Personal tribute to Lesley Munday

It is ironic that the front page of the May edition should have highlighted the possible closure of our Youth Club alongside the notification of the death of Lesley Munday, because among all the other Village activities she took part in, she was the prime mover in the Club's birth

At the January 1993 Parish Council meeting as Recreation Hall representative she reported "...the Committee are considering opening a room to twelve wandering youths of the Parish to meet and have coffee". I well remember Lesley's passionate call at the following February meeting ..."We must do something for the children of the Village!" Councillors responded by agreeing to pay the weekly £6.50 cost of hiring a room. The Club opened on the 21st April with Lesley, aided by myself and another Councillor Alan Walsh. I was rubbish, although having grown up children I was not prepared for the sheer exuberance of all these young people. It was still a time of "innocence", no mobile phones, Xboxes, bedroom TV's, Internet chat rooms, they were prepared to accept the second hand donations of games, happy to play just running about. After several months, sadly both Alan and I had to stop helping, he was often working abroad and I was prevented by shift work. Despite this potential setback Lesley continued. She was the one who had quickly earned both the childrens' respect and mine, the one who stayed calm and likeable in all that noise and bustle. Generations of our Community owe her so much, as we do today to Chris Peek, Cat Archer and Melvyn Mears. I hope you do not allow their precious legacy to just fade away.

The doors were closed for final time at Easter and since then talks have been taking place to save the club.

I am delighted to tell you that the Youth Club is re-opening on 5th June. A new committee has been formed and voted in by the current Parent Helpers. As of 22nd May, the Club is being managed by four villagers, all of whom have been associated with the club in recent years and wish to see it continue well into the future. Your new committee are, Natacha Robbins, Melvyn Mears, Karyn Vernon and myself.

The club will again be running on Tuesday evenings, between 7.00 - 8.45pm in the Recreation Hall, and we aim to run sessions on a weekly basis (excluding the school summer break). Whilst the venue and times stay the same, lots of things are changing. Firstly there is a website www.hhyouthclub.co.uk, we welcome you to take a look.

Every child that wishes to be a member of the club needs to be registered with us online, this way we can safely store their data and keep all records up to date and accurate. Adult volunteers will also need to register in the same way. Once you have registered our Membership Secretary, Karyn will get in touch with to let you know the next steps. There is anticipated to be a waiting list as the club has proven to be very popular, but we will keep you informed as to when a place becomes available. Please add your child's name, even if they haven't yet reached their 9th birthday, because as soon as they are 9 they will be offered a space if they are at that time on the top of the list and there is capacity to accept them.

Activities will vary from week to week and we aim to get the children involved in making decisions about their own ideas for things to do. We have a great hall and supply of sports and

craft equipment as well as the use of the Recreation Field in warmer months. The club will be lots of fun for all involved and we look forward to seeing your children enjoying their time with us.


Christian Aid

Grass cutting contract

I contacted the Contractor Gavin Jones to express our concern as we had received an unprecedented number of complaints about the condition of the grass verges, the Recreation ground and Forge Common. The representative at Gavin Jones offices confirmed that Gavin Jones and Turfsoil were sister companies and there has been no merger or take-over. They have just brought all of their branding into

The same staff are still employed. The same equipment is in service. The difference this year is that the grass has been so long that they have had to use a "rotavator mower" and this is why the cut grass is left. They reiterated that the weather has had a major impact on their service this year - two lots of snow and heavy rainfall with some hot spells. They confirmed that they would place more staff on the contract in order to catch up.

I can assure villagers that this issue is being monitored closely.

Lesley had been on the Committee since the 1970's and had undertaken a number of roles including representing the Youth Club as well as being Committee secretary and a founder member of the HUGH Fund. If I said the foundation of the new kitchen was built upon fruit or chocolate fudge cake, this is not a slur to her cooking but to remind all of us of the sheer volume of cake, teas, coffees, bacon rolls, toast etc. etc that passed through the old and new kitchen hatch in raising funds for this hall. Along with Margaret Church and John Pink the Quiz nights alone have raised just under £10,000 for the hall, which is some achievement. We mustn't forget as well that Lesley run many a bar at the hall and I shall always be grateful for her unwavering support, generosity and friendship throughout my time on the committee.

I must also reflect on Maureen Short who sadly passed away at Christmas. Although Maureen had not been on the committee for the last few years, she too had played her role in the history of the hall. Maureen had also been on the committee since the 1970's and had been a past treasurer as well as an avid supporter of numerous events here.

Both will be sorely missed.

The past year saw us move from a refurbishment programme and more to a maintenance programme, which is the way it should be. The electric lights in the hall have been replaced and hope all like the improvements including the new sidelights. Improvements to the furniture have seen new square tables replace the old wooden ones, along with the new chairs. We have recently received a delivery of new round tables which will improve the setting of the hall

As always there are a number of people I wish to thank as follows:

- Ray Collins is the go to person when something needs to be done. There doesn't seem to be a repair he cannot do or get organised, be it the changes to the internal doors, the old kitchen hatch, signing for deliveries or as recent as ensuring the fire alarm is fixed. I really have come to rely on Ray and am extremely grateful for the support he gives me and the money he saves the hall.
- Elaine Slatcher takes pride in being the cleaner for the hall and we should be proud to have her as our cleaner. She goes out of her way to ensure the Hall looks as well as it can be for current and prospective hirers.
- Wenda Taylor, who until tonight hopefully, hasn't been on the Committee but is one of the villages unsung heroes. Nothing seems to be too much trouble be it selling tickets, advertising through Facebook, sorting out food etc, the world could do with more people like Wenda.
- My fellow Committee members, Tina Farmer, George Crozer, Martin Mitchell, Chris Peek, Margot Sturt and Crystal Wakefield who have all seen that the hall runs smoothly with nothing being too much trouble. People need to realise that without people like you they wouldn't have a facility to use.
- Margaret Church, along with John Pink and Lesley as previously said, continue to run a number of Quiz's for the Hall. This has become a regular feature for the hall.
- Carl and Jo Mitchell for providing so much help in advertising, printing of leaflets, posters etc. With their attention to detail also keen, this allows us allow us to produce events to the high standard that we do.
- Bob who with his staff in the shop help us raise monies by selling tickets, collecting application forms etc. In addition ensuring that the bar is stocked on time with good quality wines and beers doesn't go amiss either.
- Mick Woolmington again wrote, produced and built the set for the third Murder
- Mystery, and along with other members of Dramarama performed this event over two nights. Once again, the audience were
 treated to a three-course meal from Jo Mitchell, Wenda Taylor and their band of volunteers. The last three years we have been
 very fortunate to have seen so much dedication and effort put in by all concerned for this event.

Once again, many thanks must go to the users of the Hall be it a regular or one off users.


O What A Night Middle of May Back in 18

The walk started along the driveway to Buckhurst Park, through well manicured grounds with bluebells and hints of rhododendrons just starting to bloom. The route instructions, as printed by the Times were somewhat ambiguous and we had a slight delay as finding the pathway out of the Buckhurst estate was not easy, however once out we joined the High Weald path which took us south into some unspoilt and rolling countryside, with great views across the Weald.

The walk meandered along lanes and across fields and through bluebell woods, very idyllic and unspoilt.

What was interesting was that there was very little arable farming along the walk, most fields seemed to be pasture with just the occasional glimpse of golden rape fields in the distance.

The walk was a fraction under 5.5 miles, as a slight detour reduced the walk from the published 7 miles, that however returned us to the Dorset Arms for our pre planned Sunday lunch with perfect timing.

Our Steering Group are moving quickly to analyse research papers on what High Halstow can offer for our future generations.


Medway Council's draft Local Plan is set to demonstrate that our village would be able to accommodate over 700 new homes within the next 20 years. Our aim is to analyse what High Halstow has at present and what we can realistically offer our future generations.

You will see from the census records of 2011 High Halstow had a healthy population of 1,805 and there were 715 households. We believe today's figure is nearer to 800 households.



We are in no doubt that we will need to plan for the development of affordable housing for our younger generation but we do need your help by coming along to our Neighbourhood Plan Consultation Days and confirming what you think is required. Its essential that we show that we have engaged with our villagers.

We have already filed the map of our village with the Council. This confirms the area that our Neighbourhood Plan will apply to. We are



setting up a project plan of the way forward and this will be put to the Experts who we will have to employ to put the Neighbourhood Plan in the correct format for it to be adopted.

It is essential that Medway Council show that their Local Plan is sustainable. We hope to show what can be sustainable.
