## Resume Of The Parish Council Meeting Held On 8 March 2017

The meeting held on 8<sup>th</sup> March was attended by 8 of the 9 parish councillors, Cllr Carl Mitchell being delayed at work; Gary Thomas, the Parish Council's Webmaster and by 16 members of the public.

The traders operating the mobile food vans had written to the Parish Council asking if permission could be given for them to operate from the car park. It was reiterated that they are operating legally on street and that if permission was not given, they would continue to do so. A full discussion ensued, with opinions both in favour and against. The question of planning permission for a presence of more than 28 days in any year and also of insurance was raised. The Chairman of the Recreation Hall Committee stated that the presence of vans would be an issue for hall hirers. Other issues raised included litter and acting as a focal point for people who would linger in the car park. A proposal that the mobile food vans be allowed to use the car park was made and a vote was then taken by the Parish Council. 2 councillors were in favour and 5 against, so the food vans will not be allowed to use the car park.

In last month's resume, it was reported that Medway Council wishes to surrender the lease of the public toilets. A proposal was subsequently made by Medway Council, outlining their proposed financial arrangements. However, it was felt very strongly that Medway Council should continue to operate the toilets, which are well used and that the Parish Council should not agree to the surrender of the lease, which has 53 years to go before it expires in 2070. A letter has been sent to Medway Council to that effect.

Agrant of £250 was made to the Kent Air Ambulance.

We are trying to replace the swing basket in the Recreation Ground. It has been impossible to speak to the original manufacturers and other sources have been investigated. Some of these were extremely expensive and we have been trying to keep the cost down as much as possible. The replacement basket is now on order.

Work is having to be done by UK Power Networks before the new bus shelters can be purchased and installed. It is hoped there will not be too much of a delay.

Chris Peek said that the Youth Club is still struggling to get enough volunteers to be there in time for the club to open at 7pm. If you can help in any way, please contact her.

The next meeting will be the Annual Parish Meeting and will be held on Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> April in the Memorial Hall at 8 pm. We look forward to seeing you there.

# High Halstow Hikers

In March we walked from High Halstow via Clinch St and Decoy Hill to the new bay that has been created just to the west of Egypt Bay as a compensatory measure for the loss of wetland environment by the Thames Gateway port development on the other side of the Thames. Our thoughts on the day were that the bay might be named Decoy Bay since it is immediately north of Decoy Hill and the Decoy Farm hamlet. But now looking at Google maps one can see that prior to the scraping of the marsh and the ingress of the river through the opening seawall defences it was already shown as Salt Fleet Flats Reserve. Eighteen of us did the 7.5-mile walk during a warm early Spring morning with skylarks singing and blossom beginning to emerge. The walking to the seawall is straightforward using the narrow road to Swigshole and then a wide track through the marshes. But there are several stiles and the odd gate to scale which can be challenging for stiff knees and hips. One surprise was to meet several men with shotguns and a pack of large hounds accompanied by a whipper-in and other men with cages of Jack Russels, presumably after foxes and rabbits, respectively. The tide was fully up as we reached the river and as calm as a millpond. A large flock of avocet was resting on Egypt Bay and we startled a similar size group of whistling teal as we broached the defences of the new bay. The latter is just under a mile across and about a third of a mile from the river with a break in the wall of over a guarter of a mile. As it matures it will clearly be a major additional habitat to complement the fleets, marshland and mudflats already supporting large numbers of wildfowl. The walk back from the marshes involves an inevitable climb. This was eased a little by our taking the marginally shallower and much less well-used route from Decoy Farm between two hedgerows and along Bessie's Lane. As we took our rest at the top of this, the clear weather gave terrific views across the Thames Estuary and, in the foreground, over the area where we had been walking. Immediately after this one passes the few remnants of Bessie's Cottage provoking an unanswered question of who Bessie was? A very enjoyable walk if a little more strenuous than our norm.

On Sunday 9th April starting at 10.00, MikeDavies will lead a walk around the country park and nature reserve at Ranscombe Farm (ME2 1LA). This is only 15 minutes drive from High Halstow and is reached by taking a right turn off the A228 200 yards after the roundabout at the top of Sundridge Hill that leads from the M2 bridge down the hill to Cuxton. All are welcome to join the walks.

Every day sees acts of kindness, generosity, sacrifice and courage in our small community. From the friend who visits sick neighbours to the single parent struggling to raise young children alone. From the sick child who always has a smile to those who work sacrificially to ensure our community is a wonderful place to live in. The High Halstow Relief in Need Charity is once again sponsoring the Heron Awards. It has been 10 years since we ran our community award scheme so there are lots of people out there who deserve to be recognised and thanked for the difference they make to all of us. So often we don't realise what a difference a person makes till they are no longer here and it dawns on us what we have lost. Let's try our best to change that and say thank you while they are still here. Maybe what they do will inspire others to do the same. There will be a special award night on 28th June so book the date now and join with us as we celebrate the efforts of our friends and neighbours.

There are two main categories: "Junior" (under 16), and "Adult" (over 16). Each main category has 3 further divisions as listed below. There will also be an overall "Community Hero" chosen by the judges from the nominees. Applications must be completed in full, put into a sealed envelope marked "Heron Awards" and deposited in the Rectory letter box (2 Cooling Road High Halstow, ME3 8SA) or handed in at the Village Shop no later than **12th May 2017**. Applications may be supported by a maximum of one A4 page of supporting information, but no photographs. The judges are nominated by The High Halstow Relief in Need Charity and the judges' decision will be final.

#### Rules & conditions

You may nominate anyone who lives, works or attends school in the village or makes a significant contribution to the village

A nominee may only be nominated for one category and in the event of a nominee receiving more than one nomination the judges will decide into which category he or she should be entered.

#### Battle of Medway Anniversary Event

Medway will be welcoming visitors from far and wide in June, as the 350th anniversary of the Battle of Medway is commemorated through a fortnight of events, including spectacular displays, one off exhibitions and VIP visits.

The battle, in which the Dutch launched a daring assault on the English, has great national and international significance due to its momentous consequences impacting the British economy. The battle led to huge investment in new ships and dockyard facilities, laying the foundations of British supremacy at sea for the next 200 years and contributing to Britain's economic success and the growth of the empire. It also eventually led to the Dutch monarch becoming England's king after the Glorious Revolution.

Three-hundred-and-fifty years on, it's time to remember the epic events of June 1667, an often forgotten dark time in Medway's naval history, with a two-week extravaganza from 8-17 June, full of entertainment, history, and education.

Among the events will be a new Heritage Lottery funded Battle of Medway gallery at Upnor Castle, the very epicentre of the Battle, and a one off exhibition at the Historic Dockyard, Chatham which will explore the battle through contemporary accounts and items of significance borrowed from Dutch and UK national museums. The Command of the Oceans galleries, also at the Dockyard, will highlight the major investment in new ships and Dockyard facilities as a result of the battle.

The grand finale event on 17 June, called Medway in Flames, will be held at the battle site on the River Medway at Chatham overlooked by Upnor Castle and The Historic Dockyard, from which the English fired at Dutch vessels in a bid to stop the onslaught of their ships.

Visitors from far and wide are invited to enjoy the fortnight of events and what is set to be a magnificent, large scale finale event, reliving the action that dramatically brought the second Anglo-Dutch war to an end. Expect water screens, projections, characters, pyrotechnics, special effects, fireworks and much more.

The events in June will not only remember what happened, but also highlight the relationship and growing connections between the Dutch and English – from fire to friendship. The Dutch too will be celebrating the anniversary of The Battle of Medway, or Tocht naar Chatham as it's known in the Netherlands which translates as Journey to Chatham, during the week commencing 19 June.

All commemoration events in Medway have been organised by Medway Council and the Historic Dockyard, Chatham. Richard Holdsworth, Preservation & Education Director at Chatham Historic Dockyard Trust said: "The events of June 1667 marked a significant moment in our national story and we are delighted at this opportunity to take part in the celebrations and display extraordinary objects from the period held in Dutch and British national collections.

"Visitors will also be able to enjoy our Command of the Oceans galleries telling the complete dockyard story from the period and the role it and the people of Chatham played during this and other important events in British and world history. It's going to be guite a year."


