"This raises deep concerns for the future of Medway if this is how such important decisions are going to be made."

High Halstow alongside Hoo Parish Council and thousands of protestors have petitioned Medway Council calling for the cabinet decision to go to the "Overview and Scrutiny Committee", where they hope to once again make the case that cabinet should seek a full and accurate report on the situation at Deangate Ridge.

A consultation of the new draft Local Plan is set to start from March 11th to May 16th this year, details of which are not yet published. It therefore seems wholly inappropriate that the fate of such a major, public-owned resource should be determined immediately prior to this defining consultation. Residents are left to presume that development of the golf course does indeed figure strongly in development plans, and that closing it prior to the public consultation is no accident of timing, to seal its fate prior to us having our say.

Resume of meeting 14 February 2018

The February Parish Council meeting was attended by all 9 Parish Councillors. There were 40 members of the public in attendance despite the date of the meeting being held on Valentines day.

Medway Council's decision to close Deangate Ridge was discussed and High Halstow Parish Council formally voted to support the parish of Hoo St. Werburgh on their objections. A petition has been submitted to Medway council containing over 3,000 signatures asking for the decision to be called in and we are currently waiting to hear if this the way that Medway Council have made the decision will be looked at by the Overview and Scrutiny committee.

It has been agreed by the Parish Council that we will go ahead with a Neighbourhood Plan – this means that if and when we are expected to have more houses built in the village that we have a say about where they are put and how the amenities of the area can be improved to accommodate a growing population. There will be more information available in the coming months, the Neighbourhood Plan will also be subject to public consultation – we will be asking for your views and opinions every step of the way – so please do get involved!

The next meeting will be held on the 14th March, 2018 at 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and Localism Act 2011 gives local communities the ability to create local planning policies within what is called a Neighbourhood Plan.

The Neighbourhood Plan will be a community-led document for guiding the

future development of our parish. It is the first of its kind for High Halstow and a part of the Government's current approach to planning.



Our Neighbourhood Plan will complement the Local Plan for Medway, national and strategic planning policy, providing valuable detail that has come directly from residents of High Halstow parish.

The Neighbourhood Plan is about the **use and development of land** over the next twenty years. It will set out a number of policies, developed by the local community, to shape development.

Commissioned by High Halstow Parish Council, the Neighbourhood Plan will be developed by a Steering Group of local residents. The policies and projects in the Plan will reflect the views of local people, gathered through a series

of consultation events, detailed stakeholder sessions and desk research.

We are organising a Steering Group to ensure development of our Neighbourhood Plan. We already have a list of residents who have put their name forward to get involved, but if you are also interested in giving a little time to developing ideas for the Plan please contact either Cllr Ray Collins Cllr Mick O'Hanlon or Cllr Linda Atkinson, whose contact details are listed on the Parish Council page (4).

On Tuesday 13th March we will hold our spring show.


This event is only open to club members. Benching starts at 19.30 and the judging commences at 20.00.



High Halstow Hikers

Finding walks with good paths this time of year is challenging and initially it seemed that selecting a circular walk around Lullingstone Country Park at the start of February hadn't solved the problem.

The walk south from the excellent Park Centre was very muddy and slippery but once the dozen of us had started to climb away from the Darenth valley conditions improved greatly except in a few spots where we needed to take a route slightly away from the well-trodden path. The walk of about 6 miles was very varied tracking through hop-fields, quiet country roads and woodland as well as crossing Lullingstone golf course in a couple of spots.

The walk to the west of the park gave good views to the other side of the valley before we dropped down to the river close to the Roman Villa which is renowned for its excellent mosaic floors.

The return to the cars took us past Lullingstone Castle and World Garden. These featured in a TV programme that detailed the exploits of the owner, Tom Hart Dyke, who was kidnapped for several weeks by guerrillas while he was between Panama and Columbia hunting for orchids for the garden!

Many dog owners were taking advantage of the widening of the River Darenth to form a lake just prior to the car park in an attempt to clean their very muddy pets. Many of us finished our day off with a pint in the excellent Plough in nearby Eynsford.

In March we should be assured of good underfoot conditions when we take a walk from **Ramsgate to Margate**.

The return to cars in Ramsgate will be by a 10 minutes train ride. However, many may choose to travel by train in which case the journey back to Medway is direct from Margate.

We will meet at 10.00 on Sunday 4th March by the Granville Theatre on Victoria Parade CT11 8DG. The walk is a bit longer than usual at around 9 miles but it is largely flat as it follows the coast and we will be stopping for lunch just about 60% of the way round.
