

# Southend Airport is Changing Fight Paths Over the Peninsula

Southend Airport is putting in place a beacon system to be able to guide aircraft into land without the use of their existing radar (vectoring) system. Initially it will be used as a back up safety feature as not all aircraft using the airport are equipped with the technology.

The beacon route will guide aircraft in over Hoo and between Cliffe and Cliffe Woods.

The traffic we are seeing today is about 50% of the total allowable flights so it is possible that we will see an increase in existing traffic with appropriately 10% of that traffic using the new beacon route.

The allowable height for aircraft flying over the peninsula is not changing.

#### **Hoo Meeting 30 August 2017 – organised by Ron Sands of Hands off Hoo Peninsula**

Present: Approximately 200 members of the public who asked many questions

Spoke at length on the number of homes to be delivered, which he explained had been sent down to Medway from Government. Believes larger developments benefit the local community because

the bigger developments bring larger sums of Section 106 funding.

Phil Filmer Ward Conservative Councillor and Cabinet member and Portfolio holder for Highways

In constant back to back meetings for Medway on Highways and the Medway Plan. Is in agreement with locals that the figure of 7,000 new dwellings for the peninsula is too high.

Roy Freshwater UKIP Ward Councillor

We have been asking for updated infrastructure for over 10 years. Will carry on fighting land development on the peninsula.

Kelly Tolhurst Conservative MP for Rochester and Strood

Confirmed that the figure of 29,500 came from a Housing Assessment Report on Medway. Spoke at length and admitted that in her opinion the proposed figure of 29,500 homes is totally

undeliverable.

Vince Maple Leader, Labour Group of Councillors in Medway

Spoke at length on housing issues in Medway and is in favour of delivering as many homes as

possible throughout Medway.

Theresa Murray Deputy Leader, Labour Group of Councillors in Medway and Shadow Portfolio holder for Health

Spoke at length to clarify Labour's position on the delivery of house and agreed with infrastructure

issues. Gave information on The Listening Project for residents to attend.

John Tildesley Chairman, Hoo Parish Councillor

Gave a short speech on his disagreement with all the potential new developments on the peninsula.

#### **Parish Council News**

#### Resume of the Parish Council Meeting held on 12th October 2017

Because of the presentation made by Redrow before the official start of the parish council meeting, the agenda was curtailed and only essential items discussed. A report about Redrow's aspirations is outlined on page 5.

After the presentation, ten members of the public stayed behind to listen to the meeting. Of the councillors, both Brian Williams and Mick O'Hanlon were missing, due to holidays.

There were two planning applications. One was for an extension to replace the conservatory at a property in Topley Drive and there were no objections. The other was for the demolition of the garage to a property in Harrison Drive, with the erection of a part two, part single storey side extension and single storey extension to front and rear. The parish council has objected to this on the grounds of loss of light and amenity to the neighbour.

The annual audit for the year 2016/17 has been successfully concluded. The completed audit return will eventually go on the websites.

Neither of our representatives went to the last meeting of the Police Liaison Committee, but Martin Andrews reported that there is a new PCSO, Sean Alderton. The PCSO also covers the Strood Rural ward of Medway, ie, Wainscott, Cliffe, Cliffe Woods and Chattenden. With the Peninsula ward, he has quite an area to cover.

There is another consultation about Southend Airport, with a proposal to introduce performance based

navigation (PBN) approach procedures at London Southend Airport. Details can be found using this link: http://southendairport.com/corporate-and-community/ proposed-arrival-routes. Further details are on page 3.

A resident complained about some of the footpaths in the village across farmland and asked the parish council to put pressure on Medway Council to clear them. She also mentioned the ditch along Britannia Road that is apparently full of rubbish.

There was also a report of a near miss with an Easyjet aircraft and a drone that was being flown from Ropers Green Lane. Please be aware of the dangers of flying drones, especially as we are in the flight paths for Southend and City Airports and aircraft will be on their descents.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> October in the Memorial Hall at 8pm. We look forward to seeing you there.

# **High Halstow Land Development**

Public interest in the proposed predatory expansion of the village by Redrow Homes at Walnut tree Farm was such that the Parish Council meeting had to move on mass from its usual memorial Hall venue to the much larger Village Hall.

Representatives from Redrow Homes were invited to address the Parish Council ahead of their application for Planning Permission to build on land at Walnut Tree Farm, off Britannia Road to the east of the Willowbank drive and Longfield Avenue with an access created along Britannia Road.

The proposal is for around 70 dwellings made up of 2 to 4 bedroomed, two storey houses and 3 storey flats. A 30% allocation of affordable housing would be required.

The representative from Redrow Homes explained that the siting of this development is included in one of the options outlined in Medway's draft plan. They believe that it would cause a relatively low impact on the area. They have undertaken their own ecological assessment and are in the process of reviewing other essential surveys.

As well as the normal consultation associated with a planning application of this size they intend to consult with residents and stakeholders individually. They offered to summarise all feedback before they go forward with a local exhibition.

The Parish Council and our Local Ward councillor Phil Filmer pointed out that the new Local Plan, due to be adopted in 2019, would very likely include an allocation of housing for High Halstow and that this proposal was "predatory" and may not be part of that new "Local Plan".

Residents, abundantly aware of the lack of facilities and infrastructure within the village, raised many issues that would need to be addressed before any large scale development could be considered sustainable or in any way desirable. Questions raised included:-

- Lack of adequate sewage facilities, siting many examples of existing system overloads;
- · Lack of places of education, siting many examples of residents of having to send children elsewhere with the disruption caused to everyday life;
- · Lack of and quality of public transport, siting the alternative and unacceptable expensive journeys to and from school and places of work. Many in the village travel to London to work and regularly spend more than 12 hours away from home each day;
- · Lack of and poor quality of our roads in and out of the village and on and off of the peninsula, sitting the



dangerous A228 and the regular congestion at the only access to the peninsula at Four Elms Hill and Junction 1 of the M2

- · Lack of good air quality siting the recent reports of the air quality at four elms Hill; and the
- · Lack of access to GPs.

The Parish Council would like to hear your views about the Proposed Expansion of High Halstow so that it can properly formulate its response to the application when it is brought forward.

A further meeting will be called later in the year to give another opportunity for you to have your say.

Please keep in touch and up to date with your views at our Meetings every 2nd Wednesday of the month at 8.00pm in the Memorial Hall. You could also speak to two of your Councillors at our monthly surgery at the Kings kitchen on the 2nd Tuesday morning of the month, again in the Memorial Hall. 

# The Medway Street Angels

The Medway Street Angels are a not-forprofit organisation.

Neil Charlick, Amber Gilbert and Samantha Hewish started the Medway Street Angels in 2016 after seeing more and more homeless coming to our towns. The three originators started feeding the homeless one day a week. This has quickly developed into 6 days per week, throughout the year.

Using our 47 Volunteers we provide all essentials from camping equipment, food, drinks and everyday essentials.

We support all rough sleepers, homeless, sheltered accommodation users and those closest to being homeless. We are a non-political, non-religious organisation, which ensures our clients trust us to share their worries and fears. We rely on fundraising through public groups and donations either of materials or monetary.

There are a multitude of reasons why people become homeless and this is not always a direct result to an addiction. We regularly deal with Mental Health Issues, PTSD, bereavement with no will, marriage break ups, and run-aways. Currently the age range of homeless is from 19 to 72, that we support, but unfortunately we have had younger.

Addiction to alcohol and drugs is a desperate measure in an attempt to make them forget where they are and what is happening around them. We give support without religious or political preferences, meaning they can trust us with anything.

Without an address or care of address they receive no benefits to support them, shortage of houses or lack of vulnerabilities means they are at bottom of the housing



priority list.

Since The Medway Street Angels begun we have successfully managed to reintegrate four people back into the world of working and supporting themselves. We will continue this care with them until they decide they no longer need us. Contact us on 07564 829189 should you have any concerns regarding yourself or anyone else.

Please visit our Facebook fundraising page at The Medway Street Angels. We also have a Just Giving page where you

can donate directly to us. All donations are used directly for the homeless.

When we first met Russell he was always heavily intoxicated. He frequently lost consciousness on a bench or on the floor and having to be dragged to his tent to be kept safe there.

For months we watched this happen to him, helping where we could. We gradually grew closer to Russell and gained his trust and encouraging him to seek medical help and addiction counselling. We attended all appointments with him and he had a few serious health scares but with our continued support he is now in control of his addiction

Russell is a success story.

Being put into sheltered accommodation and frequently coming to work with one of the founders of MSA he has managed to keep on the same path. Russell was told he had 3 weeks to live but he's still here 3 months on and always volunteers with us. Russell says: "People are quick to notice when I was drunk and judge me for being homeless but now I'm sober nobody notices me so I don't get judged anymore."

A true Street Angel. Rose and Russell were asleep in their double tent in February earlier this year. At approximately 01:00-02:00am Russell awakened Rose and screamed at her that "he didn't want to be burnt alive." He was on fire and Rose was trying to put him out with her hands. "It was awful. We thought we were going to die. There was molten plastic all over me."

Rose managed to get Russell out of the tent and within seconds it was fully alight. Rose and Russell had lost all their possessions but not their lives.

Russell said "The bushes were alight, the tent was up. It was all on fire. I could never sleep in a tent again."

They were taken to Medway hospital and Rose was later transferred to the specialist burns unit in East Grinstead for treatment to her legs, hips and face.

They both recovered in a shelter in Gillingham and received help from Medway Street Angel team leader, Neil Charlick.








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

# Down to earth gardening tips

OCTOBER Plant Profile: Sedum 'Joyce Henderson' [Stonecrop]

**Description:** Upright hardy perennial with fleshy succulent leaves. The leaves are blue-green in summer and flushed with purple in autumn. It has very attractive flowers to bees which are pink starting in late summer and all through autumn. Height and spread about 24 inches (60 cm).





**Likes:** It prefers a fairly light well-drained neutral soil in full sun.

**Care:** You can keep the seed heads on through winter or cut down after flowering to keep the plant in shape. Easy to take softwood cuttings or divide to make another plant. Drought tolerant when established.

#### Some other things to do this month:

- Divide and replant herbaceous perennials a good example is the sedum.
- Collect ripe seeds and store in a dry cold place overwinter.
- Prune floribunda and hybrid tea type roses back by a third to protect from strong winds.
- Mulch borders with garden compost or well-rotted farmyard manure. The ideal depth to mulch is 7cm (3 inches).
- · Plant out spring cabbage.
- Apply grease bands to apple and pear trees to prevent winter moths crawling into the trees to lay their eggs.
- · Make a leaf pile for hibernating insects.
- Allow some ivy to mature and flower as it's a great late source of nectar and berries for insects.



#### **High Halstow Cricket Club**

At the time of writing the last article, the cricket club were in a position where our three adult teams were still in with a shout of three promotions.

The first of the teams that could achieve this were the Saturday 2nd XI on 26th September, the penultimate

league game of the season. Shooters Hill were the visitors to Rayner's Meadow, with the home side knowing a win would seal the points required to ensure Division 4 cricket next season. Having elected to bat first, Shooters Hill were restricted to a score of 168, mainly due to Paul Belsey's nagging line and length earning him 7 wickets. With High Halstow's pitch rated as the best in the league and one of the best in the whole of Kent, the team were confident that this under par score could be chased down and subsequently promotion secured. However, with perhaps a little bit of over-confidence, poor batting and good bowling, our batting line up failed to deliver and were skittled out for a very disappointing 55, meaning there was only one final chance to get promotion.

Meanwhile, away at Dartfordians CC, our 1st XI had to win in order to keep promotion within our own hands and take it to the final week. Thanks to fine bowling spells from James Marrable and Clarke Dockwray (4 wickets apiece), the opposition only managed to muster 129, which proved nowhere near enough as the 1st XI easily reached the target with 7 wickets to spare, led by Tyler Dockwray (61 not out).

So on to the final weekend of the season (2nd/3rd September), the biggest weekend in High Halstow's recent history, win 3 games and the club would be celebrating 3 promotions in one season. On the Saturday, the 1st XI were at home against Chistlehurst & West Kent CC, the 2nd XI travelled to Offham CC and the Sunday XI had a home game against Town Malling CC.

On paper, HHCC were favourites in all 3 matches, but runs still had to be scored and wickets taken in order to secure the points needed. With the constant flow of text messages being transferred between the teams during the course of the afternoon, tension was high at both grounds. However, after the first innings nerves had been settled a little. At Rayner's Meadow the 1st XI Captain, Christopher Maurice, produced a splendid innings to add another century to his previous two earlier in the season, allowing a very challenging total of 271 to be set.

Over at Offham CC, the pitch was rather different, as it had not been covered during the heavy rain days before, and although a score of 157 seemed low, the players were confident it would be enough. At approximately 5:30pm this proved to be the case as the 2nd XI had bowled out our opponents for 49, securing promotion to Kent League



Division 4 next season. With the news filtering through to Rayner's Meadow of one promotion in the bag, this seemed to give the 1st XI a lift, and not long after Rayner's Meadow erupted with celebration as the final wicket was taken to ensure both Saturday League sides had earned promotion. Cue the celebrations.....

The Sunday game brought the opportunity to complete the hat-trick of promotions, which I am delighted to report was fulfilled with ease, albeit with a little less celebration (mainly due to sore heads from the night before!!).

All in all a very successful summer of cricket at High Halstow, which sadly has now drawn to a close, but focus has immediately turned to the organisation of social fundraising events and participation in a darts league, and it seems that the winning mentality has continued with a victory in the first fixture of the season.

It won't be long before preparations begin for the 2018 cricket season, with indoor cricket nets starting in January. These are open to all ages and new members are more than welcome. More details of this will follow in due course.

Throughout the season it was a delight to see local residents (regulars and some new faces) watching the cricket on a Saturday afternoon supporting our teams. The cricket club would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have come to watch and supported our teams. We really appreciate it.

So all that is left to say is congratulations to your cricket club for the tremendous achievements this season, it has been a truly memorable season and one that all the village should be proud of.



#### **Eden Road and Harrison Drive rebuild**





I remember it well!

Back in the early 1980's, an acquaintance of mine knocked on my door and introduced me to a Mr Roy Puddie and his friend from Trevale Road in Rochester. What became of this meeting was to change the face of High Halstow forever. They informed me of what had been learnt by the government from a house fire in the Midlands, and because of that my house had now become blighted and unmortgage-able (basically it was almost unsaleable). The mortgage lenders had apparently pulled the rug out from under us!

It transpired that Cornish style houses in the village could have been suffering from "concrete cancer", technically called "spalling". This was not just peculiar to High Halstow, but also Rochester, Hoo, Grain, Higham and thousands of more properties the length and breadth of the country, all of different styles and construction. In fact, it later appeared that only one house in High Halstow had spalling, but every house was affected by the revelation.

A meeting of the home owners of Eden Road and Harrison Drive was hurriedly convened in the village school where the "bomb shell" was dropped. A "Cornish Residents Association" was formed with a committee made up of several well known home owners with myself as chairman (for my sins). The government then introduced the 1984 Housing Defect Act, and as they were held accountable, gave a grant for repairs with the owners making up the short fall, providing they met the qualifying criteria. These repairs had to be carried out under licence from reputable building firms, so the committee explored every avenue on behalf of the residents, and reported back via meetings and a newsletter called "The Cornish Prison".

Word quickly spread around Medway and a meeting took place of over 800 local residents, councillors and Peggy Fenner MP, at the Central Hall, Chatham to see one of the many demonstrations by a national builder. The majority

of High Halstow Cornish home owners opted for the John Laing method with a few going for Michael Dyson Associates.

After numerous arguments/
meetings with the local authority,
much heartache and sleepless
nights, work finally started in
1985 with Laing's setting up their
construction site in White Road.
All the houses had to be rebuilt to
a specification that rendered them
completely mortgage-able with a
10 year NHBC guarantee.

I remember that winter of 1985

so well, it was a particularly harsh one with knee deep snow and strong winds, and was a very traumatic time for everybody who had homes under repair (mine included). Householders had to stay in residence whilst the roof was jacked up and the walls removed / replaced from the foundations up; only sheets of thin insulation between them and the elements. It was often referred to as a "living hell"!

It's now over 30 years since that chance meeting in my house, and it's great to see the Laing Architect's prophesy has come true regarding the finished product. Eden Road and Harrison Drive are a fitting testament to his foresight and imagination coupled with the fortitude of every resident at the time.

"Just another chapter in the history of the village".


