# Your village needs you in the battle For Lodge Hill

In January this year, Martin Harper the RSPB head of conservation wrote about our ongoing battle to save the (now protected) nationally important population of nightingale at Lodge Hill.

Disappointingly - but as predicted - the Ministry of Defence and their delivery partner, Land Securities, submitted a revised Outline Planning Application at the end of February to build around 5,000 homes on this nationally important site for nightingale. If this proposal were to succeed, not only would it result in the loss of the only designated site for nightingale in the UK, but it would also seriously undermine the Government's flagship planning policy - the National Planning Policy Framework.

To recap, a few things to bear in mind about Lodge Hill and this proposal...

- \* Lodge Hill is the only SSSI in the UK notified specifically for nightingales and possibly the single most important site for nightingales in the country. The site is estimated to hold more than 1% of the national population particularly important given the fact that nightingale numbers have suffered a serious declines in recent years.
- \* The proposed development would destroy the majority of nightingale habitat at the site and constitute one of the largest ever losses of a SSSI to development.
- \* Medway Council's Core Strategy was withdrawn at the end of last year after an independent planning inspector found that the allocation of housing at Lodge Hill was in conflict with the Government's flagship national planning policy. This proposal fails to meet the tests set out in Government policy to protect places important for wildlife. If it is allowed to proceed, it would set a deeply damaging precedent for many of our most special sites for wildlife.

Please respond to the Council's consultation on these plans. With your help, we can send Medway Council the message that it's completely unacceptable to build on this protected site. Instead they should look for appropriate alternatives to meet their housing needs. The updated planning application comprises a staggering five boxes of papers, but this short consultation only runs until 15th April, so please write your letter as soon as you can.

# Friends of Chernobyl's Children (FOCC) Medway

This year FOCC Medway is hosting 12 children aged from 8 to 12 years from the middle of June. The Friends of Chernobyl's Children is a local branch of a charity that helps children from Belarus by giving them a recuperative holiday which allows respite from the poverty and difficult conditions they face at home for a month each year. (More information can be found at http://www.focc.org.uk) This is provided through family placements and the charity meets the full cost of these visits which include optical, dental and health checks as well as lots of tender loving care.

# Resume of the Meeting Held on 12 March 2014

All councillors were present at the meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> March, which was attended by 7 members of the public.

The Parish Council has been alerted to new drawings for the proposals for Lodge Hill, Chattenden. A disk was supplied to the Clerk and this has been copied for all members. The new drawings were not discussed however as opportunities had been made available the following week for members to speak to representatives of Land Securities, the applicant. The consultation period has been extended until mid-April and the application will be discussed and a response agreed at a special meeting to be held on the evening of the Annual Parish Meeting on 9<sup>th</sup> April. If you want to look at the plans on Medway Council's website, the application number is MC/11/2516.

Representatives of High Halstow Football Club complained about the quality of pitch marking. Their comments will be forwarded to the landscape contractor, although it is fair to say they have been operating under great difficulties due to the state of the field. Another potential team have asked to share the pitch, with games on Sundays. So far they haven't put their detailed proposals in writing as requested. Asked for their opinion, the High Halstow FC representatives commented they thought the pitch might not stand up to potentially two matches a week.

Two ladies representing school parents spoke about their request for a zebra crossing between the school and the car park, which is supported by the school. In addition, the pavement is narrow and the grass verge by the barrier outside the school gates could be tarmacked to enlarge the waiting area at the crossing point. The Parish Council supports this idea. A speed indicator device (or SID) has appeared and is to do with investigating the parents' request.

Chris Watson reported that complaints are being made about the parking at the junction of Willowbank Drive and Longfield Avenue and in Britannia Road opposite the junction with Longfield Avenue. Martin Andrews will speak to the PCSO about this.

The contract with Turfsoil for the period 1<sup>st</sup> April 2014 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2017 has been signed. Now included within the contract is the marking of the football pitch and the mowing of the churchyard.

Chris Watson presented details with costings of a half pipe skateboard unit, together with an aerial view of where it could be sited on the Recreation Ground. This will be available to view and comment on at the meeting to be held on 9<sup>th</sup> April.

Finally, you will soon be seeing new speed restrictions in the area. Indeed by the time you read this, the signs may already be in place.

# High Halstow Hikers

Our March walk was a local one and took place in terrific sunny weather. Twenty of us left Sharnal Street and initially walked across a meadow that appeared reasonably dry but was deceptively sodden and understandably led to few anxious faces. Fortunately the rest of our route was almost all dry. We headed South taking farm tracks towards Beluncle Farm (the place for pumpkins in October) and then onwards to Stoke Saltings across the railway. For those largely familiar with this area but who walked it for the first time the sheer amount of space was a surprise. The sight and sound of skylarks that have become increasingly uncommon was great to see and hear. The saltings were not at their most attractive in the low tide but they clearly showed the preserved grassy areas where, several decades ago, large numbers of barges were moored allowing "muddies" to dig around them and supply the local brick and tile works with clay. The large number of boats moored in the creek closest to Stoke and the numerous microlights taking off and flying close to the pylons and overhead power lines were also unexpected for most of the walkers. The return across the fields from Upper Stoke back to the cars finished an enjoyable 7 mile walk in the spring sunshine.

On Sunday 13th April we walk from Camer Country Park around the Meopham area. The walk is mainly flat around 5-6 miles long. We will begin as usual at 10.00am. Parking is in the car park of Camer Park which is reached very shortly after turning into Camer Park Road a left off Camer Road on the route between Cobham and Meopham via Sole Street. 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# Newly Discovered Map Now On Display In Church

A hand drawn tithe map has recently been discovered in the loft of the Rectory. The map was drawn in 1843 and is a copy of an original drawn in 1839. It gives a wonderful snap shot of life in the village almost 180 years ago. The main village which presently has over 400 houses consisted of less than a dozen including the present Red Dog public house. The map measures 8 foot long and 6 foot 6 inches wide and is pasted onto a cloth background.



To give parishioners a chance to view the map, before it is put in storage in the Medway archives, it is now mounted on the wall in the church. An beautifully illustrated old Cradle roll giving the names of children baptised in the church was also found. This dates from what we think is the late 1950's to the mid 960's was also found and a copy of that will be on permanent display in church soon. If you were born here in the 60's maybe your name is on it. Many of the names do look very familiar.


Both of these will be on display after the usual morning services from 6th April to 25th May.


