High Halstow Hikers

In October Ian Deal led us on a lovely varied autumn walk starting from Shipbourne Church.

Fifteen of us followed well-made tracks (for which we were grateful after the recent rain) to lghtham Mote which is a fantastically well-preserved medieval manor house which can be appreciated from the public footpaths. We found that the National Trust cafeteria there is also worth a visit for mid-morning refreshment. A moderate incline along the Greensands Way led us past Cinderfield, Greyberry and Elder Woods and as the woodland opened we had views south and east to May's Folly at Hadlow and of Tonbridge slightly further away. We dropped down through woods and avoided the challenge of a long muddy path across a field by skirting the edge of the field. Lunch at the Chaser Inn at the end of the walk was welcome and very good.

Our November walk will start as usual at 10.00am but will be on SATURDAY 8th to avoid clashing with Remembrance Day. We will start from the Car Park at Cliffe Church which is simple to find by following the B2000 into the centre of the village. We will do a flat marshland walk to the river bank that could well be muddy in places.

Resume Of The Parish Council Meeting Held On 8 October 2014

The meeting held on 8th October was attended by 7 of the 9 councillors. Chris Watson was on holiday and Stuart Bailey was away for work. It was also attended by 14 members of the public. Prior to the start of the meeting, the prize-winners for the annual photographic competition were announced and certificates presented.

High up on the agenda was the skateboard/scooter half pipe. Following concerns about noise expressed at the previous meeting, Stuart had been to see an installation by the same manufacturer at Culverstone and had reported there was little noise. The Chairman of St James Isle of Grain Parish Council had also said they had a half pipe of the same design and manufacture, although bigger and that they had not had any complaints. A final decision was taken and it will now go ahead. The half pipe is now on order, but it will be a few weeks before it will be installed and this will be weather dependent.

Quotations had been received to install a new fence at the far end of the Recreation Ground by the "horse field". It will be the same as that already surrounding the cricket pitch. There was a split vote on this as two councillors were of the opinion that the same job could be done for less money, but the proposal to go ahead with one of the quotes was carried by a majority of 5 votes to 2. As yet we do not have a date for the work to be carried out.

The blocked drain in the hall car park has been cleared but some remedial work needs doing and the same contractor will carry out the work shortly. It was suggested that the entrances to the car park are "in" and "out". This arose some years ago and it was never decided which would be the "in" and which would be the "out" with arguments being received for each of the options. Brian Williams is investigating further.

Parents at the school have been campaigning for a safer crossing between the school and the car park. An option being suggested is a raised platform to slow traffic down and consultation on this will be in the Times.

The work done on the public footpath between Ruggles Close and the Recreation Ground was discussed. Two soakaways have been installed but clearly they aren't doing the job sufficiently well. Medway's Public Rights of Way Officer is willing to install an all-weather surface similar to the all-weather path at the other side of the field. This would run the full length of the public footpath from The Street to Ruggles Close. The Parish Council would be asked to make a contribution to the cost. A decision will be taken at the next meeting.

There is ragwort on Forge Common and it is a legal requirement for landowners to deal with the problem. Concern had been expressed that the wild flower meadow might be affected, but a specialist contractor, who identifies and deals with just the ragwort has been found. The work will be over a 2-year period as the plant is a biennial.

Unusually, there were no planning applications. The other item to mention is that the audit of the Parish Council's finances and procedures for the year to 31st March 2014 has been successfully concluded.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 12th November at 8pm in the Memorial Hall.

Noisy Scooters/Motorbikes

A number of complaints have been made about scooters and motorbikes racing around parts of the village, particularly around early and late evening. The bikes are known to be loud and a nuisance especially when young children are being put to bed and trying to sleep. It is thought that the motorcyclists live in the village and are not passing through but riding around as fun. Please could whoever is responsible for these bikes/or are the parents of the young adults responsible for the bikes ask the riders to be more considerate to other residents in the village. *HH Parish Council*

Proposed Uncontrolled Crossing

Following concerns from local parents with regard to the speed of through traffic on The Street, that poses a risk to pupils and parents during school arrival and egress, a proposal is being designed to introduce a traffic calming measure outside the school.


A traffic calming proposal has now been prepared to help limit through speeds at this location and assist pedestrian movements. It is proposed to have a raised table with a 4m crossing area for parents and pupils, near the school entrance between the entry/exit points to the surgery opposite, as shown in the drawing below.

10 Facts about 5 November.

Bonfire Night rolls around again next week, but how much do you actually know about bonfires, fireworks and everything else that surrounds the event?

Here are ten facts you might not know about 5th November.

1. A firework can travel at speeds of up to 150mph, the same as some biplanes.

2. The name "bonfire" derives from the term "bone fire"; in the Middle Ages, these types of fires were usually set up in order to burn bones.

3. Up until 1959, it was illegal to NOT celebrate Bonfire Night in the UK.

4. There is at least one school in York taking advantage of the lifting of this law; St Peter's School was attended by one Guy Fawkes, and they refuse to burn his effigy as a mark of respect for their former pupil.

5. In an average year, there will be just under a thousand injuries caused by fireworks during October and November in the UK. Around half of these are children injured by fireworks or sparklers.

6. Fireworks were actually invented by accident; in the 10th century, a Chinese cook accidentally mixed three common cooking ingredients (sulphur, charcoal and a salt substitute) and set it alight, which resulted in very colourful flames.

7. Fireworks first reached Europe in the 14th century, and were initially produced by the Italians; the first recorded display took place in Florence.

7. The first recorded fireworks display in England was at the wedding of Henry VII in 1486.

9. Had Guy Fawkes managed to light the 2500kg of gunpowder underneath the Houses of Parliament, he would've caused damage within a radius of almost 500 metres.

10. Calls to fire services across Britain can almost triple during Bonfire Night. Be sure to stay safe!

The Firework Code

- · Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves
- · Never give sparklers to a child under 5 years old
- · Buy fireworks marked BS 7114
- · Keep fireworks in a closed box
- \cdot Follow the instructions on each firework
- · Light them at arm's length, using a taper
- · Stand well back
- · Never go back to a lit firework
- \cdot Never put fireworks in your pocket
- · Never throw fireworks
- · Keep pets indoors.

Woodland Management – Northward Hill

The RSPB owns Northward Hill, and the nature reserve is one of the oldest in the charity's history. The nature reserve comprises a variety of habitats, the majority of which is lowland wet grassland (grazing marsh), but we also have pools, scrubland and woodland. The nature reserve is managed for biodiversity and this is achieved through a corresponding variety of land management. Most of the reserve is a working farm, and the livestock, while providing wool and beef, are a vital component for breeding and wintering birds. We allow access to 10% of the reserve so that people can connect with nature; this is one of the RSPB's charitable objectives. Most of the woodland is a sanctuary area for breeding birds because evidence shows that dogs displace nesting for a wide area alongside paths because most small woodland birds nest quite close to the ground, particularly nightingales. That said, a good proportion of the wood has open paths that provide great walks connecting High Halstow village with the reserve and the unique vista across the marshes to London and Essex.

As a responsible landowner that has public access to our nature reserves we have to ensure that our trails are as safe as possible, we have to ensure that our trees are healthy and not a danger to the public. In the main this is about trees along nature trails that are assessed as having the potential to cause harm. This doesn't necessarily mean trees that are away from the nature trails where we are quite happy for them to become more 'dangerous' in a managed way, because dead and dying trees have a huge amount of benefit for woodland invertebrates. especially beetles.

Trees have a lifespan, albeit a long



one, but they come to an end eventually and we have to act where trees show indications of becoming a danger. We are regularly inspected by an independent tree safety advisor who will mark those trees identified as potential dangers. Trees that are marked are monitored for further signs of deterioration. If the trees deteriorate further we have to lop branches or fell them.

You may feel that removing what are lovely trees is extreme, but as autumn gales return we have already seen in the news this year fatalities due to falling timber. We do not want visitors to suffer injuries whilst enjoying their time on our reserves and we must also ensure there is no cause for people to bring a claim against us, especially spurious claims, because that is poor stewardship of our members' money.

Due to the loss of woodlands across the UK, and most particularly in Medway (as documented by the Dickens' Countryside Protection Society), the natural processes that would have kept our woodlands healthy for a broad diversity of nature no-longer function in the small pockets of trees that are left, therefore man has to actively manage woods to keep them in good shape. In the past, lightning strike and storms would have brought large trees to the ground creating natural glades and native herbivores would also have kept growth in check.



Northward Hill is too small to experience nature's natural influences upon a forest so, in the interests of the wildlife we still do have, we undertake management that replicates these processes. We have an annual programme of coppicing and felling of small areas. All forestry work follows the reserve management plan, produced in consultation with regional and national RSPB woodland ecologists and with Natural England, the statutory body governing the management of Sites of Special Scientific Interest such as this.

What does the management entail and how is it good for nature? We have been removing sycamores, which are a non-native species that



supports less wildlife than native species. We also thin-out oaks, which become skinny and rank if too densely packed and this permits the remaining oaks to broaden into mature trees that support more life, in particular colonies of the purple hairstreak butterfly. Felling selected trees and widening the rides lets sunlight in and this stimulates the growth of a greater variety of woodland shrubs, nettles, and flowers like dog violets, primroses and yellow archangel. This is habitat for an assemblage of invertebrates: caterpillars, butterflies, bees, moths and dragonflies. Butterflies need the direct warmth of the sun and we now see the spectacular silverwashed fritillary and white-letter hairstreaks in the glades, we hope to attract back the white admiral. This vegetation management and the invertebrate

food for birds is crucial for three bird species in particular that have very strict requirements when it comes to trees: Nightingales, turtle doves and cuckoos, all of which are suffering serious population crashes in the UK. Nightingales will use regenerating scrub (small trees) of an age between 2-8 years old, whilst turtle doves use an age range of 7-14 years old. By selectively coppicing and felling trees on a 14-year cycle we provide the precise conditions for these breeding birds. Over the last couple of years our nightingales have increased to 29 pairs in and around the wood - the highest that this has ever been. Unfortunately, our turtle doves are not faring so well and have dwindled to one pair last year. We believe that this is a result of the decline in the wider countryside and problems that they experience on migration. However, we will continue to do what we can for this species including the sewing of special seed crops on the reserve (near the view point). Cuckoos



feed on hairy caterpillars such as red admirals and small tortoise shells, the rides and glades support this important food source and we had six calling cuckoos at Northward Hill this year! The focus on woodland management has also brought back at least one pair of breeding treecreepers and lesser-spotted woodpeckers after an absence of decades, so there is strong evidence that our management is, on the whole, working.

The undesirable effects of woodland management for visitors are short-term, the work can be noisy and it can look harsh until the vegetation returns in the spring, the benefits however are great and varied. The firewood we gather is good quality and its sale to the public supports the management. Most of the work is undertaken by volunteers and at Northward Hill we run a one-year internship programme. Interns live in the farmhouse and the RSPB pays for their training to achieve national certifications in the use of chainsaws, brush-cutters, quad bikes and tractors. In the last two years nine have gone straight into full-time warden jobs including RSPB The Blean, Rainham Marshes, and the Dee Estuary. Otherwise our volunteers are from the local community, and work each Thursday with the wardens on site.
