



Improvements to Bus Service

There will be changes to some bus services in Medway starting from Sunday 17 June with some additional evening services being provided.

These include a new hourly service on Arriva Service 191 between Chatham and Hoo, and an increase in frequency on Arriva Service 145 in the evenings from every 90 minutes to every 40 minutes.

The evening Arriva 167 service to Lordswood will be renumbered 702 and combined with the existing Arriva 701 will provide a half hourly service between Chatham and Luton, Lordswood, Princes Avenue and Wayfield.

There will also be more buses serving MidKent College in Gillingham, including three Arriva 101 buses, an Arriva 136 from Gravesend, and an Arriva 191 morning service from Grain.

Extra buses on the Arriva 100 service will run during early mornings from St Mary's Island to Chatham. There will be some minor changes to the timings of Arriva services 132, 133, 140/141, 176, 181, and 796 Nu-Venture

Sunday Service 170 will no longer operate via Strood, Canal Road, Medway City Estate and Medway Tunnel and will instead be renumbered 151 and run via Strood and Rochester and provide an improved service to Medway Valley Park.

Passengers can also text the codes shown on bus stop signs to 84268 to find out when their next bus is due to arrive.

Resume of the High Halstow Parish Council Meeting 9th May 2012

The May meeting of the Parish Council was the annual meeting when the Chairman is elected for the year and membership of the committees and other roles are assigned. George Crozer was duly elected Chairman, with Gary Thomas as his Vice-chairman. So it's No Change for the next year.

It had been hoped that Medway's Director of Regeneration, Community and Culture (which embraces Planning) could have attended to answer questions about the proposed Lodge Hill development at Chattenden. This however wasn't possible and Brian McCutcheon, a senior planning officer, will attend the meeting on 11th July. Following this meeting, the Parish Council will have to submit its final response to the consultation about the Lodge Hill development.

As I write, we're still waiting to hear about the Sport England application for the outdoor gym. We've got our fingers crossed we'll be successful this time. The toddler (under 5s) equipment for the fenced playpark has been ordered. There were further discussions about some sort of skateboard facility, but perceptions of what this means vary and a suitable site remains to be found – if indeed it's decided to proceed further with this idea.

Taylor Wimpey, who are still owners of parts of the Wilcon estate, will be putting in hand repairs to the fence behind Topley Drive.

The monthly surgeries are proving popular and worthwhile. Councillors are in attendance at the Farmers Market and attend King's Kitchen in the Memorial Hall on the second Tuesday of the month.

The Government's consultation document on airports still hasn't been issued. Latest rumours are that it might be September and may be split into developing existing airports and a new airport. Following the expansion of Southend airport and Easyjet flights, residents have noticed more low flying aircraft. If you have an iPhone or similar, George has discovered an app that lets you find out the height of an overflying plane at the time. He measured one such, but found it was twice the minimum permissible height (750 ft) and was at 1,500 ft.

Finally, a big 'Thank You' to the organising committee and all those who helped make the Diamond Jubilee Party in the Park such a success, especially Cllr Josh Gordon, who led the event on behalf of the Parish Council. For those of us who can remember the Coronation (just!), Silver Jubilee and Golden Jubilee and who might have been a bit blasé about the whole thing, it was amazing that our youngest councillor threw himself into the task with such enthusiasm. Many thanks.

The next meeting is on Wednesday 11th July at 8 pm in the Memorial Hall.



Church for Sale?



Most people like the idea of the typical English village scene with the ancient church and pub in the centre. Almost a quarter of the Christmas cards I got this year had a picture of a rural church covered in snow on them. However behind the romantic idyllic picture is a harsh financial reality. The church is not immune from the growing financial pressures of the world. The reality is that simply for the church building to remain standing and in good condition, as a monument to the village's past, costs approximately £150 a week, even if it is never used for services.

Now that may seem like a strange thing to say, but there needs to be a huge distinction between the church and the church building. The church is a family and the church building is the family home. But of course it is much more than just a home. It is

also a community building, a place where the whole village community celebrates key events in the lives of the village and its individuals. Many people see the church building as almost a touchstone of their own families' past, as several generations have been baptised, married and buried here. The problem arises from the fact that realistically the church cannot continue to afford its family home. It isn't just the £150 a week maintenance. The building no longer meets the needs of a 21st Century church or community. It is cold and almost impossible to heat effectively. The requirements and expectations of modern life cannot be met in its present condition. Meeting in a cold barn-sized building with no facilities or toilets is not comfortable and for many simply impossible.

The problem has been made considerably worse by a number of thefts of lead and lightning conductors, so much so that this year the church has made an operating loss of close to £15,000. The insurance company does not pay the full cost of repairs. Despite what many people think the local parish church has only one source of income and that is from the collections and donations of church members, which means that a very small number of people pay for and provide the use of a building that many people in our village consider part of the very fabric of the community.

This cannot continue. Unless we can increase our income dramatically and soon, there may not be an open church building this time next year. A proposal is being put forward to set up a Friends of St Margaret's Church. We are looking to see if there are other people out there who would be interested in forming a Friends of St Margaret's. I have attached below a copy of what I believe the Friends of St Margaret's would be about and a draft constitution. In next month's HHT we will be publishing details of a meeting for those wishing to attend to help make this a reality but would also like to hear from people before hand with their comments.

Friend's Of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow

Constitution

Our Purpose

Is to promote or assist in the maintenance and upkeep of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow for the benefit of all who value this ancient church.

Our Aims

- 1. To promote wide interest in the care and preservation of St Margaret's Church and its history and to provide a focus of support for it.
- 2. To raise additional funds for the maintenance of its fabric, interior decorations and furnishings so as to assist the Parochial Church Council, when the committee considers it appropriate. (The Church Council continues to be responsible for the Church and all the works done upon and within it.)
- 3. To invite, promote and receive donations and contributions in pursuit of these aims.
- 4. To ensure fund raising is carried out in harmony with the ethos of the Church

Our Rules

- 1. The name of the society shall be "Friends of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow".
- 2. Membership of Friends of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow shall be open to anyone interested in the objects of the Friends and who has paid the annual member's subscription, (which shall be agreed at the Annual Meeting).
- 3. The affairs of Friends of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow shall be managed by a Committee of no more than 7 members as appointed at the Annual Meeting
- 4. The Committee shall comprise of
- a) 2 representatives from the PCC
- b) 1 Parish Council representative
- c) 4 other members of the Friends of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow
- 5. The Annual General Meeting shall be held within two months of the end of the financial year of the Society. (The financial year shall end on 31st March each year) and shall:
 - a) Appoint the Committee for the forthcoming year;
 - b) Receive the audited accounts for the previous year;
 - c) Consider recommendations from the Committee regarding the use of any funds held;
 - d) Consider other matters which might further the aims of the Friends.
- 6. The Committee shall:
 - a) Meet at least? times each year;
 - b) Arrange for the publication of a twice yearly Friends Newsletter;
 - c) Consult with the Church Council and advise the Annual Meeting of Friends regarding the needs of the Church;
 - d) Consider possible fund raising activities;
 - e) Consider other matters which might further the aims of the Friends.
- 7. The Committee at its first meeting after the Annual Meeting;

A bank account shall be opened in the name of "Friends of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow" and controlled by any two signatories, drawn from the members of the committee all of whom are authorised to act.

- 8. Any funds held by the Friends shall be used for the fabric of the Church in accordance with Item 2 of Our Aims above and shall be donated through the Parochial Church Council.
- 9. The rules may be amended by two thirds majority of the members present at the Annual General Meeting, provided that 21 days notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to all members.
- 10. In the event of the dissolution of the Friends any monies held shall be passed to the Parochial Church Council of St Margaret's Church, High Halstow.

An Introduction to Asbestos Disease Compensation Claims

Until the early 1980s asbestos was widely used in many industries because of its fire resistant properties.

Exposure to sub-microscopic asbestos fibres can lead to various conditions, especially if the more hazardous blue or brown asbestos is inhaled. Frequently these conditions do not develop until 20 years or more after the asbestos exposure. The most serious are mesothelioma and lung cancer which have fatal consequences. Then there are non-cancerous conditions of asbestosis, diffuse pleural thickening and pleural plaques. These present in different ways. In some cases they are symptomless. In others the symptoms are serious and disabling.

North Kent is regarded as an asbestos disease "hotspot" due to the historical presence of Chatham Docks, power stations, paper mills and other heavy industries. Also, asbestos products were manufactured at British Uralite in Lower Higham.

Generally, the workers most frequently exposed to asbestos included:

- · Shipyard workers;
- · Plumbers and gasfitters;
- · Laggers and thermal insulation engineers
- · Building trades, including carpenters, decorators and electricians;
- Building surveyors;
- · Asbestos manufacturers;
- Those washing asbestos contaminated work clothes.

Compensation claims can be made for asbestos related diseases (not pleural plaques) caused by industrial exposure from the 1960s or even the 1950s onwards. Even if the employer is now out of business you may still be able to trace the insurers (for example, via the Employer Liability Tracing Office). Following a case involving Cape Plc in April this year, it is also possible to sue the parent company where the subsidiary company has ceased to exist. There is even a possible route to compensation from US asbestos producers where US asbestos was used, for example in certain ships or power stations.

Sadly the nature of asbestos illness means the sufferer may well die before a compensation claim is thought about. However a claim can still be made on behalf of a person who has died, by his estate. So if someone in your family has died from a fatal disease like mesothelioma there can still be a claim for compensation. It should be noted compensation is not automatic. There is a requirement of fault on the part of the employer. However it is often possible to show an employer was not taking effective precautions and knew or ought to have known about the risks from exposure.
