The Villager

The Villager Community Bus was set up for the Peninsular Villages as a Community Bus for days out. It was funded for 5 years by a transport grant from the Government and operated by Medway Council. The grant has now finished and Medway Norse have agreed to continue to operate it but it has to pay its way.

We have until June to turn it around. If it gets axed it will never be brought back so its use it or lose it.

It is operated with volunteer drivers and at the present time there is a severe lack of drivers. If you would like to volunteer please get in touch with Norse.

I have met with the MD of Norse and he has purchased a new vehicle to use but recently there has been a spate of bookings being cancelled at the last minute resulting in bookings going below 10 people and the day out is cancelled. People are disappointed, this is a life line for some. Membership is £12 a year and the trips are reasonably priced. Owing to last minute cancellations Norse are going to introduce a pay when you book system and tickets are going to be non refundable. Hopefully this will weed out those making bookings and cancelling (we know who they are and discussions are underway to remove them from booking if they do it again. It's the same 3/4 people, one drops out they all drop out).

This is a service for all to use and there is nothing stopping Norse operating trips through school holidays with their buses. Its open to anyone. Bums on seats are needed.

Community groups pay £27 a year membership. They can hire the bus(es) for their use. Hoo WI hired it to go to Eastbourne in the summer. It worked out about £13 each.

Parish Council News

Resume of the Parish Council meeting held on 8th November 2017

The meeting held on 8th November was attended by all parish councillors and four members of the public.

There were two planning applications. A response of "no objection" was made to one and Gary Jerreat would look at the other before a comment was made, due to a reported objection about roof lights from the resident of a property across the street.

George again raised the issue of the parish undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan. This is a planning matter that can eventually become part of planning guidance within the Local Plan and gives the parish a degree of control over the type of development and where it can be allowed. Cliffe and Cliffe Woods Parish Council is in the middle of doing one at the moment. They have been asked to speak to a meeting on their experience so far. We hope this will be at December's meeting, but if not, at the January meeting.

There had been an exhibition by Redrow that afternoon on their plans for about 70 dwellings on land off Britannia Road, adjacent to Willowbank Drive and Longfield Avenue. Those who had visited had been disappointed about the calibre of the Redrow representatives.

There is some welding to be done to a couple of play items on the Recreation Ground and the cost of this work was approved.

The "Home of the Heron" signs at the entrances to the village need refurbishing or replacing and it was agreed to do this.

You may have noticed vandalism to our smart new bus shelters. The repairs are now done. It was emphasised that vandalism must be reported to the police, however trivial it may seem – by reporting it, a picture will be built up and it will be easier for the police to deal with it. It is planned to replace the remaining metal bus shelters with wooden one next year, which includes moving the shelter by the vet's to

replace the ancient one on the A228 near the roundabout. Brian Williams has discovered there are grants available to help with the cost. Brian will also apply to the High Halstow Community Lottery for part funding of the new bus shelters.

Martin Andrews reported on a Community Safety Partnership drop-in meeting he attended. He mentioned the van parked inconsiderately in Gypsy Way. He learnt that Kent Police was expecting the numbers of PCSOs to rise by January.

A question was asked about Neighbourhood Watch in the village and Linda Atkinson volunteered to contact the police about it.

George put forward the idea of number plate recognition CCTV at the entrances to the village. Mick O'Hanlon volunteered to investigate.

The Youth Club has now opened and will meet fortnightly until Christmas, after which it will be reviewed. They still need adult helpers of all kinds.

The Chairman and Vice-chairman attended a school assembly and presented the prizes for the poetry competition to commemorate the end of the First World War. It is intended that a plaque will be made of the winning poem to be put up in the Memorial Hall.

There has been a suggestion that poppies could be put on lampposts next year, when Armistice Day will be on Remembrance Sunday and it will also be the centenary of the end of the war.

You may have noticed an advertisement for a new parish clerk. The Clerk will be retiring at the end of May next year and it's been decided to recruit her replacement as soon as possible to ensure a good hand-over period

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 13th December in the Memorial Hall, starting at 8pm. Everyone is welcome.

High Halstow Parish Council is seeking to recruit a Clerk, who is the Proper Officer and Responsible Financial Officer of the Council. The Council consists of 9 elected councillors and employs 2 street cleaners in addition to the Clerk.

The post involves working from home.

The Clerk will be employed part-time for 10 hours/ week, which will include some evenings and occasional weekends or public holidays. Salary range is £28,822 - £33,437, pro rata and starting salary will be according to experience and qualifications.

Candidates will have a good standard of education; be able to write minutes of meetings and reports; be able to handle the Council's finances; be able to supervise staff and be conversant with Microsoft Word and Excel.

He/she will preferably hold the CiLCA or other relevant qualification, although training will be given and CPD is encouraged. The Council is considering undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan.

The current Clerk retires in May 2018 and there will be a hand-over period. Closing date for applications 22nd December, with interviews in January and appointment as soon as possible thereafter.






FRIENDS OF ST MARGARET'S **Christmas Tree Festival 2017**

All training is good training

Being it jogging or working out or in the gym, field or track, or team sports, all are good for your physical health.

Down to earth gardening tips

CHRISTMAS PLANT PROFILE: Ilex aquifolium [Common holly] llex altaclerencis 'Golden King' llex aguifolium 'Silver Queen'

llex aquifolium grows easily on any soil and any aspect. You get red berries on pollinated female trees. But try llex altaclerencis 'Golden King' that has golden edged leaves and red berries and is a smaller bushier tree or shrub. Ilex aquifolium 'Silver Queen' is also a smaller bushy tree, the leaves have broad cream margins but this one does not have red berries.

Strangely enough, 'Golden King' is a female plant and has berries and 'Sliver Queen' is a male plant!

Things to do this month out in the garden when the sun is shining:

- If you are keeping tender plants overwinter in the garden, ensure that they have a dry mulch such as chipped bark around them. I like to think that I'm tucking them up in a warm blanket!
- Plant blueberries in pots with ericaceous compost; grow two different types so they cross pollinate.
- Leave the flower heads on your hydrangeas until spring to protect buds from frost,
- Gather up fallen leaves from under roses to reduce the risk of disease next year.
- Make sure the ties on climbing plants are secure.
- There's still time to plant tulips you can get some bargains now.

- Lift and divide clumps of rhubarb.
- Keep some garden fleece at hand to cover precious plants should the weather turn really bad.
- If you haven't already done so, clean the greenhouse out ready for an early start in spring and if you are keeping plants in the greenhouse, don't forget to give them a little water now and then but sparingly.
- And, if you are feeling like doing something energetic to use up those excessive calories, spike your lawn all over with a garden fork to improve drainage.

High Halstow Hikers

The weather in the hours before our November walk was horrible and resulted in a smaller group of 9 of us meeting at Mote Park, Maidstone. We were, in fact, rewarded by the rain ceasing a few minutes before we started and, although there was little sun, we did not get wet.

Our spirits had already been lifted by the welcoming thick carpet of golden leaves along the avenue at the main entrance to the park. The route took us around the north and east sides of the park and

through a short stretch of housing to reach open countryside and then on to the small attractive church of St Nicholas

striking house about half-a-mile further on had appeared on TV because of it being short-listed by RIBA as a potential House of the Year. We therefore walked to see this and could appreciate the very unusual roofs of the cubic-like take on a cluster of oast houses (but not much more). Close to Stoneacre we stopped at a very unusual village sign that features many tools and was labelled as "The tools that shaped our village" (see photo). The return took us around the south side of the park

to complete a walk of a little more than 8 miles.

All of us had visited Mote Park before but like most people had not ventured far from the lake. We were struck by just how large the park is (440 acres) with a great variety of landscape ranging from purposely swamp-like areas to the splendid developed area around Mote House and wideopen spaces for all sorts of recreation giving views to the North Downs in the distance. Moving beyond the main hub of the park provides a rewarding experience: a circular walk around it can easily take well over an hour.

Snowfall during Christmas 1987

The village was cut-off for about 4 days, although it seemed longer. A farmer bought us in a load of bread from the Highway, where the Bakers lorry had got to! My wife and daughter, tied rope to the bread trays and dragged the bread all round the village to the elderly and where they knew young babies were. Needless to say being offered a drink at most stops, they were pretty well plastered when they got back.

The Army arrived by Snow-cats, dragging trailers filled with food from Tesco's main store, which was a lot of top end supplies, that there own stores didn't need. We didn't have a clue at the prices, so we guessed, (on the low side, as it happens), and when the bill arrived, months later, we were out by a couple of hundred quid. Luckily the village charity stepped in and helped us out.

The Secretary of State flew in by Helicopter with his entourage and camera crew. The army had to take out some of the supplies they had delivered so that he could be seen helping to deliver the food to the needy. As far as I remember, gas & electricity were not affected very much.

This all happened because the EU issued a directive that Farmers had to CUT DOWN THEIR HEDGEROWS, and farm up to the edges of their fields. We only had the one heavy fall of snow, which was cleared from our approach roads the first day. Then the
