

School Council


On Thursday 15th September 2011 it was the first school council meeting for this term and the elections for officers took place. The results were as follows:-

During the second meeting, which took place on Friday 30th September 2011, the council voted on the three charities which they would like to support during this school year. The results of which were Evelina Hospital for Children, British Heart Foundation and Demelza House. The events to raise the money for these charities were discussed and voted on and those agreed were; Wear a Colour Day, Talent Show and Bring a Bear - Show You Care Day. It was also decided to go ahead with a suggestion made by the previous council that all the money raised over these three charity days would be collected together and divided equally between the charities later in the year.

Mrs Sanford also discussed the school budget, how it is allocated and how it included a small amount for the school council to spend. It was explained that this year each class would be allocated £20 for the year to use as an Enterprise Fund. Each class must decide how they can make their money grow in order to increase the amount they have to spend on making improvements to the school. The class representatives were asked to return to the next meeting, which is on Friday 18th November, with any ideas their class may have for an Enterprise Event.


Witches Fingers - always get an adult to help you in the kitchen 225g butter (softened), 100g icing sugar, 225g sugar, 1 egg, 1 tsp almond extract, 1 tsp vanilla extract, 400g plain flour, 1 tsp baking powder, 1 tsp salt, 75g whole blanched almonds, 1 tube red decorator gel.

In bowl beat together butter, sugar, egg, almond extract and vanilla; beat in flour; baking powder and salt. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes. Working with one-quarter of the dough at a time and keeping remaining dough refrigerated, roll heaping teaspoons full of dough into finger shape for each cookie. Press almond firmly into one end for nail. Squeeze in center to create knuckle shape. Using a paring knife make slashes in several places to form knuckle. Place on lightly greased cookie sheet in 325 degree over for 20-25 minutes or until pale or golden. Let cool for three minutes. Lift up almond; squeeze red decorator gel onto nail bed and press almond back in place so gel oozes out from underneath. Remove from cookie sheet and let cool. Repeat with remaining dough. Makes about 5 dozen fingers!



Gardening tips for the Autumn

Cut down all spent shoots of perennials to the ground, clear leaves around base and give a general feed. If the plants need to be divided, now is the time to do it by lifting the entire plant and separating into smaller clumps to replant or pass on to fellow gardeners.

Rake up dead leaves around rose bushes. If the bushes have suffered with black spot, ensure that these leaves are burnt to prevent further spreading of the disease.

After the first heavy frosts have blackended dahlias, cut down and cover with a deep layer of soil or lift the tubers, clean free of earth and making sure the tubers are dry, pack in boxes surrounded with crunched newspaper and cover the top. Store on a shelf in the greenhouse or shed.

Look out for new stocks of narcissi and daffodils. If the site is exposed, why not buy the shorter varieties which tend not to flatten in high winds. Crocus and anemones can also be purchased and planted in late October. Tulips should be planted in November.

ldea for kids

Why not encourage the children to plant prepared hyacinth bulbs in pots as presents for the family at Christmas. Plant in compost with the top of the bulb just showing, lightly water and place in a cool dark place until shoot is a few cm's high and then bring out into the light (not sun), keep slightly moist.

These should be planted in mid October and hopefully they will be ready for Christmas. Wrap in some pretty paper and place a ribbon around the pot. What could be better than this quick and easy present? Note: ensure that the hyacinths are the 'prepared' variety. These can be purchased at well known household supermarkets or at local garden centres.



Fish and Mushroom Bake

Ingredients: 225g mushrooms, 50g butter or margarine, 2 tomatoes chopped

4 frozen fish steaks,

1 tin (10 oz) condensed mushroom soup, 8 tbsp milk

Scone mixture

175g SR flour, pinch salt, 50g marg (cubed), 3-4 tbsp milk Method: Heat the butter in a pan and fry the mushrooms until soft. Place them in a 2 pint oven proof dish. Put the chopped tomatoes on top of the mushrooms. Place the fish on top. Warm the soup with the milk and pour over fish. Make the scones by rubbing in the marg with the flour and salt until like breadcrumbs and add milk to make a soft dough. Roll out to about 1/2" thick and cut into 8 rounds. Place on top of the fish, at each end. Cook for 30-35 mins in oven at 190c/gas mark 5. Sprinkle with a little parsley to decorate.

Local Places of Historic Interest

In each issue we hope to have an article on a local place of historic interest. As it's Halloween, this issue's local history piece has spooky theme.....

Somewhere in Cobham woods, on the side of a hill not far from the recently restored Darnley mausoleum are the remains of a crumbling brick plinth, surrounded by yew trees. It doesn't look much now, but when it was built in 1835 it was clad in decorated stone with wrought iron railings. This ruin is the remains of the Darnley Toe monument, built to commemorate an accident which had fatal consequences.....

On the 4th February 1835, Lord Darnley, a wealthy landowner was walking in the park with his cousin when they came across some woodcutters. After watching them work. Lord Darnley, thinking he could do better borrowed an axe and said "now I'll show you how to cut a root in halves". He struck a mightu blow that alanced off the root and hit his boot, slicing through it and nearly chopping off his little toe. He staggered to a nearby cottage and had the wound dressed, dismissing the injuru as unimportant. However this was in the days before tetanus injections, and shortly afterwards he contracted lock jaw as a result of the iniury and died, aged just 39.

The monument, erected by his widow was easy to find off the path between Cuxton and Cobham until the hurricane of 1987, when fallen trees blocked many of the established paths. I am told it is still there, but more difficult to find. Also worth a visit is the recently restored Darnley mausoleum. This was built in 1786 in an ornate style and was the intended burial place for members of the Darnley family. However, it is alleged that the Bishop of Rochester considered its design to be 'unchristian' and refused to consecrate it, so it was never used. Over the years the building was abandoned and suffered terrible vandalism before being featured as a restoration candidate on the 2002 BBC program Restoration.


I recall visiting it close to midnight as part of a Venture Scouts night hike in the late 1980s, at this time it was difficult to imagine a more spooky place than this, as this derelict building emerged from the darkness before you on the top of a remote wooded hillside. You could walk inside its blackened remains (a deliberate fire in the crypt in 1980 had bought the chapel floor and staircase down) and climbing over the rubble you could explore the lower level with it 32 coffin shelves.

Thankfully before the building was lost, work to secure and restore it started in 2006 and it is now complete and much work has been done to the surrounding woodland and paths, which is now all a part of Cobham Park, easy walking from the war memorial in Cobham.
