Village Hall Refurbishment Works Phase Two




High Halstow Hikers

A dozen of us enjoyed wonderful bright autumn weather for our October walk which initially took us through the old parts of Cliffe and through some of the short lanes that few of the walkers had seen and take you to the edge of the marshes. The clear views across the lakes were amazing in the clear air particularly from the top of Black Path. The waders of the lakes have begun to increase in number and create the large flocks that flash to and fro in the sunlight. We were also rewarded with an unexpected view of a large flock of ruff and the now usual handful of avocet and little egret and a few great crested grebe. The tide was in for our short break at the end of Cliffe Creek where there were several large ships passing and view across to the new large container port being constructed in Essex. A thoroughly enjoyable 6 or 7 mile stroll.

On Sunday 11th November we will walk through Knowle Park and along part of the Greensands Way. Almost half the walk is within the magnificent deer park and there are good views of the house itself which was built in the 15th Century. We will start at 10.00 from the National Trust car park at One Tree Hill. To get there from Sevenoaks take A225 south along the edge of Knowle Park, turn left onto St Julians Rd, right onto Faulk Wood Rd, right onto Carter's Hill and car park is a few metres on left. The walk will be about 6 miles in length. Our last walk of the year will be a local pre-Christmas one on 16th December.

Remember fire safety this fifth of November

With bonfire night fast approaching firefighters are urging residents to keep safety in mind and not let an accident ruin the fun. Over the past twelve months there has been a significant increase in the amount of bonfire related incidents across the county – almost 30 per cent more then the previous year.* The majority of these involve bonfires that have spread to nearby areas and becoming out of control. When building a bonfire it is important to position it well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and overhanging branches. Always keep a bucket of water or hosepipe nearby and never use accelerants such as paraffin or petrol to get the fire going.

Meanwhile, hosting a firework evening can provide great entertainment but it is essential that the right safety procedures are carried out and remember that fireworks can be dangerous if misused. Incidents involving fireworks have fallen this year but crews are warning people not to become complacent. Fireworks are explosive and burn at very high temperatures, so always read the instructions carefully and keep them away from children and pets.

Kent Fire and Rescue Service's (KFRS) education team has been visiting schools across the county to help raise awareness of bonfire safety and pass on the message that fireworks can be extremely dangerous if misused. Stuart Skilton, Head of KFRS Community Safety, said: "The fifth of November is often a time of celebration but always keep in mind that fire can spread extremely quickly. If you do light a bonfire, ensure it is never left unattended and keep it at a manageable size. If the fire gets out of hand, it's far safer to call the emergency services rather then trying to tackle the blaze yourself. "I would also encourage people to take extra care when handling fireworks and that children playing with sparklers are supervised at all times."

Take care with bonfires:

- A bonfire should be positioned well away from any buildings, sheds and overhanging branches.
- A bonfire should not be lit before any firework display unless the firework display is sufficiently far away to ensure stray sparks from the bonfire cannot fall into the firework area.
- A bonfire should not contain any potentially hazardous materials which may explode or give off toxic fumes, such as; aerosols, batteries, bottles, foam-filled furniture or tins of paint.
- A bonfire should be kept to a manageable size and evenly built so that is collapses inwards as it burns.
- Always check the bonfire's construction is still sound prior to lighting it, that there are no children or animals inside, and that hazardous items such as aerosols and fireworks have not been thrown onto it.
- The bonfire should not be lit by children or left unattended and nothing should be cooked on it.
- Flammable liquids such as petrol, diesel, methyalated spirits or white spirit should NEVER be poured onto the bonfire to light or revive it.

It's also worth remembering that there are more environmentally friendly ways of getting rid of garden waste without having a bonfire. Most garden waste, such as grass cuttings and leaves, can be recycling by composting. Your local council may help you get a compost bin or offer a green waste collection service.

Always follow the Firework Code

- Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114 or with a CE mark
- Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.
- · Keep fireworks in a closed box.
- Follow the instructions on each firework.
- · Light them at arm's length, using a taper.
- Stand well back.
- Never go near a firework that has not been lit even if it doesn't go off it could still explode.
- · Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- · Always supervise children around fireworks.
- Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.
- Never give sparklers to a child under five.
- Keep pets indoors.

Once in a lifetime opportunity to step-up for a richer countryside for all

Wildlife lovers are being urged to call time on the gunmen, trappers and poisoners destroying our natural heritage. Birds of prey are just some of the wildlife protected by law, yet the latest figures published today by the RSPB reveal yet another shameful year of poisoning, shooting and trapping for hen harriers, red kites, buzzards, peregrine falcons and other persecuted species.

In the South East, 40 incidents of wild bird crime were reported to the RSPB Investigations team last year, which accounted for just under 7% of the UK incidents reported in Birdcrime 2011. These included 21 reported incidents of bird of prey persecution, 2 reports of egg collecting and 11 reports of the taking and sale of wild birds. Samantha Stokes, speaking for the RSPB in the South East said: "We currently have a once in a lifetime opportunity to tackle these crimes in England and Wales. Too little has been done over the years to tackle these sickening attacks, but this could change with proposed reforms of wildlife law and policing. The RSPB believes a consultation of wildlife protection legislation being conducted by the Law Commission provides a golden opportunity to address the problem of illegal bird of prey killing in England and Wales; but we need people to add their names to our campaign, rejecting a future where lead shot and poison steals away our natural inheritance. The more people that write to the Law Commission, the greater our chance of securing a richer countryside for us and future generations to enjoy. We've more information online, but do mention in your letter that you want an end to the killing, increased fines or longer jail-terms and crucially the ability to prosecute those who instruct others to kill on their behalf. Further information on how to respond to the Law Commission's consultation on its review of wildlife crime, is available at www.rspb.org.uk/lawsforwildlife.

The report, Birdcrime 2011, provides a full account of the birds of prey and owls found dead as a result of persecution across the UK as well as details of wildlife crime prosecutions. The report reveals a total of 461 incidents were recorded last year. This level of persecution is having a serious impact on some bird of prey populations. The hen harrier, which can often be found wintering in parts of the south east, was down to one breeding pair in England in 2012 despite there being enough habitat to support over 300 pairs. Miss Stokes added: "How much longer will we be able to enjoy the sights of wintering hen harriers across the south east without the introduction of tougher laws and penalties for wildlife offenders? While the south east only accounts for a relatively small proportion of birdcrime across the UK, which is something we should be proud of, even one incident is still one too many."

High Halstow Cricket Club - Autumn 2012

The 2012 cricket season is, for a number of reasons, best forgotten. Whilst there was more success for the colts, especially the U13s who won the Medway Youth League Cup and had a very successful league season, the weather was, as they say, the big winner. Almost one third of all our fixtures were rained off which was particularly galling given the excellent condition of the pitches at the beginning of April. The upshot of all these lost fixtures was that no team really got going until the end of July, by which tie the colts season was over and the adult sides were very short of cricket – and league points.

The 1st and 2nd XIs were relegated from their respective third divisions of the Kent League, while the 3rd XI held their own in Division 1B (Central), finishing mid-table. However, not enough games were played to be confident of the relative abilities of the teams in the league.

Cricket is facing great difficulties, not just in High Halstow but at grass roots level nationwide. The weather had a huge detrimental effect on bar and other income, whilst the loss of coaching and playing time for colts can never be recovered. In addition the dramatic increase in the level of interest in the game following the 2005 Ashes victory has run its course. The Olympics legacy has not, seemingly, included cricket. Other, cheaper, options have been the major beneficiaries. There are examples across Kent of clubs reducing the number of teams they field, conceding games due to shortages of players and struggling to find umpires, scorers and the other volunteers the game requires to thrive. Television money does find its way down to the bottom of the food chain, but these scraps have to be fought over – nothing comes for nothing! We need to work hard at raising our own funds from events and sponsorship.

We have registered for NatWest Cricket Force, which sets out to pull club and community together to prepare facilities for the new season. The main event is in early April 2013 but our next season starts with the annual general meeting, to be held in the pavilion of 23rd November. The meeting is open to all members and prospective members, and provides an opportunity for players and volunteers to step forward and get involved. Like a lot of activities, dividends come from the effort afforded to preparation. So winter work on the ground, equipment and fund raising is worth its weight in gold when the playing season finally arrives.

There will be a number of changes in committee membership this year, with new volunteers bringing added enthusiasm and ideas to the club. There remain plenty of opportunities for more physical, moral and financial support from beyond our boundaries. We are an all-inclusive club, and encourage everyone to join us to keep cricket alive for future generations.

Kent Police and Crime Commissioner Elections

On 15 November 2012 Kent will elect its first Police and Crime Commissioner who will be accountable for how crime is tackled across the County.

What's It all About?

Following Parliamentary approval, in September 2011 the Police and Social Responsibility Bill received Royal Assent and became an Act.

Police authorities in England and Wales will be abolished and replaced by elected Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs). This will create a new style of police governance which has been designed to strengthen the relationship between the police and the communities they serve.

On 15 November 2012 an election will be held to recruit a Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) who will be accountable for how crime is tackled across Kent.

The Commissioner will:

- set the priorities for Kent police
- respond to the needs and demands of the community
- ensure that priorities are suitably funded by setting a budget and the local precept
- hold to account the Chief Constable for the delivery and performance of the force.

The Commissioner will not be expected to run the police but will be the voice of the people and will be able to hold the police to account.

The Elected PCC will take office on 22 November 2012


