Red Dog Lease Signed
New Vision for Traditional Country Pub

My wife Rachel and I are delighted to finally be in a position to announce our plans regarding The Red Dog Public House. There have been some complex and drawn out legal procedures that have prevented us doing this until now.

Having had both Pubs and Restaurants previously, we had very specific criteria when searching for a new premises and The Red Dog more than satisfied our requirements. We were looking for a premises, which we could turn into a traditional country style pub and restaurant and the fact that it was situated in the village that my wife was from was obviously an added incentive.

We plan to completely refurbish the premises creating a warm atmosphere both inside and out. Although I am not against Sky TV, Juke Boxes and Pool tables, they will not be present at The Red Dog as they don't fit what we are trying to achieve. There will be a high quality fresh food menu with full A La Carte options and an extensive wine menu complementing. A selection of carefully selected and ever-changing cask ales will be the focal point of the bar along with the expected lagers, ciders and soft drinks and a few quirky additions that we have found over the years.

To get the full potential out of The Red Dog, we are going to be making some changes to the layout of both the bar/restaurant area as well as the car park and gardens. By making these changes we hope to be able to make it a more comfortable and attractive venue to frequent. Depending on local interest, it would be great to have some traditional pub teams competing locally such as cards and Bat and Trap. There will also be a sponsored golf society running throughout the year.

At present I can only announce an opening date of Friday 22nd of October, as there are several stages of works to be carried out, not all of which are under my control. I do however, expect to be able to drive the project forward now to open sooner and will keep all that are interested up to date with developments via the High Halstow Times. There will also be regularly updated photos, news and opinion polls on our Facebook page, 'The Red Dog High Halstow' until our website goes live. We are currently asking for suggestions for the 1st guest ale so please get in touch with any requests.

We have been touched by the number of people getting in contact to wish us luck with this project and would like to thank you all. This has certainly made us even more determined to give High Halstow a pub to be truly proud of.

There has been an increase in dog foul not being picked up by owners walking their dogs. This has been noticeable on both the footpaths and the Recreation Ground and also on the RSPB land surrounding Forge Common etc. On 1st October 2009 a dog fouling order was introduced by Medway Council under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environments act 2005 that makes it an offence to fail to remove dog faeces (without reasonable excuse) from any area to which the public have access. The fixed penalty for this offence is £80 fine. Please make sure you clean up after your dog.

High Halstow Cricket Club - July 2010

Sadly, we are not to visit Lords this year. Our exploits in the nPower National Village Knockout Cup came to an end at Bentley in Essex, when, in the round of the last 16 we lost an absorbing game, in which we under-performed with the bat. However, the large crowd, including a significant proportion from Kent, thoroughly enjoyed the day. The Club would like to thank all those who supported us in this game and earlier in the month in our successful game at home against Cambridgeshire champions, Fordham.

Unfortunately, the 1st XI have recently found themselves 4 or 5 players short, through injury and unavailability. As a consequence, the team is finding the second half of the season to be a struggle in Division II of the Kent League. However, the youth of the side (only 3 or 4 are over 25) gives confidence for the future. Meanwhile the 2nd XI are beginning to put results together, and are now 3rd in Division III (2nd XI). Much of this success arises from Daren Brumbaugh's magical form with the bat. At the time of writing he is the leading run scorer in the entire Kent League with 736. He is being ably supported by U17 Adam Colgate, who is the 5th highest scorer in the division with 325 runs.

The 3rd XI are also pushing hard for promotion, currently sitting 3rd in Division 1B (Central) of the Kent Regional League. The 4th XI continue to enjoy themselves, whilst being unable to field a regular XI which makes consistency of result difficult to achieve.

The Colts competitive season is now complete with the exception of one final which will take place in September. There has been much improvement across the board. The U11 Hardball (Herons) finished 3rd in their league, ahead of the Egrets who came a very creditable 9th. Special mention should be made of Herons captain, Tyler Dockwray, who plays for Kent at Under 10. We also participated in the U11 softball league and, although were unable to play as many games as we wished, were able to introduce the game to a number of very keen young ladies. The U13s did well to finish 3rd in their league and, despite missing out on play-offs, this can be considered a very positive result. The U15s had an excellent season, finishing top of Medway Youth League U15 (West), and earning a place in the playoff final in September against the winners of the East division. They also reached the final of the U15 cup, where they lost to Rainham in a game played on the main ground at The Mote, Maidstone. These are remarkable successes because most of the side are still under 14 and will have another chance at this age group in 2011. The U17s also won their division, but lost to Upchurch from U17 (East) in the championship semi-final.

Congratulations are due to all the young player who have taken part in the Colts competitions this year, to their coaches and parents, without whom none of this would have been possible.

One of the architects of our 1st XI success over recent years has decided that this will be his last season of competitive cricket – the last of over 30. Rupert Staple has only been with us for 3 seasons, but his impact has been huge. The fact that he plays for Kent Over 50s, yet remains one of the leading bowlers in the Kent League, is testimony to his skill and fitness. We, and batsmen throughout the League will miss him. On 11th September, the Club is hosting a testimonial match in his honour featuring players from the last 30 years of league cricket in Kent. We hope that many other guests from the world of Kent cricket will also attend, and invite friends from the village to join us on what promises to be an exciting and vibrant day.

New children's play areas opened for the summer holiday.

More of Medway's revamped play parks have been opened in time for the summer holiday. On Saturday, 17 July, Cllr Howard Doe, Medway Council's Portfolio Holder for Community Services, opened play areas at Capstone Farm Country Park and Riverside Country Park.

The two play parks at Capstone Farm Country Park have been refurbished, while a submerged shipwreck has been built for children to play on at Riverside Country Park. When they're not playing on the shipwreck, families can relax and spend time together at the new picnic area. Capstone Farm Country Park has been funded by Playbuilder money, while the Big Lottery funded Riverside's revamp.

Both parks are disabled and toddler-friendly and include basket swings, a fully accessible roundabout and a multi play area that can be used by children with mobility issues. Residents and children have been instrumental with the design of the new parks and submitted their ideas at a series of consultation events and creative workshops last year.

Medway Council's Portfolio Holder for Community Services Cllr Howard Doe said: "The council is committed to improving high quality play facilities for children and young people in Medway. Residents, children and community groups have been crucial in our plans to ensure the new and improved play areas meet their needs and contain the type of play equipment and picnic areas they want and would use. Play areas not only give children and young people somewhere to meet their friends, but are also an important tool to promote health and fitness. I hope our children enjoy playing in these new parks."

Healthy vision for High Halstow residents

Everyday in Britain, 100 people start to lose their sight and in many cases a simple regular eye check-up is all that's needed to avoid long-term damage.

To urge residents in the local High Halstow community to have regular eye examinations, Kent Association for the Blind is promoting the 'Eye Care We Care' campaign. The campaign, aimed at children and adults alike, has three clear messages:



- Everyone, including children as well as people who think they can see perfectly well, should have a thorough eye examination at least once every two vears
- 2. In some circumstances, an optometrist may recommend more frequent NHS sight tests. For example, if you're diabetic or 40 or over and have a family history of glaucoma
- Eye examinations are an essential health check; just like regular visits to the dentist they should be a part of everyone's normal health regime

Dr Huw Pinney, Chairman of Kent & Medway Local Optometric Committee is endorsing the campaign:

"I am delighted to support Kent Association for the Blind's 'Eye Care We Care'campaign. So often people don't realise that sight loss can be avoided by a simple eye examination which can help detect early signs of harmful conditions such as glaucoma. Other conditions

can also be picked up before other symptoms have been spotted such as high blood pressure, diabetes and some heart conditions."

Water for Wildlife

The people of Kent are being asked to spare a thought for the birds and other garden wildlife during the long summer months. The RSPB is urging residents to provide supplies of fresh clean water and keep lawns, trees and shrubs green and lush so they provide insect food.

Birds that rely on food they extract from the ground, like worms and slugs, particularly struggle in long, dry spells. Species like blackbirds, song thrushes and robins will find it extremely difficult to find the food they need if the earth is dry and solid. Most small birds need to drink at least twice a day to replace lost water. Birds get the liquid they need from their food, and by drinking. Many insectivorous birds get most of their water from food. Seed-eating birds have a dry diet and they do need to drink more.

They also need water for feather washing. Bathing and preening are essential to keep feathers in good condition. And keeping in good condition helps birds get around, find food, and evade predators. The easiest way to provide water in your garden is a bird bath. It needs to have shallow sloping sides with a shallow approach to water. Make sure the surface of the bath is rough so birds can grip it with their claws, and not slip.

The simplest bird bath is a plant saucer with textured finish and a stone in the middle You could set several of these around your garden.

Sophie McCallum, RSPB South East media officer, said: "Birds aren't worried about the aesthetics of their baths and as long as the dish is simple, functional and could withstand a vigorous bathing session from a flock of starling for example, it will be suitable. You don't need to spend a lot of money on a fancy structure and you don't need to put out a lot of water – a small amount, refreshed twice a day, would be fine. It's important to position the bath where birds will feel safe. Birds get excited and pre-occupied about bathing, and tend to be more vulnerable than at other times. Make sure birds have clear visibility as they bathe, with bushes or trees nearby to provide cover if alarmed, and perches to use when preening.

The RSPB is also encouraging gardeners to install a water butt, to collect any rainwater that we do get this summer. Even if only small amounts are collected in the next few weeks, when the wetter seasons start they will be completely full for next year's dry spells.

Water from water butts is ideal for the almost daily watering needed in summer, and can also be used for topping up ponds.

You could also use 'grey water' from things such as baths or preparing vegetables and salads to keep your lawns saturated.

Following your articles in the HH Times I would like to give feedback on your proposals to move the recycling bins from the village hall car park. Having looked at the reduced number of bins (there appear to now only be three) I would suggest that if they are positioned together near the fence leading to the grassed area, then there should be sufficient gap to prevent people using them as an aid to climbing on the toilet roof. The car park is a logical place for the bins to remain and the car park surface should be robust enough to accommodate their emptying. Looking at the alternative locations suggested I think that none of them are a better alternative. The space by the vets is too small and already visitors to the vets have difficulty parking in this area.
