A disappointing end to 2018

On the evening of 27
December a group of, we believe, 3 people vandalised the gents toilet in the Village Hall Car Park. They were seen leaving the scene using a small white car and a motor cycle but the witness was unable to positively identify any individual or make out the registration numbers of the two vehicles.

At the time of writing this article we note that Medway Council have authorised repairs to the toilet block and Medway Norse have undertaken the work.

High Halstow's hidden Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI)

While most people of the village will be aware that the Northward Hill RSPB nature reserve is an SSSI, or at least would not be surprised to find that it is, few seem to know that there is another area of the village designated as an SSSI or the reason for it being so.

To the north-west of the school and church and to the north of the houses that line Cooling Road, there is an area of scrub covering land that has fallen away in an uneven manner. A public footpath runs through the area from Forge Lane into the RSPB reserve. This area of scrubland forms the Dalham Farm SSSI of 8.2 hectares (21.7 acres). Most of the area is owned by Wyborne/Dalham Farm but approximately 3 acres to the south-east of the footpath is owned by Jeanette and me.

Dalham Farm is thought to illustrate possibly the lowest angled slope failure in Great Britain, ie land that has slipped despite its slope being very shallow. For this reason it was designated an SSSI in 1987 although the slippage had been obvious for at least 20 years before that. Fortunately, the ridge of land on which the houses, church and school sit has been unaffected although parts of some of the gardens have dropped away.

There has been much speculation as to how the slippage was precipitated. The most popular theory is that it was a result of dredging being carried out in the Thames, because of the coincidence in timing, but there seems to be no certainty about this.

Until the early 1990s, the area was kept much more open by the grazing of horses and this meant that the effect of the slippage was visible in some places as a series of regular ridges that gave a clearly terraced appearance. Little of this is now apparent because about 90% of the area is covered in small trees, bushes and bramble; to a very limited extent the slippage can be appreciated



by the severe unevenness of the footpath that passes through the SSSI.

This overgrowth means that the folds in the slipping earth are hidden. Because of this, at its last inspection by Natural England, who are charged with protecting SSSIs, the condition of the Dalham Farm SSSI was considered to be "unfavourable". One of the few areas where the nature of the slippage is visible is on that which we have kept clear by sheep/goat grazing; this can be seen from the boundary with the school. Over the coming year or two we aim to clear more of the land closer to our boundary with the footpath. We

will avoid doing so in the Spring and early Summer when bird nesting occurs and will limit the clearage of the larger bushes and trees to minimise the impact on birdlife more generally. Hopefully this will mean that this strange feature of our village can become more obvious again on at least one small part of the SSSI.

High Halstow Hikers

In December, as is traditional we did a local walk followed by some seasonal drinks and eats afterwards. The route took approaching 20 of us through the Northward Hill reserve passing the lovely Christmas decorations that had been left on many of the bushes along the main path from Forge Common. We then walked challengingly muddy paths down and through Bromhey Farm but fortunately everybody remained upright. Having gone through Cooling to the Castle we turned left to Cooling Court and from there back to the village along the permitted path through Wyborne's Farm. Everybody seems to continue to enjoy this route of 5-6 miles even if we have followed it many times – familiarity does not detract from it being highly varied, undemanding and with great views across the countryside to the Thames.

At the start of January, we took a car-ride to Chartham an old village about 3 miles south of Canterbury. Our numbers were depleted by Christmas colds/flu and by nasty accidents to a couple of our regular participants, Jackie and Rita. Fortunately their breaks and bruises look as though they will not keep them out of action for long – we all hope the healing is very speedy. Our walk followed the wellmaintained path along the Stour to Canterbury. At times



this was exceptionally pretty and quiet, while at others the busy A28 intruded and trains along the other side of the path made a regular appearance. On the river itself there were many pairs of mallard presumably getting ready for their Spring mating. We paused for a brief coffee in Canterbury and then for a view of the beautiful stained glass windows in St Dunstan's Church where we also contemplated the gruesome information that Thomas More's head rested in the vault below having been separated from his body by beheading. Our walk back to Chartham through large orchards of apple trees, many still with fruit hanging, was followed by excellent lunch at the Artichoke on a table with glass top to give a view of the well directly below.


