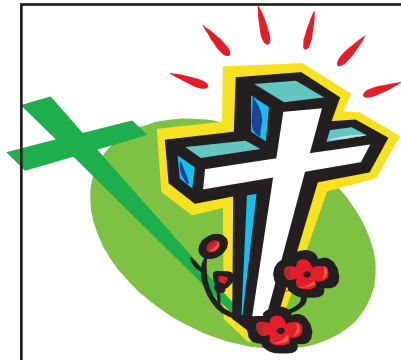
With most of the stalls, orders can be made especially if there is a pen you want hand made, cards designed for special occasions (not just Christmas) or a special piece of jewellery your looking for.

### *Kent's summer wildlife stock-take gets prickly*

A quarter of Kent gardens regularly have visiting hedgehogs according to participants in the RSPB's 'Make Your Nature Count' survey. 3152 people in Kent took part in this year's summer wildlife survey counting the birds and mammals in their gardens. As well as hedgehogs, participants were also asked to report moles for the first time this year. In Kent 5% of participants recorded seeing moles.

Sophie McCallum, RSPB South East media officer, said: "This is only the second year of our summer survey so it's great that so many people in Kent took part. They are helping us to collect useful information about our garden wildlife. For many species the only way of counting them is to ask people to take part in a garden survey like this and some of the results have been quite surprising. Lots of people see hedgehogs, badgers and moles in their gardens which you may only expect to see in the wider countryside.

"The fact that our gardens have such a wide variety of wildlife in them highlights how important wildlife friendly gardening is. You can help ensure our fabulous wildlife continues to survive."

Experts believe that the high numbers of hedgehogs in gardens prove what a refuge they can be, as a loss of quality hedgehog habitat in the countryside makes it increasingly difficult for them to survive further afield.

Hugh Warwick, Hedgehog expert, says: "Gardens are clearly very important for hedgehogs – a great example of a truly wild animal not only at home with us but also of great benefit to gardeners.

"The hedgehog not only brings a voracious appetite for garden pests, it represents a little bit of wildness. We should treasure the fact that they live comfortably in our gardens and so many people can get nose-to-nose with them."

Make Your Nature Count was one of the first garden wildlife surveys since the extraordinarily cold winter and participants also recorded common birds.

The survey showed that the blackbird is still the most frequent visitor, recorded in over 90% of Kent gardens, followed by the collard dove in 83%. The wood pigeon takes third place in 81% of gardens. The survey took place during the breeding season and in Kent over a third recorded young blackbirds, nearly 14% recorded young robins and over 5% saw young song thrushes.

The RSPB was also keen to record summer migrants, particularly nesting house martins.

Nearly 2% of respondents in Kent have house martins nesting under their eaves. Experts are keen to build on this in future years to find out the extent of their suspected declines.

Next year's Make Your Nature Count will take place from 4th-12th June 2011.

## New Recycling Service

We are making changes to the way your garden waste is processed so that you can recycle more.

From **Monday, 4 October 2010**. (Collection days will not change)

If you have a brown wheelie bin, we will be able to collect food (either cooked or uncooked) as well as garden waste from all properties (with a brown wheelie bin).

In early 2011, we will be expanding the number of properties that have wheelie bins and for those that cannot, we will also be running trials on a number of smaller sized containers.

### What will happen to your garden/food waste from 4, October?

Your garden and food waste is taken to specialist processors Countrystyle Recycling, near Sittingbourne, where it is recycled into compost. All of it stays in the UK and the majority is used in Kent for agriculture as a peat free nutrient rich fertiliser to enhance crop growth. It works by using naturally occurring micro-organisms, totally free from artificial heat and additives.

From Monday, **8 November 2010** we will be able to collect mixed household plastic packaging. To help us to do this, we are asking you to separate your paper and card from the other materials. Your collection dates will not change.

From **Monday, 8 November** we will start delivering new collection bags to all households.

#### Every household will receive:

- ~ One blue reusable bag for paper and cardboard;
- ~ One white reusable bag for all other household containers that can be recycled. This includes: Clean metal foil, metal food and drink cans, glass bottles and jars and household plastic packaging.

When you receive your new blue and white reusable bags, you will also receive a leaflet that explains exactly how to use them. Until you receive your blue and white reusable bags, please continue to recycle as you do now.

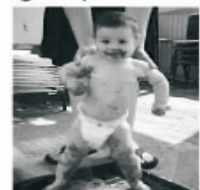

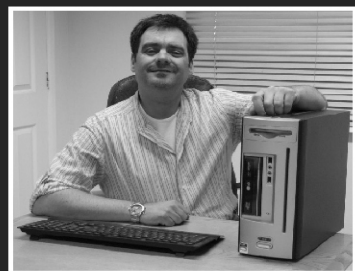
