We have in our village, an unsung hero who devotes his time to helping people in their hour of need.

Steve Joyce is our local 'First Responder' and is normally the first on the scene after sudden illness or accident; often well before the paramedic or ambulance.

On a recent Sunday evening our son was suddenly taken ill, a shocking and frightening experience.

Having dialled 999 we were told an ambulance was 25 minutes away, however Steve arrived within minutes, much to our relief. He took control of the situation and provided reassurance at what was a difficult time. When the ambulance arrived he calmly provided the crew with all the information they needed to help our son.

Steve does this voluntarily and is often on call at all hours, ready to respond and provides, sometimes life saving emergency treatment.

We also understand that the Parish Council have provided funds for additional expensive equipment to allow Steve to be even more effective. Well done and thank you to all members of the Parish Council.



RSPB emblem bird flocks to Cliffe Pools in record numbers

The RSPB's emblem bird, the avocet, was recorded in record numbers in September at RSPB Cliffe Pools. Large populations of avocet are common at Cliffe Pools in winter, as the birds like to feed in the saline pools at high tide. However, local naturalist Trevor Hatton was very surprised when he spotted a flock of over 1300 avocet descending on the pools.

Trevor said: "It was incredible. I am used to seeing hundreds of avocet at Cliffe Pools, but nothing like this. I think something like three quarters of the entire Thames Estuary migrant population were together at Cliffe Pools at the same time."

It is thought that the very dry summer has led to lower water levels in the pools, which favours wading birds like the avocet. The RSPB believe that it may be a bumper winter at the site for other waders like dunlin, black tailed godwit and curlews.

The RSPB's Paul Hyde said: "Cliffe Pools is always fantastic for birdlife over the winter. In normal years you can expect flocks of around five thousand dunlin. With lower water levels this year, who know what we might expect. It's quite exciting."

The avocet is one of the UK's most celebrated conservation successes and was officially adopted by the RSPB as their logo in 1970. The avocet was declared extinct in the UK in 1842 and didn't start breeding again until 100 years later. Through the hard work of the RSPB and other conservation organisations there are now over 870 pairs of breeding avocet across the UK and nearly 4000 over-wintering.

Visitors will get a great chance to view avocet and other birdlife at the RSPB's Cliffe Coastal Safari Event on November 1. As part of Kent Coastal Week, the RSPB have organised a series of activities at the sea wall, aimed to help people discover more about what hovers above, crawls upon and lurks beneath our shores.

After reading and seeing prominence given to the letter by Mr Coomber, (Oct HHT), I feel compelled to pen a reply. It's undoubtedly clear that the issue of the HHCC who already have their own ground within the village, now using the recreation field as an additional pitch has become emotional one for all parties

Mr Coomber's sentiments then regarding the issue of intimidation (to quote 'Intimidation will not prevail') are most admirable. I trust therefore that he and those people who also had letters published about this issue in the same newsletter, also include within their condemnation the sarcasm, offensive gestures, verbal abuse and worse, that some adult members of the HHCC have used against residents opposed to the playing of cricket so near to their houses?

On a purely personal level, I strongly refute and reject any accusations of intimidation, just for the record, I'm 72 years of age and no more than nine stone soaking wet, not the most of intimidating characteristics.

In the same letter, Mr Coomber also makes the baffling statement that 'these residents won't be happy until cricket has disappeared from High Halstow altogether'. This issue has nothing to do with being anti-cricket. My personal objection is about this new pitch boundary being just feet away from back gardens and houses - bearing in mind that one of the aims of cricket is to hit the ball over the boundary!!! Cricket balls are not soft and this is potentially a dangerous situation.

continued from page 9 - To give you just a little context, over the summer months, with cricket being played so close, I've found myself in a situation where I am unable to sit and feel safe or comfortable in my own garden and have experienced the frightening situation of a cricket ball hitting my kitchen window.

Unless you are directly affected by this situation I understand that it might be hard to appreciate or to see it from just one viewpoint. It could be interesting, though, if the situation was reversed and Mr Coomber and others suddenly found their houses within range of flying cricket balls whether they might be more empathetic and see things a little differently.

Lastly, some time ago now, along with a couple of other dads from the village, I ran a boy's football team for a number of years. I'm all for young people being involved in sport and understand the benefits of this type of endeavour, but surely it shouldn't be at the expense of the safety and quality of life of others.

Dear HHT

I must say I was very concerned at the letters that were published in the October edition of the HHT relating to the problems concerning the HHCC and certain residents in the village. As we are all aware there are always two sides to every story but as yet only one point of view made public.

Firstly I would like to point out that no resident of Goodwood Close has complained about any children playing cricket on the Recreation Ground, so to imply that the children are being deprived of the opportunity to enjoy their cricket is untrue. How could there be any complaints about the children playing when the children have never played cricket on a Saturday. We were all led to believe that the Rec was for the use of the Colts to play cricket, when in fact that was not the case.

I would like now to inform residents of High Halstow of the complaints and Health & Safety issues that have arisen as a result of the adult teams that play on a Saturday. We have been told on a number of occasions of the high standard of play that has been achieved by the players which is great, but at the same time raises a number of safety issues, such as the cricket ball being hit into peoples gardens, being hit into the play park, while little ones are playing, putting people at risk while walking along the public right of way or walking their dogs, the ball hitting garden fences every five minutes and that the balls were being hit so hard that they hit peoples windows. It is sheer luck that nobody was hurt. The other complaints have all related to the behaviour of certain members of the cricket team. I find it quite unacceptable to witness grown men urinating in public while children are present and when there are perfectly good facilities available only a few feet away. When residents objected to this they were verbally abused and shown occasional hand gestures. On a number of occasions residents were subjected to verbal abuse when the cricket ball was hit into their gardens which they objected to. Surely these are not the standards of behaviour that you would normally expect from the local cricket team

Lastly the cricket team had their licence revoked by the Parish Council because it was too dangerous, purely a health and safety issue and not because of the intimidation as was suggested. I find it almost laughable that anyone could even think that our Parish Council so weak as to allow themselves to be intimidated by a small group of old age pensioners. The residents of Goodwood Close are not anti cricket, the Rec is far too small area for the use of adult cricket to be played or in fact any hard ball game

Having read the two letters and the article by M. Coomber, HHT October, I feel a few facts would be in order. October 2008 the HHCC ask for permission to use the Recreation Ground for the Colts cricket from May to September 2009, Tuesday for training and Saturday for matches. The HHPC gave permission but would review it again at the end of the season. Apart from Tuesday's training no Colts team played a competitive match on the Recreation Ground. On any Saturday it was 3rd and 4th XI's who played and they are all men. As the Colts did not play on Saturday how could they possibly have been threatened and intimidated? I suggest you get your facts right first and stop listening to the biased views of some members of HHPC. A few times 1 or 2 16/17 year old Colts did play with the men's team. We had threats, intimidation, verbal and physical abuse, all summer from some of the 3rd and 4th XI Team and coaches. Their behaviour is disgusting and unacceptable, i.e. 11th July urinating against a garden fence, on two occasions, in front of children in the Play area. When challenged they gave the usual verbal abuse and hand gestures. On the 11th July the Police were called. Is this the sort of ROLE MODEL you want for your nine-year old son? Is this the good standards of sporting behaviour you are looking for? I don't think so. As for Mr Coomber's article he says, "intimidation will not prevail". He is right but we say COMMON SENSE WILL. HHCC have hijacked the Village Recreation Ground, you have taken away the freedom to play and walk in safety. It is a risk to the public, children playing, the elderly and dog walkers as they are always looking over their shoulder for the cricket ball. By now I hope you have seen HHPC comment on page 3, October 2009 HHT. We all look forward to next summer when we can sit in our garden, on Saturday's in safety, and not have the ball hitting our fences or into our gardens.

Dear HHT

I write in response to the article from High Halstow Cricket Club published in the October 2009 issue. Having attended this meeting it should be made clear that at no stage did the residents of Goodwood Close, and others from the village attempt to end the playing of cricket by the Colt's be it training on Tuesday or matches on Saturday. To stop this was a decision made wholly by the club.

The representations made at the meeting were concerned with <u>adults</u> playing cricket on the ground and for a variety of reasons. The main concern for Goodwood residents were around the issues of not being able to enjoy their properties due to cricket balls hitting and damaging their fences and indeed at times smashing into kitchen windows etc. This combined with the fear of sitting in their gardens and being hit, seems to me to be an entirely legitimate reason to lobby the Parish Council to revoke the licence for adult matches. After all I feel sure that Mr Coomber would soon have something to say if a group of 22 adults turned up outside his house and started knocking cricket balls all over the place.

Other issues voiced at the meeting were concerned with the behaviour of some members of the club, namely urinating in public (a fine example to our youth) and the verbal and physical intimidation which escalated into violent assault all in the name of sport. Along with various other residents who objected to not being able to safely walk through the park and again not being able to use the facilities with their children for fear of being struck by cricket balls. It must be remembered that there is a public footpath across the land which anybody is entitled to use without hindrance at any time. In short the recreation ground should remain for the use of everybody in the village be it taking the dog for a walk, flying a kite, with your grandchild, or just sitting on a bench enjoying a warm summers day. After all HHCC you have a piece of land dedicated exclusively for your sport. Whilst your intentions for the youth of the village are very laudable they should not be to the detriment of the rest of us.
