

Chairman's Report

(As read out on April 9th Parish Council Meeting)

Once again it is only right that on your behalf I thank councilors and the many volunteers who give their time (and in some cases money) to maintain the community of High Halstow.

Please feel free at any time during my report to help yourself to our buffet and can I begin this report by thanking Lesley Munday for the preparation!

May I formerly welcome our Ward Councilors to our midst and take this opportunity to thank them for their continued support and finance afforded to High Halstow this year.

Thank you to Roxana our Parish Clerk for keeping us on the straight and narrow.

Thank you to Carl Mitchell editor of our High Halstow Times. I haven't had my April copy yet!! Apparently he was "holding the front page" for someone!!! I can't guess who that was...! So it's my fault if there was no April fools joke ... Or perhaps I was the April fool and he was actually holding the front page!

Carl's efforts would of course be all in vain if we didn't have the team of volunteer "paper people" secretly delivering snippets of news to each house in the village, sometimes under the cover of darkness with total disregard of personal safety. Stealthily organised by "Mr Smith"! locally known yet unnamed and very very much appreciated by all..

Thank you to Margaret Church for continuing to maintain our staff wages system. Margaret who now lives outside the village continues to be part of our community. She is very active with both our halls helping with Quiz nights and general fund raising.

Thank you to Jack and John for continuing to maintain the cleanliness of our streets. You may have noticed of late that Jack has stopped taking the sun on his bench outside the church. He has gone into hospital for a while for a planned operation this means he will be out of action for several weeks. We are being kept unto date with his progress and wish him a speedy recovery and a full return to operational duties. In the meantime John has kindly taken on some of Jack's duties.

Thank you to all our Parish Councilors for their continued support and understanding. They all undertake their many unpaid duties with a great deal of zeal and dedication.

Being a Parish Councillor does not just involve attendance here once a month. Councilors are expected to attend other meetings throughout the year. These could include:-

Visiting neighbours of planning applicants that we might understand the impact of the application, attending regular meetings of Finance, Planning, Personnel, Police Liaison, Rural Liaison and other forums and surgeries.

High Parish Council and its employees of course do not constitute the whole community of High Halstow. It is merely the final tier of government and focal point of political and statutory debate.

The real community are us as a whole... The 'Relief in Need' and 'Friends of St Margaret's' charities providing support, The School, Church, Doctors, Shop, 'Red Dog', Village Market and others providing services to the village. The Hikers, Youth, Badminton, Cricket, Deep sea fishing, Drama, Investors clubs, they all provide opportunities for residents and others to become active within the village and feel that they are part of its community.

Fundamental to any community of course must be somewhere to meet on a regular basis. We are fortunate here to have two great halls.

This, The Memorial Hall, built to celebrate the safe return of our men and women from the Great War is lovingly maintained by its Trustees, chaired by Ann Smith. The Hall of late is probably best known for its monthly over subscribed Quiz nights which provide a steady stream of additional finance to help with its upkeep. Many of us, and our children, will hold this building in their long-term memory as the place where they had their first real party.

The other, The Village (formerly Recreation) Hall just across the road was built in 1961 with donations from BP when the village went through its post war expansion. Maintenance and recent refurbishment of this hall is in the hands of its trustees under the chairmanship of Gary Thomas.

I am please to say that trustees have now completed phase two of the three phase project to bring the hall into the 21st century as a warm, inviting, safe place to meet.

Thank you to both those groups of trustees for the work they do. It is much appreciated by all but a few who have problems containing the natural effects of youth and the sudden burst in testosterone.

I must say a special thanks to one trustee in particular, Ray Collins who has seemingly dedicated his entire diary to the day-to-day maintenance of, I believe, both halls.

This year the Council resolved to budget additional monies for a youth project. We are currently considering bringing this project forward and we will of course be consulting local people as to their opinion.

I'm weary to announce that Father Christmas and his ever growing band of helpers delivered over 300 presents to both the young and the old all around the village on Christmas Eve. After already having delivered half that amount again to homes in Allhallows just two days before. I'm told it is hard work but very satisfying!

I was pleased to see that finally this year we have resolved the issues around ownership of the Britannia Road /Longfield Ave bus shelter site. The bus stop has raised some additional concerns, however it is the Council's resolve to maintain the stop in its present position for the foreseeable future.

This has brought into question ownership of other parcels of land within the village and we continue to assess costs and the need to register Parish Council ownership of these, for the benefit of the whole village.

Once again the Council has renewed its contract with Turfsoil to maintain our green spaces around the village. I am pleased to say this will include the regular cutting of grass around the graveyard at the Church.

We are now at the end of the first season of the newly ensconced **High Halstow Football Club**, who now consider the Recreation ground as their "**Home**" We have received no comments from residents and trust this return to regular organised sport on the "Rec" is a positive move.

I welcome the further new speed restrictions across the peninsula and echo residents from of the Isle Grain who say that the cameras on the A228 have drastically reduced fatalities. New road surface improvements in and around the village are a much-needed improvement too and I look forward to their completion. I note however that the dissemination of information about road closures was a little lacking, perhaps closer liaison between the Parish and Medway Councils would have helped with the confusion.

On a wider note I was very disappointed to learn that the **Ministry of Defence** and their delivery partner, **Land Securities** have submitted a revised Outline Planning Application at the end of

February to build around 5,000 homes at Lodge Hill, now the only nationally important site for nightingales.

Medway Council's Core Strategy was withdrawn at the end of last year after an independent planning inspector found that the allocation of housing at Lodge Hill was in conflict with the Government's flagship national planning policy. The proposal fails to meet the tests set out in Government policy to protect places important for wildlife. If allowed to proceed, it would set a deeply damaging precedent for many of this peninsula's most special sites for wildlife.

This Parish Council will this evening lodge its objections to this proposal.

I strongly urge you to do like wise as even if you have already objected to the former proposal, this new proposal will not take into account the objections previously submitted.

Perhaps our Ward Councillors present would like to comment later on their and Medway Councils position.

The Peninsula continues to be under the threat of the possibility of having its own airport!!

The Last government said it shouldn't be built here!

Many say it will never be built here!

Many say we shouldn't even be considered by the Davis commission!

I suspect that when Howard Davis delivers his interim report (in December I believe) we will still be under consideration.

Please don't become complacent!!

Please remember and continue to shout our unique argument

The Greater Thames Estuary is this country's second most important site for migrant wintering wildlife 350,000 wildfowl fly here every year and have done so for thousands of years and will continue to do so for the next thousand years. In fact it is so special for birds here that our own Government, the European Community and the International Ramsar convention have declared it a special place for birds... and don't forget the RSPB already have 1.2 million members saying the same message!!! Their motto gives it all away

"For Bird For People Forever"

The Parish Surgery

The monthly Parish Council Surgery is held on the second Tuesday of every month at the Kings Kitchen in the Memorial hall, and is an opportunity for residents of the village to meet representatives of the parish council in order to air their views, ask questions or ask for advice.



The Surgery was started by Councillor Chris Watson on the 14th February 2012, and she was later joined by Councillor Gary Jerreat in August of the same year.

Over the years, Chris and Gary have been asked to deal with a wide variety of problems from parked cars causing an obstruction, to a neighbour's overhanging hedge.

A typical example is when residents were complaining about sports equipment installed on a grassed area in front of a house on the new

estate, this area did not belong to the householder. In response the land-owners (Taylor Wimpey) were contacted and asked to request that the householder remove the equipment. Taylor Wimpey were also contacted when residents complained about the ranch style fencing between Topley drive and Valentines way which was badly damaged, they have since removed the damaged fencing prior to replacing with new. Dog bins being full is another regular complaint, Medway council are contacted and generally the problem is solved quickly.

Chris and Gary also take the opportunity to meet with organisations during the surgery like the Police and Age UK, in order to discuss problems they have encountered or just to get an update on from them.

The Parish Council is very grateful to the people who run the Kings Kitchen for allowing the surgery to be held during their coffee morning.

Why not pop along and have a chat with Chris and Gary whilst enjoying a cup of coffee and maybe a toasted tea cake.

Recycling – Medway Council introduced weekly recycling collections last October and they have been very popular with residents. In the first three months of operation Medway residents recycled or composted around 7,300 tonnes of waste – the weight of the Eiffel Tower!

Lodge Hill – Your Ward Councillors are opposed to a new town being built at Lodge Hill in Chattenden. We feel it would damage the character of neighbouring villages, cause traffic disruption and destroy the natural environment. A refreshed planning application is currently being consulted on and is expected to go before Medway Council's Planning Committee in May.

Primary School places in Hoo – We are working to increase capacity for primary school children going to school in Hoo. Hoo alone has seen a population increase of more than 21.6% since 2001 – impacting on local amenities and services. We are campaigning for the existing primary school to either be made bigger, or for a completely new school to be built.

No Estuary Airport – Your Ward Councillors and local MP are strongly opposed to an airport being built anywhere in the Thames Estuary. Although the Grain option wasn't short listed in the recent Davies Commission's interim report, the Thames Estuary option wasn't ruled out. We therefore encourage residents to submit their feedback to the Davies Commission's interim report by the deadline (23rd May). These can be sent by email to: **estuary.studies@airports.gsi.gov.uk**

High Halstow Primary School 2013-2014

All involved at High Halstow Primary School have been working tirelessly over the last year to ensure our pupils experince the best opportunities as we continue on our journey to be a good and then outstanding school. We aim to inspire all learners to set their sights high, to achieve to the best of their abilities, and to excel in all that they do in order to prepare them to live and work as successful, active citizens.

Last year was a successful year in many ways, particularly when considering the improved outcomes for pupils in the end of Key Stage Two SATs. We are expecting our pupils to do as well or better this year as well.

The School Council have been working hard once again to organise events in school to raise money for our three chosen charities. Events during the past year have included:

- Wearing something spotty for Children in Need and paying £1 towards the charity
- Barnardo's Charity Day where pupils paid £1 to wear their own clothes. They also got the chance to take part in a 'Care and Share Challenge' and one lucky pupil won the charity bear to take home!
- A Dogs Trust Charity day in which pupils paid money to come to school in their own clothes and they also got the chance to work with visitors from the Dogs Trust.

Pupils have also taken part in three Enterprise Afternoons led by the School Council. The PTA kindly donated £20 to each class with a view that they had to decide on something to make and sell. The aim for each class was to make a profit by the end of the school year so that something could be purchased to improve the classroom or the school in general. We are busily working out the final totals for each class so that they can begin to purchase their items to improve school!

The Parent Teacher Association, (PTA), have been very active in the past year again. Events that have been organised in the past year to raise money for the school include: Cake Sales, The Christmas Shop, Christmas Fair, Pampered Chef Evening, Quiz Nights, Lady you Love shop, Man of the Moment shop, school disco and many more. The funds raised have provided the pupils with many experiences. They have been able to support by funding the coach travel to the Globe Theatre in London for all of Key stage Two pupils earlier this year, subsidising the cost of the theatre group to come into school to do a pantomime for pupils, subsidising the cost of the Fizz and Quiz for pupils, buying a water bottle and coloured House Team PE T-Shirt for each pupil, contributing towards a new bike rack for pupils as well as purchasing items for the book areas in each classroom. We are always extremely grateful for the time that members of our school community give up in order to make a difference for our pupils. Remember, if you have a child at the school you are automatically a member so why not come along to a meeting if you haven't before.

We are also grateful to the number of volunteers that we have coming into school in different capacities. We have several reading volunteers, parents who help in the classrooms as well volunteers who help as with administrative jobs in the office. It really does help everyone involved in the school and we know how rewarding it can be to be.

Pupils have had an increased opportunity to take part in a range of clubs and sporting activities. Clubs that have taken place this year have included: SMILE Club, Magic at Maths, Writing Club, Green Team, Zumba, Martial Arts, Gymnastics, Badminton, Dodgeball, Multi Skills, Football, Tag-Rugby, Badminton, Table Tennis and many more. Clubs are always changing so as to offer a range of opportunities for our pupils. Our pupils have participated in several competitions and festivals this year including: Tri-Golf, Multi-Skills, swimming competitions, Kwik-Cricket and Athletics.

A Breakfast Club was introduced in January meaning that pupils can arrive at school from 8am. They get a choice of cereals, toast, crumpets, yogurts, fruit and juices. Pupils then get to enjoy a range of activities before going to their classes for their day's learning.

We are still on a sharp learning curve after the departure of Sheila Marchant and Judy Southwell. Sadly numbers have dropped due to various reasons, but we hope that these will pick up with promoting the club by word of mouth and some advertising. We meet in the Memorial Hall on the 4th Wednesday of each month, and 3 of those meetings are in the form of a trip out by minibus, and with more members it would be easier to fill the seats. We are going to Torquay for 6 nights in September by coach from the village, spaces are still available.

Ladies Badminton

We still meet on Tuesdays at 2pm in the Recreation Hall. All levels are welcome be it novice or expert. No annual membership, just pay for the afternoon, which includes a cuppa and the inevitable chat.

Queens Badminton

We have enjoyed another year of badminton at the hall. The club, which meets Monday at 8pm is always a good opportunity to keep fit and socialise. The games are often competitive but at a standard that should not intimidate new members. Although the club has around 12 members, there are normally between 6 and 8 players each week. The ideal number is 8 which enables us to cover costs but not too many that will reduce the number of games possible. So why not come along and join us, there is no membership fee, just pay weekly when you play.

Youth Club April 2014

The Youth Club is now 21 years old. It is for local children aged 9 and upwards and meets each Tuesday (term time only) from 7pm till 8.45pm in the Recreation Hall. As existing members leave the club, new members from the waiting list are invited to join; this happens at various times throughout each year. We encourage parents to give us the names of their eight year olds so that they can be put on the waiting list; waiting time is currently less than a year.

Some of the popular activities at the club include the following...

Each week there is usually football or basketball in the main hall; these sports are enjoyed by both the boys and the girls. The table tennis room is another popular place to be; this is usually supervised by one adult and one of our young helpers. Sometimes at the end of the evening we have skipping or a game of Dodge Ball. Bingo is also popular, along with jigsaws, drawing, colouring or simply chatting!

The tuck shop is open each week from about 7.30 and is very popular. We offer a selection of sweets, crisps, popcorn, biscuits and drinks at competitive prices.

The club once again took part in the Christmas Tree Festival in December, when all the tree decorations were hand made by the children. We do not usually have a Craft Room during the summer months due to better weather (hopefully!) and outdoor play, but we plan to reintroduce craft activities in the autumn.

The adult helpers who supervise at the club each week work on a rota system and they each decide for themselves how frequently they would like to come and help. The club is always looking for new people to take an interest and to join the Helpers' rota. If anyone reading this feels that they could help, please get in touch; we will arrange for you to visit the Club and we can have a chat about what sorts of things you might want to be involved in. We can arrange a DBS check for you (DBS used to be called CRB) and also various training is available (free of charge to volunteers).

As you will have read in the recent High Halstow Times, we have been struggling in recent months to get enough adult helpers to supervise at the club and as a result of this the club remained closed for two weeks before Easter. We are now hopeful that new people will come forward to enable to club to be open each week as it is such a worthwhile meeting place for local young people.

We now look forward to hearing from some new members of the community, even if you can only offer a few hours each month. Also, if you have a particular skill that the club's youngsters might benefit from please let us know.

Let's start with income raised. Unfortunately we had an issue with the banks accepting some of the Direct Debit Forms and at long last I have managed to get to the bottom of this and new forms will be available shortly. Having said that we have managed to raise a credible £975 from subscriptions either by cheque, Standing Order or Direct Debit. Our monthly Subscriptions now equate to £130, which should rise on receipt of the new forms. I must thank all of you who have completed the forms or sent through cheques. I must thank May Smitherman who has been extremely patient with me in trying to get her subscription sorted – nearly there May

In terms of Fund raising events we had the following:

Many thanks to Ray Collins in pursuing the making and selling of Christmas Cards for the charity. Sending these cards to people who no longer live in the Village is a great way of reminding them of what they are missing

Expenditure was kept to a minimum with leaflets and insurance. If you remember we had a grant from the Ward Members to help kick start the charity the previous year to pay for this. Again this was very much appreciated

We have helped the Church in our first year which to be honest I wasn't sure we would have sufficient funds to do so, but they asked for help with the pointing and with the Church also putting some money towards this, we were able to provide over a £1000 towards pointing

As a result we have a surplus for the year of £1141.43 taking our funds to £3057.93, not bad for a quiet year

ST MARGARET'S BELL RINGERS

St Margaret's Church Bell Ringers meet every Tuesday Evening from 7.30 to 9pm. There have been Bells in the church for approximately 350 years. The bells have been rung to call people to worship on Sundays and to celebrate Weddings or special National occasions and are rung half muffled as a mark of respect for funerals or Remembrance Sunday.

Bell ringing is part of English History and the way the bells are hung and rung is unique to this country. A bell is mounted on a wheel with the rope passing around it. This allows control of the movement and led to Change Ringing as opposed to chiming as in most countries.

St Margaret's Bells are a ring of 6. There were originally just 5 bells and when cast the work was probably done in the churchyard. In 1983 when the bells and the old oak frame was in need of repair a new steel frame was made and the bells fully restored by David Jack with help from other parishioners and work by the Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Many people have learnt to handle a bell since then and have moved from the village and unfortunately we now have few village ringers and often have to rely on friends from other towers to help out.

It is a very sociable activity – as well as practicing it is usual to go into the Pub afterwards for a theory lesson! Once a ringer is confident to handle a bell they are welcome in other churches as a way gaining experience and by meeting new people. Tours are sometimes organised by individual towers or a District Event where we travel round the country trying out different bells. There are some churches with as many as 12 bells and others with just four. They can offer the challenge of having to climb 50 steps up a spiral staircase – duck under beams and some towers can make you feel seasick as they sway once the bells start to ring.

All St Margaret's Bell Ringers are members of the Kent County Association of Bell Ringers and meeting are held at regular intervals throughout the year giving members the opportunity to ring at other churches and have tea together. On some occasions there is a short service and some business to be discussed.

We would be delighted to welcome anybody interested in having a go to come along on a Tuesday.

High Halstow Cricket Club

"By the law of averages the 12 months starting now must be better than the period just ended. Mustn't it?"

Thus ended the 2012/13 report. Reference was being made to performance on the field and to the weather. Whilst the summer of 2013 was, on balance, an improvement on its predecessor, the winter certainly wasn't. With more rain and less snow and ice, Rayner's Meadow became a paddy field. Without the foresight to plant rice, 2014 saw outfield grass at record lengths and, in common with other clubs around the county, a real threat to be beginning of the season. The rescue will be reported next year!

The law of averages did not kick in to affect the 2013 playing season for the adults. So much so that the 3rd XI was suspended in May due to a lack of adequate numbers, and there is so far little sign of a return. Those available players found themselves moving up to 2nd and even 1st XI sides, where despite their relegations the previous year, both sides continued to struggle. Only the speed of decline was noteworthy, with a further relegation for both sides to Kent League Division 5 1st XI and KCL Division 5 2nd XI respectively. The 1st XI won only one game all season, and the 2nd XI waited until the final game to secure their only win. All this makes clear the need for players (young and old) to apply themselves in the pursuit of Kent League survival in 2014.

The Sunday League XI enjoyed a better season in the Kent Village League, where 4 wins saw them finish in mid-table of Division 7. This was their inaugural season in the Village League where Division 7 sees all new entrants, so is often much stronger than Division 6, and therefore quite difficult to get out of. The Sunday Friendly XI continues the tradition of a quiet Sunday of relaxing cricket on the village green, now in its 119th season at High Halstow. Results matter less than the enjoyment of the day – and long may that be the case.

The undoubted stars of the game in High Halstow are the colts, where, yet again the U11 Herons and U13s carried (almost) all before them in the Medway Youth Cricket League. The Herons achieved the league and cup double, completing an undefeated season, whilst the U13s topped their league but lost the playoff final to Borstal. Their consolation was retention of the U113 cup they won in 2012. The U15s also won their league. Congratulations to all who contributed to these successes.

Clearly the progression from colt to adult cricket is a bridge that needs to be crossed if the club is to retain its position in the Kent League. There is no ready answer to this question, which has been posed every year for a very long time. It remains incumbent on the club to make sure that everyone who plays wants to continue to play and support cricket in the village through their youth and adult lives.

Despite the repetition, deepest thanks go to all who helped and supported the Charity Day in September, where over £6,300 was raised for JDRF. It was a humbling experience for those who set of to raise a few pounds for this great cause.

Finally, we were saddened to lose our longest serving club member, Reg Billings. He was a stalwart of the club during his playing days and was a Vice President for nearly 40 years following his retirement from the game.

High Halstow Pre School

2013-14 has been another (as always) busy year for High Halstow Pre-School. The school year started with very few children enrolled. This was due to nearly three-quarters of the children leaving to go to school last July. However over the last 5 terms numbers have increased dramatically.

Since last September funding for 2 year olds has been available for some families. The criteria is set by government and families that qualify are automatically contacted by letter through Medway Council Early Years team. This has changed the dynamics of the Pre-school with the children starting younger and also leaving younger. This follows the change a few years ago to one intake per year into school.

We continue to development the pre-school and continue strive to do our best for children and parents. The year started with a visit from Zoo Lab, a company that brings animals to nursery to teach children in an interactive workshop. This was a great opportunity to give children experiences that they may not otherwise have the chance to have.

Later on in the term we supported Breast Cancer Research and Children in Need by raising money for two very good causes. At the end of term 2 we supported the Friends of St Margaret's Church with their Christmas tree festival. The children made a small decoration that was hung on the tree in the village hall.

Zoo Lab returned for our Christmas Party. They bought various traditional foods and games were played and of course a visit from Santa. In addition other foods and stories from different cultures and religions that celebrate festivals around December, January and February were also experienced.

In terms 3 and 4 we have improved our outside area. We have added a mud kitchen that promotes imagination, gross & fine motor skills as well as social skills. We also added an outside construction area for the children to build walls with bricks and mortar (well sand and water!) with hi Vis jackets, hard hats and other building equipment.

We are about to start term 6 where we work closely with local schools to ensure a smooth transition for our leavers so they start their school life in the best possible way.
