real hidden gems.







Imperial War Museum, London and Churchill's War Cabinet
