The plans should incorporate comments from the consultation exercise that has been carried out involving the various interested parties. There may be an opportunity to see the proposals prior to the next HHT so please look out for notices in the Village Notice Boards and both Halls. The plan is still for the new refurbished play park to be completed by the end of March 2010.

Farmers Market

The Farmers Market has been running now for over two years. In that time over £4,000 has been raised for the benefit of the Village Hall

This article is to inform you of some of the stall holders who come each month to support our Market - First we have Lucy:



Lucy and her daughter make the chocolate in Fairseat, where they live on a family farm. They make them in the little Victorian dairy at the back of the farmhouse using only the finest ingredients.

The base product is tempered and crystallized in large Bains Marie. One each for dark, milk and white chocolate. It is then moulded in shapes appropriate to the flavours that they are about to make. To do this the moulds are filled with molten chocolate, then rattled and tapped vigorously to expel any air bubbles before excess chocolate is scraped away. They are left to set whilst the filling is made.

Lucy says that the creation of fillings is fun as many liquors and spirits are involved and a certain amount of 'quality control' is obligatory.

When the fillings are made they are piped into the moulds together with any in-fill required.

When the fillings are set, the chocolates are covered with a final layer of chocolate and, once again, allowed to set.

Truffles are dipped in molten chocolate and rolled in their finish or individually wrapped in foil. Flat pack boxes are made up, the chocolates placed therein, closed, tied and labelled.

Then all that is left is the dreaded washing up!

In July not only was the litter picked in Dux Court but windows were replaced in the Village Hall, fences creosoted at the Memorial Hall and running repairs carried out to the bus shelter opposite Longfield Avenue.

The next one is September 12th with the fun starting 8.30am in the Village Hall Car Park - with a free cup of tea and cake afterwards.
