High Halstow Hikers

Our March walk started and finished at Brickhouse Farm, the farm on the S-bend on the road between Fenn Corner and Allhallows and took place on a lovely clear, warm early Spring day. The raised land at the start of the walk gave terrific views across the marshland and the estuary beyond to Essex. The route took us to St Mary's Bay being passed by large skeins of some of the last Brent Geese of the winter (but no people!). We turned back in land at the Bay eventually taking the gentle rise up the footpath towards Coombe Farm and back to our starting point. The route took in the western edge of Lord Foster's suggested place for an Estuary airport and emphasized both the unspeakable damage to this outstanding environment this would effect and also the danger from bird strike that the then government announced as the primary reason for excluding the previous "Cliffe" airport plan.

Our next walk will start at 10.00am on Sunday 15th April from outside the Kings Arms at the top of the very picturesque High Street in Upper Upnor. There is a public car park close to the pub and also parking on the road if the car park is full. We will walk through Lower Upnor to Cockham Fort and Hoo Marina returning to Upnor along the Saxon Shoreway. The walk will be about 6 miles long including the shoreway, woodland and quaint villages. This walk will be led by Alan Wilson.

Hall Refurbishment Phase II Grant Applications

We have a number of applications currently going through different stages for Phase Two and as soon as we hear anything we will let you know.

It was all Henry's Fault (Henry Viii that is)

He blew all the money his dad (Henry VII) had left, raised the taxes to the maximum (nothing changes) defaced the currency (we now call it inflation) and still needed more money. He also wanted a divorce because he wanted a legitimate son and heir (or so they say).

Henry's quick fix (all politicians like these) was to take over the Church, give himself a divorce and nationalise all the abbeys and monasteries (pinch the goodies). All he had to do was hang those religious who didn't play ball, pension of the leaders who did and make redundant, without compensation, the workers. Other than the coup de-tat on the Pope he didn't change the format of practised religion and still burnt a few who wanted to change the current practice. After realising the assets of the wealthy religious houses he scraped the barrel by picking on the small churches. In particular our church of St. Margarets, at High Halstow.

We didn't have much. Our village wasn't rich and prosperous, just a combination of three small hamlets and the Street. No industry- no trade. In fact the church or holy place was here first, probably the abode of a saxon hermit which became a focus for the area.

After his commissioners had picked the bones clean (they were paid on commission) he gave our church to his lackeys in Rochester.

Especially he had pinched the charity kept and administered by the rector at St. Margarets for the poor. Amongst "Good King Hal's" loot were the investments from which Richard Longemen, 1493, willed "xiiiid to be given each Good Friday to Xii poor of the parish " (about 10% of the then village population). The revenue from the sale of land whete, malte and lambes willed by Thomas Dalham, 1501 and in particular the revenue from the iii acres of land to be sold by the "iiii chef men of the parish of Halstowe so exectors do bake pastyes at my moneyth day besides brede, ale and other charges' in perpetuity. Richard Whitbrede 1522.

The poor got poorer and increased in number, with little help until Henry's son King

Edward organised some form of relief but he died young. His eldest sister Queen Mary didn't do much and it wasn't until Queen Bess brought in the poor laws that help was organised nationally. Some would say these poor laws remained largely unchanged until 1835. In effect the poor and destitute became the legal responsibility of their parish. This meant that beggars and unemployed strangers were moved on, after a spell in the stocks to persuade them not to return, and relief was given only to those borne in the village.

Eventually a parish poor relief rate was raised and a refuge established for destitute villagers e.g., a husband dies and his wife and children are thrown out of the 'tied' farm cottage. If they had no relatives who could afford to help, their care fell to the parish. Starvation was the 'means' test. In High Halstow the basement of what was later our "Red Dog" became the poor house. Obviously the parish boundary became the crunch line, we didn't want foreigners or any strays from Hoo, St. Mary's or Cooling. It was important as well for marriages, baptisms and burials, and even more for Tythes, the greater and the minor. Maps would make little difference - even today is there any villager who knows the boundaries of our village, parochial or political?

What became known as Rogation days, or Rogation Sunday came into being. Villagers walked their parish borders or the inhabited parts thereof, sometimes with garlands and banners and the children singing.

Might it not be fun one day to have a village outing, a memory of the Rogation sundays. Our boundary of High Halstow (the Holy place) is far too long to walk in a few hours and some parts are restricted but perhaps graded walks, some easy for the kids and their families, some for the more active (High Halstow hikers?), similar for cross country runners or joggers, and perhaps some bike routes, cross country or road?

Resume of the Parish Council Meeting Held on 14th March 2012

The Parish Council met on 14th March and was chaired by Cllr Thomas, the Chairman being away on business. 9 members of the public also attended, including a representative of the builders of the new house under construction in The Street, near Goodwood Close.

The main point of discussion during the meeting was the bus stop and shelter outside this new house. A statement prepared by the builder's planning consultant was read out, claiming the stop/shelter should be moved as it was in a dangerous position. It was decided to seek a site meeting with Arriva and planning, transport and highway officers of Medway Council. The representative form the builders promised to remove the fence they had erected round the shelter, while matters were resolved. It was also reported that planning permission isn't needed to install a shelter by the bus stop in Christmas Lane, near Half Moon Way.

Cllr Chris Watson reported on the first Councillors' Surgery, held in the Memorial Hall on the second Tuesday of the month, during Kings Kitchen. Nine people came to speak to her. Cllrs Collins, Gordon and Jerreat attended the next surgery.

There is a leak from an ancient water pipe belonging to the Recreation Hall that is affecting the car park. The Parish Council agreed to pay for the work needed, as if left the leak will damage the car park. Other works on the Recreation Ground were about to start and at the time of writing have just been completed.


The last meeting of Medway Council's Rural Liaison Committee was extended to all parish councillors and clerks and focused on the possible airports being promoted by Norman Foster for the Isle of Grain and "Boris Island" in the Thames Estuary. A Government document about airports will eventually be published for consultation and it was agreed the Chairman attend a conference which is likely to be held in due course.

Cllr Josh Gordon reported on the plans for the Jubilee. He has formed a group to plan events, which will take place on Monday 4^{th} June and end with the lighting of a beacon. This will be lit between 10 and half past ten in the evening – the time will be notified, so that the lighting of beacons throughout the country is co-ordinated.

The next meeting is the Annual Parish Meeting and will be held on Wednesday 11th April in the Memorial Hall at 8 pm. Brian McCutcheon of Medway Council has been confirmed as one speaker, he will give an update on developments on the Peninsula, including Lodge Hill. We have also invited a speaker from Action with Communities in Rural Kent to talk about Neighbourhood Planning, which is part of the new Localism Act and which must be community led. There will also be the usual amusing annual report from the Chairman, a chance to ask questions and discuss village matters and of course to chat to other residents over a buffet.

A local history and community arts project

Time and Tides Project Update

Money has been awarded to the ICON Theatre recently by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Medway Council to run a local history and arts project focussing on the villages of Cuxton, High Halstow and Upnor and anyone with an interest in the area. The project is called Time and Tides and offers a chance for local communities to research their local history and take part in arts and drama activities.

Since the taster sessions held in January and February the project team has been designing and organising the rest of the project. In the pipeline are some adult and family learning events in the form of talks and guided walks.

The next projects to be run will be local history learning workshops, which will teach the basics of local history research and include a visit to Medway Archives, and also an oral history project. There will be opportunities to take part as either an interviewer or an interviewee and we will be talking to people about how life in High Halstow has changed over the years.

The interviews will be preceded by a training course on how to undertake oral history interviews. This is a free all-day course and will be held on either Wednesday 18th April or Saturday 21st April 2012. These will be a chance to learn a new skill, catch up with friends and learn new things about the village where you live. If you would like to interview someone, attend the course or know of someone who would make a good interviewee then do please get in touch!

The local history workshops will teach you the basics of local history research, include a visit to Medway Archives and from there you can undertake some research of your own, which will be displayed in November in a local exhibition. Support from the Project Officer will be provided as you undertake your research.

The free local history learning workshop will be held in Chatham on Wednesday 16^{th} May 2012 from 10.00-1.00 and the visit to Medway Archives in Strood will be on Wednesday 23^{rd} May 10.30-12.30.

For teenagers there will be opportunities to take part in verbatim theatre, to make a heritage documentary DVD and to help create a website for the project.

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

Kent Police 101 The New Non-Emergency Number

You can now call Kent Police for non-urgent issues on **101**. The number is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

To make it quicker and easier for the public to get in contact with their local police, 101 has been introduced in England and Wales. It gives a single, easy-to-remember number to call to report crime and other issues which do not require an emergency response.

You can also call 101 to speak to your local neighbourhood officer, to make a general enquiry or to make us aware of a policing issue where you live.

What classes as an emergency?

Calling 101 for situations that do not require an immediate police response helps keep 999 available for when there is an emergency. An emergency is when a crime is happening, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, someone is injured, being threatened or a life is at risk, or there is a traffic incident involving personal injury or danger.

Each call to 101 will never cost more than 15 pence no matter what time of day you call, how long your call lasts or even if you call from a mobile. We do not receive any of the call cost.
