High Halstow Primary School Change in category from Community to Foundation

Notice is given in accordance with section 19(3) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 that The Governing Body of High Halstow Primary School intends to make a prescribed alteration to High Halstow Community Primary School, Harrison Drive, High Halstow, Rochester, Kent, ME3 8TF. The proposed alteration is to Change School Category from Community to Foundation from 01 January 2010.

The Governing Body believes that changing the category of the school will allow us to embed and further develop strategies needed to move our school towards becoming a 21st Century School. We believe we can make cost savings that will lead to more resources being available in the classroom, ensure staff are of the highest quality and properly rewarded for their work, and endeavour to keep our class sizes at 30 or below. By not making changes we will continue to work as we always have done, tied by Local Authority policy in certain areas that we feel are better delegated to schools to control. We believe that in order to ensure every child at our school gets the best possible education a change in category is essential.

Post Office Robbery Convictions

Three thugs who raided the village store, threatening Derek and staff with a weapon. have each been jailed for four years. Martin Price, 27. Jason Swallow, 23, and Darren James, 23, fled from the post office in High Halstow but were arrested soon afterwards. Price, of Castle Road, Chatham, Swallow, of Darnley Road, Strood, and James of Stanhope Road, Strood, admitted robbery and other offences to "wipe the slate clean." James and others had three days earlier robbed a mini-mart in Allhallows of £400 and attempted to rob a store in Hoo where a metal pole was brandished. Swallow asked for other offences mostly involving thefts to be considered and Price, who has 111 offences on his record, was to be sentenced for three burglaries.

Judge Philip St John-Stevens said the court viewed robberies at vulnerable targets very seriously. A degree of planning was used to raid the store in High Halstow.

"The person in the shop didn't know if you were going to use the weapon or not," he said.

Report Crime!

While Kent is a safe county with low levels of serious crime, nuisance behaviour continues to disrupt the lives of far too many residents. Kent Police take this very seriously indeed, which is why they are introducing more neighbourhood officers to work with residents and local organisations to find real solutions to anti-social behaviour and other local problems. In neighbourhoods across Medway people are already seeing the change.

Anti-social behaviour is any behaviour that affects other people in a bad way. Types of anti-social behaviour could be: noise nuisance, litter and fly-tipping, vandalism, graffiti, fires being started, nuisance and abandoned vehicles, rowdy behaviour, begging, drunkenness, dealing in or taking drugs, gangs or groups behaving in an intimidating way, prostitution, indecent behaviour, nuisance neighbours, threatening behaviour and harassment, misuse of fireworks, noisy or intimidating dogs, hoax calls to emergency services. Any of these can make an area frightening and unpleasant for people to live, work and relax in. Sometimes the behaviour forces people to change the way they live.

Should you witness anti-social behaviour or indeed even be a victim, please speak to your neighbourhood police officer. At the very least - please keep a record of activity and inform the Parish Councillor for Police Liaison.

Always call 999 if:

a crime is happening now people are injured people are being threatened or are in danger someone suspected of committing a crime is nearby

Call Kent Police on 01622 690690 to report any non-emergency crime.

In this day and age I understand that individuals may hesitate to contact the Authorities for fear of reprisals: should this be the case please do not hesitate to contact me in confidence and I will act on your behalf.

To help please record when and where the problems are happening, including: dates and times of incidents as much detail as possible about what happened names and/or descriptions of those involved details of any witnesses

how the incident has affected you.

Ambulance Service Community First Responders

With the recent mentions in some of the local publications including the HH Parish Council Annual Report, I thought now is a good time to put 'pen to paper' myself.

Some of you will have no doubt seen me driving around the village with my car marked up to identify me as a Community First Responder (CFR), others have come into contact with me whilst I have been attending an incident in the village.

Firstly may I briefly explain what we do:

CFRs are part of the South East Coast Ambulance Service; we are all unpaid volunteers who carry out our duties in our own time using our own vehicles. We are not a substitute for the Ambulance Service but additional assistance within our own communities.

When someone falls ill suddenly, they often need medical treatment. In more serious cases, early treatment has been proven to increase the patient's chances of survival. After 8 minutes of a patient's heart stopping beating, their chances of survival decrease by 10% for every minute thereafter. However, if the patient can be defibrillated within 8 minutes of the collapse, their chance of survival increases by up to 75%.

The ambulance service responds immediately using a special prioritising control system. However, even then, delays can still occur due to:

- · High volume of calls
- Traffic congestion
- · Remote rural locations

Our Role:

CFRs are alerted to an incident at the same time as an NHS ambulance (we are all issued with mobile phones and a pager). If we are available, we will move as swiftly as possibly to the address given – we are not permitted to disobey normal traffic regulations. On arrival at the incident, we assess the patient and start to administer the appropriate treatment; potentially, life saving treatment, until we are able to hand over the patient to the ambulance crew. We will then often remain with the patient, assisting the crew if required until they are able to transport them to hospital.

Our Kit:

Training:	

We are all trained to use the equipment we carry. This is normally done at training courses held on a weekend with an assessment being held the following weekend. This is followed by several shifts with ambulance crews to gain first hand experience of

attending incidents and help to prepare us for that first call out when we know we may be the first on the scene of a potentially life threatening medical emergency.

For the protection of the potentially vulnerable people we serve, all volunteers have to undergo checks by the Criminal Records Bureau.

Community First Responders only operate within their own community, normally within a 3 mile radius of where they live but due to the nature of the peninsular I will often be requested to attend patients in Grain, All Hallows, Cliffe, Chattenden, Hoo and any small community between. To assist with administration and coordination each group of CFRs in Kent are formed into 'schemes'. We in this area are known as the' Hoo Scheme' which I now coordinate. Following training etc, myself and a fellow responder based in Wainscott, went 'live', covering the Hoo peninsular in July 2008. In the 7 months following, my colleague and I have attended 339 incidents in this area, more than twice as many as the next busiest scheme in Kent.

Over the past few months we have been joined by more new Responders, raising our numbers to six. The SECAmb policy is that each new Responder scheme will be set up and provided with two kits to share between active responders, and that further equipment will be self funded by the schemes. Due to the generosity of many local organisations and businesses, I have now placed an order for 4 more Responder kits so that each Responder will have their own kit. Considering that each kit currently costs £1685, these organisations have been very generous. As the scheme expands, I'm sure I will be out again with my begging bowl in the future.

I have refrained from mentioning any of our benefactors as some have wished not to have it publicised at this stage.

What do I as Community Responders get out of it?

- Getting trapped at the level crossings en-route to a potential cardiac arrest in Grain is something I do not wish to experience every day.
- Not all call-outs have the result we would all like.
- + The look on people's faces, when I arrive at their door within a few minutes of them phoning for an ambulance, and being able to help.
- Handing over a patient to the ambulance crew in a far more comfortable state than before I arrived.
- + The genuine thanks and appreciation from patients and ambulance crews alike.

If anyone else fancies becoming a Community First Responder or would just like a chat about what we do, or any organisation that would like me to come along and give a chat on what we do – please get in touch with me. A member of the Parish Council will I'm sure point you in the right direction.

RSPB calls for more volunteers in North Kent

RSPB North Kent already has around 50 active volunteers working in a variety of roles. Resume of the Parish Council Meeting

The May meeting each year is correctly called the "Annual Parish Council Meeting" and is the meeting where the Chairman is elected for the forthcoming year, representatives are appointed and various jobs assigned. George Crozer and Gary Thomas were again elected as Chairman and Vice-chairman respectively.

Medway Council's Sports Development Officer had asked if the Recreation Ground could be used, in conjunction with the Cricket Club, for the cricket tournament of the Mini Youth Games. This is for primary schools and it is expected children from 39 schools will take part. It will be held on Thursday 11 June between 8 am and 4 pm. The children will arrive from their schools by minibus and it is expected cars will be a minimum but in any case the police will be in charge of traffic management to ensure safety for everyone.

The contract we have with Medway Council to do the street cleaning in the village was for nine years and expires on 31 August. We have put in a tender for the nine years from 1 September and hope that it will again be awarded and that street cleaning in the village will carry on seamlessly. We're now waiting for the outcome.

The arrangement we have with Medway Council for the maintenance of the green areas of the village is by means of an open-ended agreement and is not a formal contract in the same way. The amount received to do this has not increased this year and Turfsoil have agreed to hold their price as well. As you know, we have added the areas still owned by Taylor Wimpey, who agreed that we should maintain them on their behalf and we are being paid for this. This started at the beginning of the year and we hope residents are now beginning to see a more uniform look in the village.

Some exploratory work has been done on the drainage ditch and culvert that runs across the recreation ground. The report identified work that has to be carried out and the drainage authority (Medway Council) gave us 6 months from the beginning of April to do this. The alternative would have been a 28 day injunction at the time. Failure to comply and complete the necessary repairs within the 6 months will mean the work will be carried out by Medway anyway and we will be charged, which will be more expensive as costs such as officer time would be added. The quotation obtained from Medway's preferred contractor will be discussed at the next meeting. We do not have to use this contractor but if we use another and the work is not deemed to be up to standard, more expense will be incurred.

At the end of the meeting it was reported that a resident had complained about shrubs overhanging the footway in Christmas Lane, which made it difficult to walk past and unpleasant too after rain.

In the first wave of improvements Medway have selected eleven areas to see improvements to their facilities. High Halstow, being one of the eleven areas, has been chosen to benefit with a grant of £30,000 which will be targeted for improvements for the age range 8-13. In addition the Parish Council is putting a further £20,000 towards improvements to meet improvements for children under 8.

Part of the process involved in achieving these long awaited improvements is to consult the public both young and old. This is being achieved by a variety of ways including

- 1 Involving the children at the school to seek the opinion of children
- Visiting the play park and seeking comments from children who are using the current facilities
- 3 Visiting the Youth Club to talk to children about their requirements
