

Medway Local Plan Consultation Will Effect Us All

Medway Council are planning to build 30,000 houses throughout Medway between 2012 and 2035. Around 6000 are proposed for the Peninsula. ITS IMPORTANT TO HAVE YOUR SAY NOW.

Medway Council is preparing a new Local Plan that will guide the development of Medway up to 2035. Medway is one of the largest urban areas in the south east. In 2015 our population had grown to 276,472, and this is projected to increase to 330,200 by 2035. The most important aspect of the Local Plan is making the most effective use of land to ensure we are able to provide the required new homes, jobs, services and roads, whilst protecting and enhancing the natural and historic environment. The council is now consulting on the second formal stage of the Local Plan preparation. The Development Options consultation document includes a draft vision and strategic objectives for the new Local Plan, options for how growth could take place in Medway, and approaches to developing policies for the new plan. The council is keen to hear from residents, businesses, organisations, community and interest groups to help inform the plan. The consultation period runs from Monday, 16 January to Monday, 6 March 2017. Comments must be received in writing by 5pm on Monday, 6 March 2017.

Resume Of The Parish Council Meeting Held On 11 January 2017

All parish councillors were present at the first meeting of 2017, held on 11th January. It was also attended by 4 members of the public.

Cllr Williams had submitted a motion, that the Parish Council meets in future every month of the year. This means including August and December in the meetings calendar. He explained that sometimes business gets delayed unnecessarily because of the time delay between meetings. The idea was not universally welcomed, but on a vote being taken, it was narrowly passed by 1 vote. Therefore this year there will be meetings on Wednesday 9th August and on Wednesday 13th December.

The meeting was attended by the operators of two of the mobile food vans. They have all the licensing and permissions and are trading legitimately. They acknowledged that some residents have been complaining about their presence and wondered if they could use the car park. They were asked to submit a formal proposal to the Parish Council.

It was agreed to proceed with the provision of two more bus shelters, one to replace the very old shelter ion the strip of grass between Eden Road and The Street, and the other to replace the second hand one outside the Recreation Hall. They will be of similar construction and appearance to the shelter installed in Christmas Lane last year.

Cllr Ray Collins had suggested the planting of trees to mark the end of the First World War in 2018. It was agreed to go ahead with the planting of 11 oak trees on the Recreation Ground at the far end along the boundary with the "horse field". The number is to commemorate the 11 villagers who died during the war. The trees will be planted next autumn. We hope to put up a commemorative plaque in the Memorial Hall

Replacement of the basket for the cantilever basket swing is in hand. It has proved impossible to speak to the original contractor and we have had to go elsewhere.

The public in attendance raised some issues - the fact that some people aren't picking up after their dogs; the behaviour of teenagers hanging about the car park and suspicions about what they're getting up to in the toilets and the speed and lack of consideration of some drivers in the area of the pedestrian crossing. Apparently a driver was seen going fast across the crossing and not stopping for someone waiting to cross.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 8th February in the Blue Room in the Village Hall not the Memorial Hall at the usual time of 8pm. You are all welcome to attend. If you are coming for a specific item on the agenda, it is important that you introduce yourself to the Chairman and Clerk before the start of the meeting.

High Halstow Hikers

Given that the HH Times does not appear in January there are concise reports for two of our recent walks. Following the tradition of previous years our pre-Christmas walk was a local one. From the village hall we walked through the estate to Forge Common and followed the Saxon Shore Way through the RSPB reserve pausing to take in the always impressive views from the lookout point across the marshes. We continued down through Bromhey Farm, up the hill to Eastborough Bungalow and along the farm track above the orchards on the way to Cooling. The conditions for walking were good for the time of year and the weather cool enough for all 18 of us to enjoy warming mulled wine, sausage rolls and mince pies in the Horseshoe and Castle. We then used up some of these extra calories by walking through Cooling to the castle, turning south to Cooling Court and then following the permissive footpath back to Wybourne's Farm. Overall it was a great way to prepare for less exertion in the coming days.

Our first walk of the year in early January 2017 was led by Mike Davies on what would have been expected have been a cold winter's day but it was actually benign and almost spring-like. Starting at the Quayside in Sandwich, nine walkers headed off along the other end of the Saxon Shore Way towards Royal St George's golf club. The public footpaths criss-cross this prestigious golf course by paths that are well sign-posted with warnings to watch out for golfers and stray golf balls. A short walk took us along the shoreline with Sandwich Bay that was as flat as a mill-pond and then back inland through fields with sheep enjoying the early spring grass. We paid a visit to the Sandwich Bird Observatory that has impressive facilities along with long lists of resident and migratory birds. The observatory is part of a national group tracking and monitoring bird movements with Sandwich being particularly important because of its southerly position close to the Continent. Beyond the observatory the land was flat and all the drainage dykes were full. We came across a group of model aircraft enthusiasts whose impressive model jet plane of about 2 meters in length performed spectacular aerobatics at impressive speeds. An uneventful return to Sandwich town after a 10km walk was followed by a very good Sunday lunch at the George and Dragon pub.

Our February, March and April walks will be on the second Sunday in the month all starting at 10.00am. The first of these, on 12th February, will be around Mereworth and West Peckham starting outside the striking Church of St Lawrence at 112 The Street, Mereworth. This is reached by taking the A228 south from West Malling and turning left into The Street just before the roundabout junction with A26. The exact walking route will be chosen according to underfoot conditions and will be around 6 miles in length.

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Six Reasons Why You Should Clean Up After Your Pooch

All dog owners know that they are supposed to clean up their dog's mess when they are out walking, and most dog owners are responsible enough to do just that. However, there still remains a good proportion of dog owners who deliberately avoid cleaning up after their dogs, or will only pick up the poop if someone is watching!

Standing in dog pooh is one of the most messy, unpleasant and potentially unhealthy things that can possibly happen to an adult or a child, and nobody should be made to go through this because of other people's laziness! In this article, we will look at six important reasons behind why everyone should pick up after their dogs every time without fail-including when your dog toilets on your own land or garden. Read on to learn more!

Good manners

Firstly, cleaning up after your dog is simply good manners, and nobody else should have to deal with your dog's output because you neglect to! We all know how annoying and horrible it is to stand in dog mess and worse, trail it into the house and have to clean off your shoes afterwards, and by not cleaning up after your dog, you run the risk of causing these inconveniences to other people as well.

Be a good citizen and clean up after your dog! Failing to clean up after your dog not only causes problems for other people that may stand in the muck, but it also gives all dog owners a bad name, and may make other people hostile at the sight of a dog walker in their own area, as everyone gets tarred with the same brush.

You have a legal obligation

In the UK it is the law that all dog owners must pick up after their dogs when in a public place, and failing to do so can result in prosecution. The fines for failing to deal with dog mess can be prohibitive too, with a £100 fine issued to offenders, which can rise to £1,000 and a trip to Magistrate's Court if the fine is not paid within one week of issue.

Infection control

Dog waste is not only foul smelling and horrible in texture, but it also carries and spreads a lot of dangerous diseases as well. Canine faeces are packed with bacteria and carry a whole range of diseases, including parvovirus, salmonella, cryptosporidium and many more, all of which can make other dogs or people very ill, and may even prove fatal.

Worms are also transferred through faeces, and over time, will impregnate the ground as well, placing all other dogs that walk in the same areas at a high unnecessary risk.

Keeping you and your dog clean

If you've ever had to undertake the unpleasant task of cleaning dog muck off either yourself or your dog, you will be all too aware that it is a challenging, messy and highly unpleasant process! Making sure that you clear up after your dog reduces the chances of either of you stepping in it or getting into a mess later, and may also mean that because the areas you walk in stay clean, other dog owners will be more inclined to pick up after their own dogs too.

Reducing coprophagia

Coprophagia is the term for an unpleasant behavioural problem that some dogs exhibit, and means "eating faeces." Some dogs will actually seek to eat their own faeces or that of other dogs, and this is just as undesirable as it sounds!

Clearing up after your dog when they have toileted, whether this be out in public or in your own garden, can reduce the opportunities for your dog to eat poop, as well as also reducing the risk that anyone will walk in it or otherwise have to come into contact with it too!

Protecting the environment

Dog pooh is classed by The Environment Agency as an environmental pollutant, which means that the risks posed by dog muck go beyond the simple inconvenience and dangers of people coming into contact with it.

While some forms of faeces-based fertilizer such as manure can actually be good for gardens and green spaces when used appropriately, dog pooh is not one of these, and it does in fact have a direct and harmful effect upon the land.

The viral and bacterial load in the faeces becomes transmitted to the soil that it sits on, as do parasites such as various types of intestinal worms, which will then lie in wait to infect another dog or person.

This is one of the reasons why you should pay just as much attention to picking up the poop in your own yard or garden as you would when out in public, in order to keep your garden in good condition, and preserve the health of the dogs and people that use it.

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

Hacked Computers

Are you worried about your computer being hacked? Are you worried about being scammed or having your bank details stolen from your computer? Are your worried that those phone calls from Microsoft or their agents etc are real and should you be worried?

Then read on.....

Hi there my name is Jonathan and I run a small Computer company dealing on the residential side of computer support. I thought it may be of help to the readers to chat about many of the issues I deal with on a daily basis as it may be of help and save you from needing to call a company like mine in the first place.

The subject I get more calls about than anything else is how to speed up slow computers but the next most common enquiry is from people who believe their computer has been 'hacked' or 'scammed'.

So I thought it would help to will give a few tips here to help you avoid being hacked or scammed in the first place.

So first off the question you might like to ask is how common is this and am I really at risk? Well the answer to both of those questions is a 'Yes' and 'Very' respectively!!!!

Now first off please don't think I am trying to be alarmist here. In general terms computers and using them is a very safe and secure way of working. And in truth the built in security in the computers and the internet generally is very strong. All official credit card and banking transaction done over the internet are technically incredibly secure. Your computer and the computers at the banks and credit card companies employ very advanced encryption on the account details (a fancy word for scrambling up) so if the information was intercepted from you to them it you would need a super computer to crack the encryption. So if that is so then why worry?

Well the clue is in the word 'official' I used there. The weak point in all of this technology is 'us or you and me if you like' the human element. We can have the best security in the world in our banks and home computers and it will mean nothing if we simply give away access to it. So how does this happen?

Well all communication on computers is done using those hateful things called 'User Names' and 'Passwords'. These are by design very secure as they use that fancy encryption software too...... But, if we just simply give this information to others voluntarily then all the computer security in the world won't help!

So how do we protect ourselves from this and avoid being hacked. Well in truth probably no one on here will ever be 'hacked' as the press like to call it without prior contact with yourselves. As this involves a person remotely accessing your computer without your knowledge and effectively breaking into it (like in the films). I am afraid in truth none of us generally are important enough for a 'hacker' to want to bother with.

So where is the main risk then I hear you ask. Well you are most likely to be 'scammed' and not 'hacked'.

What's the difference? Well you are scammed when you allow it to happen or actively (even if unwittingly) help it.

So let's ask ourselves what a fraudster would want from you and why they would do it? Well ultimately of course it's your money they are after. They can get at this in two principal ways, your Bank account or your Credit card details.

One of the things most of my customers don't realise is that if they are taken in and give access to a company selling something (advice or goods) that then turns out to be fraudulent it more than likely doesn't just stop there at that transaction.... Once you give your bank or credit card details out they will be used again and again....!!!!

So how can we protect ourselves? Well first off please understand that the fraudsters are very clever and employ many different frightening and psychological techniques to try and fool you. And everybody is just as susceptible to them. Young and old...

So it may help you to think of the computer like your house. If a stranger came knocking on your door would you simply give them access to your bank account or give them your credit card details? No you wouldn't so why do it if you get a call or email?

So here are some simple rules that may help.

- **Rule 1.** <u>NEVER</u> and I mean NEVER give your user name or password to anyone.... even your email accounts ...EVER!!! If someone rings saying they are from your bank, internet supplier, Microsoft, the Police...anyone, just put the phone down! No organisation will **EVER** call you for this information, no matter how convincing they sound.
- **Rule 2.** Never ever log into your account (the Bank, a website, iTunes, ebay etc) through a link sent to you in an email. No matter how dire the email makes it sound that you have too. Just shut the email program down and log into the website of the requesting company that way if you want to check out if it is authentic.
- **Rule 3.** Remember that even a fraud of a small amount of your money can lead to much bigger amounts a short time later.
- **Rule 4.** No outside company can see if there is something wrong with your computer remotely without you giving express permission FIRST. So if someone calls to say they can see an issue with your computer...they can't...FULL STOP!!!
- Rule 5. Most fraudsters work on trying to gain your trust. So the call may not seem to be about anything computer

related to start with. Be on your guard and don't be to 'polite' about this here... just hang up!!!

Rule 6. Never give any company access to your computer over the internet. Once in they can do all kinds of damage or leave things hidden inside that can help them gain information about you later on.

Rule 7. Make your passwords hard to work out. This is hard because we like to use things we can remember like anniversary dates or our birthdays of children's names ect. Avoid this as it makes them very easy to guess by someone else. If it helps... when deciding a password.. pick up a book you have to hand, open to a random page... pick the first 6 character word you see and add the page number it is on to the end of it. Then write this down in a note book and keep that book in a separate room to the computer.

Rule 8. NEVER just throw an old computer out for the rubbish or just take it to the recycle centre. The information stored on it can recovered. Use a company like mine to destroy the data first. This applies if giving the computer to a charity or in all honest another close friend or family member (whilst you may trust them you don't know if they will eventually give it away the computer with your information still on it!)

So what do you do if you think you have or are being scammed?

Rule 1. If at any point in a phone call you are not happy then just hang up!!!! If they ring again just hang up again. If they keep ringing report them to your phone company and inform the police.

Rule 2. If you have given them access to your computer immediately shut it down and Hang up. Call a computer company like mine to get the computer looked at. They could have left software inside that will help them gain the information they want.

Rule 3. If you gave them any financial information like bank details or credit card details call your bank and credit card company IMMEDIATELY after you hang up. They will move very fast at their end to remove funds before your bank or credit card company freeze that account.


Rule 4. Don't be polite. Just hang up!!!!! They rely on you being nice...don't be. You worked long and hard for your money... don't let them take it from you. If it helps think of them sitting next to you when you are on the phone and them just taking the money from your hand..... Remember you didn't ask for them to come into your home...so don't be afraid to just kick them out!

So I hope this is of some help, and I should say here that don't be frightened of even switching the computer back on ever again.... They are a great tool and are tremendously helpful in day to day living. With just a few careful common sense precautions they are perfectly safe to use.
