Proposed development in High Halstow by Redrow.

Surely Medway Council's own policies should prevent this: Development in the Countryside 3.4.71:

As a valuable resource, the countryside needs to be protected for its own sake. The loss of countryside to encroaching urbanising development must, therefore, be resisted.

Also a slightly more imaginatve look at Chattenden may yield interim brownfield development land:

A new direction for town planning coming from a national level, with the intent of bringing about an urban renaissance through an emphasis on regeneration of derelict and previously used land (brownfield sites) before developing fresh land in the countryside or on the edge of urban areas (greenfield sites).

I note they seem to have ignored these policies along the A228 at Four Elms Hill and Mierscourt Road, Rainham. Time they "did the right thing".

Food Bank

As a result of hold ups in the benefit system and the uncertainty of no-hours contracts, many more people are needing to make use of Food Banks to feed themselves and their families. A list of the things needed is supplied and updated regularly the latest one is as follows:

Fruit juice, dried/powdered milk, UHT long-life milk, coffee, spreads sweet or savoury, cereal (small boxes please), tinned sponge puddings, packet desserts, tinned fruit, sugar 500g, custard, cooking or pasta sauce, baby food, instant mash potato, cup-a-soup, tinned fish, chocolate or sweets, Washing powder or

Liquid (Small), washing up liquid (small), shampoo, men's and women's deodorant, shaving foam.

In High Halstow we have three collection points so if you can help with any of the items listed can you please either leave them:

Parish Council News

Resume of the Parish Council meeting held on 11th October 2017

The meeting held on 11th October was back to a normal meeting with the usual agenda. Cllr Khatkar was unable to attend due to family circumstances. The "public gallery" was occupied by 3 parishioners.

There were four planning applications, two were straightforward and there were no objections. One was for the stationing of a residential caravan with amenity block on land in Sharnal Street and the Parish Council objected to this on the grounds of an extra dwelling in the open countryside, contrary to planning policy. The fourth was for an extension on a property which had been refused before in 2009 and the Parish Council has objected on the same grounds as the earlier refusal.

Grants were made to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal for the poppy wreath to be laid on Remembrance Sunday and to the Heronsbank Residents Committee towards the replacement of the bridge across the ditch at the front of the houses. This is the only access for the postman, visitors etc. and the bridge is becoming dangerous. They were given advice on where else they could go to apply for grants.

There were the usual complaints about shrubs from gardens overhanging the pavements. Please think about pedestrians and cut back your overhanging vegetation. Other highway complaints concerned speeding Clarke's Coaches in Roper's Lane and traffic speeding out of the village in Cooling Road. Please remember this is a 30mph

limit road, even if there are no repeat signs – the presence of the street lights is enough to confirm the limit.

Sadly the Youth Club hadn't opened after the summer holidays due to lack of helpers – not only on club nights, but behind the scenes. If you can help in any way, please contact Chris Peek.

The presentation by Redrow last month gave food for thought about how to ensure any developments are sustainable. The formulation of a Neighbourhood Plan was discussed. This is a lengthy process, involving villagers under the guidance of the Parish Council and finally a referendum to show that residents agree with it. When finalised, it then becomes part of planning guidance and will help control what happens in the village. We are hoping to get a speaker from a parish that is going through the process to our next or a future meeting to enlighten us further.

Finally, it's sad to say we've experienced vandalism to our lovely new bus shelters. Please explain to your children that what they think is amusing or clever costs you in terms of the money needed for repairs. An article about this is elsewhere of this publication.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 8th November in the Memorial Hall, starting at 8pm. The photographic competition prizes will be presented and next year's calendar will be launched. Everyone is welcome.

We have almost 'hit the target' for our new

village sign. It has now been ordered and we recently received confirmation. It will be in cast aluminium, double sided and will be handmade and hand painted with sign writers enamel paint. This process prevents it from corrosion and will create a long lasting finish. The panel will be set in a stove enamel mild steel frame with wrought iron scrollwork and will have an English Oak Post. This will be our own unique village sign and because of its very nature extremely labour intensive. Because of this and other work commitments we may not take delivery until April 2019. It is being made by a small family business specialising in Village Signs and every one they make is completely handmade and hand finished to order. We hope to erect it opposite the Church on the grass triangle We will keep you informed of its progress as we receive it, the rest we will keep secret until the unveiling.

We have been very busy during the summer fund raising for this event with a Strawberry Tea, a Fashion Show and a Halloween Tea Party all of which have been very well supported.

Our monthly meetings are held in the Memorial Hall on the first Wednesday of each month at 7.30pm. At most meetings throughout the year we have a speaker, some business and social time with refreshments. We are a very friendly bunch and welcome any one to come along

Rye Street Farm Equestrian Centre (RSFEC)









Rye Street Farm Equestrian Centre (RSFEC) is a family run business owned by Keith and Jackie Loveridge. Hannah is the Riding School Manager and has full BH SAI, INTSM, UKCC2 Riding Instructor Qualifications.

RSFEC has a great reputation within the horse riding community and also have an excellent relationship with the Vets because of their smooth running operation.

There are two sand schools – one inside and one outside with a further outside school being considered. RSFEC have during the past few years installed a horse walker to help with exercising the horses at certain times of the year.

All riding school ponies and horses are in-house schooled for the riding lesson s and all are safe. RSFEC breed from their own mares and bring on the youngsters themselves with only a short break away for external Trainers for further experience for the young ponies/horses.

The age range for riding lessons for children is from 4 onwards. RSFEC also have many older riders returning to riding after not having ridden for many years. Most the lessons are female dominated but there are also boys who go along and they make great riders.

Apart from Hannah, RESE have 2 other Instructors and two further Instructors in training. The Trainee Instructors are in apprenticeship with Hannah and will qualify early in 2018 after taking Level 3 diplomas in Horse Care and Management and Grooming pathway.

Apart from Instructors, Hannah has several staff on the yard, whom are responsible for the day to day tasks of mucking out, filling hay nets and grooming the ponies and horses daily apart from sweeping the yards. They keep the yard running smoothly which has resulted in RSFEC receiving a high approval rating from Medway Council.

Apart from learning to ride RSFEC also offer jumping lessons to the relevant standard of the rider. Everything revolves around health and safety.

RSFEC is also a Pony Club Centre. This year RSFEC provided Pony Club members with Pony Camp during the school holidays. This year, for the first time and after much nagging from the adults, Hannah organised an Adult Camp, which was very well received. Adult Camp for 2018 has already been arranged for 31st August – 2nd September 2018 with riders clambering for a place.

On most Sundays Hannah helps her young charges from Pony Camp in loading their horses into horse trailers and taking them to jumping or dressage events, throughout Kent.

Although RSFEC is closed on Mondays for riding lessons, work carries on 7 days per week to care for the equines.

RSFEC provide full livery, part livery and a very limited grass livery service. Places are generally filled and well sought after. If you wanted to livery at RSFEC then you would more than likely have to put your name on the waiting list. Depending on livery required, horses are groomed daily by staff and mucked out.

All liveried horses have monthly back checks from a qualified therapist. Vetting checks are regular for vaccinations etc. The Farrier is also scheduled for regular shoeing or trimming for those that are not shod. The Saddler is scheduled on a regular basis to ensure that all the riding school saddles fit correctly and that the riding school ponies and horses are not in any pain during their lessons.

Children from as young as 4 will get excellent instruction on how to ride whilst being in a very safe environment. RSFEC go that extra mile to ensure that children get the best start in their riding career.

RSFEC are fully insured with all necessary licences from Medway Council.





Riding hats can be hired on site. The hats are upgraded regularly to comply with the relevant safety standards.

Hannah has trained and then sold ponies and horses on for new owners to either hack or compete.

Hannah's day starts on the school at 7.00 a.m. and she doesn't finish her day on the school until at least 7.00 p.m. or even 8.00 p.m. on most days.

It seems that the peninsula and surrounding villages are lucky to have such a well run, respected Riding School in the vicinity!

Elyse Wilkinson, who lives in High Halstow has a horse who is liveried at RSFEC.

"I have been riding for 7 years and Flyer is my own horse. We have always had Flyer at RSFEC and wouldn't have it any other way because he is so happy there and the team are extremely trustworthy. Also Rye street has the best teachers and facilities locally, in our opinion.

Whilst being at Rye street I have found a passion for horses and animals and hopefully one day I will become a large animal vet."

High Halstow Youth Club – Update

In September the Youth Club Steering Committee decided that the start of term would be delayed because there were not enough people to share the responsibilities that are needed to run the club safely and successfully.

Letters were delivered to parents explaining why the delay was happening and asking for parents to volunteer to help run the club; a list of outstanding "jobs" was included in that letter.

Two weeks later a second letter was delivered to parents explaining that the Youth Club would remain closed for the remainder of September and throughout October until after the schools' autumn break.

The Steering Committee was disappointed with the response received from the two letters and is now considering how to resolve the problem.

It is sad to think that the Youth Club might close after all these years (it opened in April 1993). As well as affecting the local children the Club's closure would also adversely affect the running of the Village Hall, due to the loss of regular rental income.

Down to earth gardening tips

NOVEMBER Plant Profile: Fritililaria Meleagris [Snake's Head Fritillary]

Origin: Europe to West Siberia in the Liliaceae

family.

Type: Perennial bulb

Likes: Moist well-drained soil of any type and any aspect in full sun or partial shade.

Features: Bell-shaped purple flowers, chequered with pink that nod in the breeze. Can also come with white flowers which look nice mixed together with the purple ones. Leaves are blue-green and lance-shaped.

General: Plant the delicate bulbs up to the end of November deeply (four times the depth of the bulb), or buy the plants in pots in the Spring. They look lovely naturalised in grass, a wildflower patch or in a cottage garden. Beware of lily beetle! Lily beetles do like them so be on the lookout and pick them off very carefully as the little beasts like to drop off onto the ground and disappear, but growing these pretty fritillaries are well worth the effort.

Some other things to do this month:

• Makes some gorgeous leafmould. First collect fallen leaves, then while they are still damp put them into a container: black sack with some holes punched in; a wireframe; a plastic barrel with ventilation. Wait for about a year and you will have a lovely dark brown mixture which can be used as mulch or dug in. Don't

mix with pine needles though - they can be kept separately for an acidic mulch for ericaceous plants.

- Plant up winter containers. Lots of lovely colourful plants are available to cheer up winter days: winter heathers, violas and skimmias. Plant together with some evergreens and grasses.
- Plant tulips this month. One of the prettiest I think is soft pink double 'Angelique'. It flowers in May.
- Sow broad beans and keep them under a cloche.
- Bring in tender plants under cover.

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
High Halstow Hikers

We benefited from the amazingly warm autumn sunshine and dry footpaths for our October walk that used some less frequented paths around High Halstow. Over 20 walkers left the village car-park and took the short path from Christmas Lane that passes to the fields to the south between the cricket field and the post-office. We walked across sloping grassy field and over the railway bridge at Solomon's Farm then followed tracks and paths around the edge of the fields to the roundabout at the top of Roper's Lane. After taking the path parallel to Ratcliffe Highway we headed to Angel Farm, the HQ of Hells Angels Kent. We then walked along Ropers Green Lane, which forms part of Saxon Shoreway, all the way to Fenn Corner. Along this route we were treated to many butterflies flitting along the hedges and what looked like dogfight between 4 of the large model aircraft that were flying from their airstrip near Beluncle Farm. After walking through the attractive group of large houses at Bellwood Court we took the road to Newlands Farm and then re-joined another part of the Saxon Shore way back to the village via Forge Common.

The meaning of names behind roads in High Halstow

Britannia Road	The road was named after a public house situated near the junction of Clinch Street and what for many years was known as Fenn Road. The public house was a coaching inn and the buildings nearby were the stables for the change of horses. Unfortunately it was burned down in the early fifties. It had been a private house from the early nineteen hundreds.
Christmas	The name is thought to come from "Christmas Mass",
Lane Clinch	the road leading to St Margaret's Church Named after the hamlet
Street	Named after the namet
Cooling Road	Leading to Lipwell Hill being the only road from High Halstow to Cooling Village. Local inhabitants sometimes called Cooling Road Dalham Hill.
Decoy Road	The road leading to Decoy Farm which in the early days was much larger and had a large manor type house. The road continues on to Swigshole, which again had a number of houses. Here the road ends and the footpaths to the sea wall begins as footpath RS5
Drayton Close	Named after a local farmer and dairyman who had a farm where the school playing field is now. He was a herdsman and dairyman. There was a dairy at Fenn. He used to bring the cows down every day and milk them to the field where the school is now. His family delivered milk to the local villages with the dairy being at Beech Croft, Sharnal Street.
Dux Court Road	Named after Dux Court farm. Old maps have shown this sometimes as "Ducks Court"
Eden Road	Was named after Anthony Eden, Prime Minister of Great Britain from 1955 to 1957 who was later to become Lord Avon.
Forge Lane	In which was the local forge since demolished for further housing. It had previously been called "The Square"
Goodwood Close	Named after the previous landowner's enthusiasm for horse racing
Harrison Drive	This road was named after the local farmer from Dux Court Farm, who was also Chairman of the Parish Council and benefactor to the village in a very large way, one of his many gifts being the recreation ground.
Holmes close	Named after May Holmes who lived in the village area all her life. A great collector for charity with the Red Cross, Cancer Relief and the Air Ambulance being just three of the recipients. In her later years she was Treasurer, Secretary and Caretaker of the Memorial Hall. As a schoolgirl she and her sister walked to and from Hoo School every day.
Leaman Close	Named after the local nurse and midwife who lived in the village for a number of years. Nurse Leaman was the district nurse for the Peninsula and delivered all the babies on the peninsula. She rode everywhere on her å bicycle to start with and then the village clubbed together and bought her a car! It was garaged behind the Old Forge – where the MHS flats. She lived in Jubilee Cottages. On leaving the village she opened Mill House Nursing Home at Lower Stoke.

Longfield Avenue	Named after the Reverend Longfield, Rector of St Margaret's for a number of years
Marsh Crescent	Was named after Jim Marsh, a local farmer. Living in the village, he farmed Brick House Farm on the road to Allhallows. He was a long serving member of the Parish Council being Chairman for his last term in office. In addition he was also a founder member of the Recreation Hall.
Ruggles	Named after the doctor who lived in the village for a
drive	number of years. He was the doctor who started the surgery in the Recreation Hall shortly after it was built.
Topley Drive	Named after Bert Topley who lived in High Halstow all his life. An early member of the Memorial Hall Committee until near his death. He was a long-standing member of the Parish Council being Chairman for part of his time. He lived in Jubilee Cottages.
Valentine Drive	Named after the former Kent County Cricket Club Captain, Brian Valentine, who lived in what was known as the Old Vicarage for a number of years.
Medway Avenue	Named after the River Medway
Northwood Avenue	The Northwood comes from the name of the woods on the hill, Northward Hill, known to some local people as the Norrad, now owned by the RSPB
Sharnal Street Road	Was named after the hamlet of Sharnal Street. The road is now part of the Ratcliffe Highway. It was also access to Sharnal Street Railway Station, which was closed in 1962.
Sharnal Street	The name is a little insulting to the people living there as the name is derived from the old English "Scean Welle" which quite simply means the stream running near the rubbish tip.
Thames Avenue	Named after the River Thames
The Street	This road name originated from the village itself, which was known as High Halstow Street. This was one of four hamlets in the area, the others three being Fenn Street, Clinch Street and Sharnal Street. Fenn Street was later transferred to St Mary's Hoo during a boundary change.
Willowbank Drive	So named because a number of willow trees had to be removed from the end of the field on which the estate was built.
Wybournes Lane	Named after the farm at the end
Buckhole Farm Road	Again named after the farm at the end
Half Moon &, Gypsy Way, Cardigan & Mackintosh Close	Named by the developer and Medway Council who made a mistake not using the names put forward by the Parish
