

Look, Hoo's Singing...But for How Much Longer? Will Lodge Hill wipe out the Nightingale?

Preliminary results from this year's national nightingale survey have revealed that the Hoo Peninsula is a national stronghold for the iconic songster that inspired some of our greatest writers.

The Hoo Peninsula's nightingales are bucking a national trend that has seen this wonderful bird decline drastically. Around 150 nightingales were pouring forth their liquid songs on the peninsula this spring, almost double the number found during the last national survey in 1999. This makes the Hoo Peninsula one of the

bird's strongholds in Kent and nationally. The key areas are at Lodge Hill near Chattenden, and the area between Higham, Cliffe and the RSPB's reserve at Northward Hill. With 84 singing males, the Lodge Hill area looks like it is one of the most important in Kent and possibly the whole country. Yet this news comes just when their very existence is threatened by a Medway Council plan to build up to 5,000 houses at Lodge Hill. Chris Corrigan, the RSPB director for the South East region said, "Most of the nightingales are found in the proposed development site, a development that would wipe out their habitat. Recreational disturbance and predation by domestic pets mean the remaining nightingales in the adjacent Chattenden Woods Site of Special Scientific Interest would be very badly affected. We objected strongly to the development at the recent inquiry into the Council's plans and urged them to reconsider their plans. We find it astonishing that a site that is so important for a rapidly



declining species is earmarked for development. This is precisely the kind of magical place for wildlife that the Council should be protecting for the nation." Chris went on to say, "The Council and the developers have claimed they can create new habitat for nightingales, but this is untried and untested - we simply should not be taking a risk with somewhere this important. Now that the true value of Lodge Hill has been revealed we are calling on Medway Council to withdraw its damaging proposal and instead work with the RSPB, other conservation bodies and the local community to celebrate Lodge Hill and the Hoo Peninsula; this place is one of the natural wonders of Kent, the nightingale was celebrated by Keats and Shakespeare and should be protected for the inspiration of future generations."






Photo Competition !

Resume of the High Halstow Parish Council Meeting 11th July 2012

The July meeting was attended by Brian McCutcheon, a senior planning officer, who spoke about and answered questions on the Lodge Hill development. He said that development of this area had been a Government decision in 1995 and had been incorporated in the various structure and local development plans since. He appreciated that residents did not want the development to go ahead but explained the development was a matter of design and detail and not whether or not it should happen.

We were very disappointed that the Sport England bid for the outdoor gym was turned down again, although we had answered their previous comments on impact. The Parish Council has now decided to proceed with the 4 items agreed a year ago and these have been ordered. A vote of thanks is due to Cllr Chris Watson who worked very hard on the project and put in a great deal of time. The toddler (under 5s) equipment for the fenced playpark should have been installed by the time you read this.

Following discussions with Medway Council's public rights of way officer, a grant application has been submitted to Natural England for an all-weather path to be laid on the public footpath between the Recreation Ground and Ruggles Close.

Ann Smith, who organises the delivery of High Halstow Times, has written to say she wishes to retire at the end of the year. The Parish Council wishes to record its sincere thanks to Ann for having looked after the delivery of the Times and the team of delivery people for so long. If you would like to put yourself forward to take over, please contact any parish councillor or the Clerk.

Finally, please be assured that we are "on the case" about the bus shelter between Goodwood Close and Heronsbank. The matter is with our solicitors and you will understand that as such we cannot say any more at the moment. Also legal matters move fairly slowly as you will know if you have ever had to use a solicitor – please be patient.

The next meeting is on Wednesday 12th September at 8 pm in the Memorial Hall. Discussion about a skateboard facility will be on the agenda.





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Asbestos Related Lung Cancer You may still be entitled to compensation even if you were a smoker

Lung cancer is most commonly associated with smoking. However it can also be caused by breathing in asbestos dust and is a common complication of asbestosis.

Because a high percentage of lung cancers are attributed to smoking, the possibility that exposure to asbestos has contributed is often not explored. This also means that many miss out on claiming Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit or claiming compensation for lung cancer caused by asbestos exposure.

Medical opinion is divided on whether lung cancer can be caused by exposure to asbestos in the absence of asbestosis, although the majority view is that it can be. In any event, changes to the benefit system now recognise that you no longer have to have asbestosis to claim benefits for lung cancer caused by asbestos exposure. In those instances you have to provide evidence of substantial occupational asbestos exposure which is set out in the terms of prescription in the Appendix of Prescribed Diseases (for eligibility to Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit). You may also be able to obtain compensation from any employers (or their insurers) who caused the asbestos exposure.

Whilst exposure to either asbestos or smoking can cause lung cancer, the combination of both together significantly increases the chances of developing lung cancer.

A study in America found that a heavy smoker, smoking one pack a day for 20 years has a ten fold increased risk of developing lung cancer over a non-smoker. A non-smoker exposed to asbestos has a five fold increased risk over a non-smoker not exposed to asbestos.

Notably, a heavy smoker who has also been exposed to asbestos has a 50 to 90 fold increased risk of developing lung cancer over a non-smoker who is not exposed to asbestos.

As this data shows, exposure to asbestos can be a major contributing factor in the development of lung cancer even for those who smoke.

Evidence of fibrosis of the lungs, very heavy exposure to asbestos for one year, or five – ten years moderate exposure should be sufficient to establish that the exposure has materially contributed to the risk of developing lung cancer. A further requirement is that at least ten years must have passed between such exposure and the development of the condition.

Therefore if you have been exposed to asbestos and developed lung cancer you may be entitled to claim compensation for lung cancer caused by your asbestos exposure even if you have smoked. You may also be entitled to state benefits. Current case law indicates there may be a reduction in your compensation to reflect the extent to which smoking on its own may have contributed to the risk.

If you have been diagnosed with an asbestos related disease (asbestosis, mesothelioma, pleural thickening or asbestos lung cancer) as a result of harmful exposure to asbestos, you may be able to claim compensation. 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
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
Medway Council in partnership with The Reading Agency, Medway Libraries will once again be running the Summer Reading Challenge.

Dear HHT,

Their are many national charities doing vital work in this difficult time but there are perhaps many more smaller but also deserving causes within our community which depend upon local support. One of these, the 'Strood Community Project' (charity 1143225) recently wrote a nice letter to Elizabeth Meredith and her team from the 'Kings Kitchen' where villagers meet for coffee and cake on a Tuesday mornings (and can also chat with parish councillors).

As a ministry of our village church the Kings Kitchen (guess who is the 'King' ?) is run by volunteers, principally Liz Meredith, and is not a profit making concern although some small excess over expenditure can accumulate. This was given to the Strood community project. Their letter describes how from such donations they were recently able to help a local teenager who had fallen out with his family. Although perhaps not a difficult event in relationships with teenagers, his parents themselves were split between Kent and Essex. The project financed temporary accommodation and provided counselling for the lad and his family, with the associated travelling costs. They also arranged food for him from the 'Foodbank'. The 'Medway Food Bank' provides a minimum of 3 days non perishable food to local people in crisis. All the food is donated by the local community and the foodbank works with front line professionals to identify families and people in need. Beneficiaries are given a voucher to take to the Foodbank which is run by Hope in the Community Ltd (charity 1108850) and seeded from 'the trussell trust'. The food bank now has three centres, at Strood, Chatham and more recently Gillingham. The donors often buy an extra pack or tin of non perishable and basic foods with their regular shopping which, for High Halstow is left either at St Margaret's Church or on Tuesday mornings at the Kings Kitchen. Rosemary Pike is our local volunteer and takes the donations to a church distribution centre. Recently within our area we have given some 87.8 kilos to help local people, part of the 1.367 kilos collected and distributed to families across Medway.

There can be no doubt that their are many other charities, small and large, which enjoy the generous support of villagers but its nice to hear of two such local ones which often benefit local people. *Dave Stephenson.*

Dear HHT,

Some thoughts on the proposed skatepark in the village. We already have somewhere that allows children and young people of all ages to play outside - the park and recreation field. We live in a lovely village with lots of open spaces, woodland, a youth club and more, we aren't short on activities for the young people of the village to experience and I can't see why we should build something like this. Why not ride bikes in the woods? I grew up in inner London and had none of these amenities, which is why I moved to High Halstow to raise my own family. I would hope the children here can see how lucky they are and make the most of what they have on a day to day basis without needing something manufactured for them. As and when they do need more, there are skateparks around on the peninsula, in Medway, and further afield.

Aside from the enormous cost, a park would cause noise pollution and be an eyesore if not sited correctly. The proposal to put it on the green by Gypsy Way would surely upset the residents who would then overlook it. Putting it in the park would be a better option, but the suggestion on the village blog to have a graffiti area would not only make it even uglier, but would also encourage vandalism in the playground and around the hall, where of course a lot of money has been spent over the years tidying up this exact kind of thing. I can see how in an ideal world that a wide range of children would use it, but in reality its far more likely to be older boys.

Statistics (albeit from the US) show that the vast majority of skatepark users are boys with an average age 12-16 years, so building a park is not likely to benefit or include the whole community, indeed when discussing this with a supporter of the park, my wife was told she was not in favour only because we have a daughter and not a son! Those in favour are suggesting it is a minority who are against the construction of the skatepark. I wonder if perhaps the minority are those who are making a case supporting it, with the majority who are less keen feel that it probably won't happen and so don't feel the need to register any objection. I would urge those on both sides of the fence to make their views known so that the Parish Council can come to a fair decision in September. Kind regards Matt Stutely
