I thank to Chris Watson for her support as Vice Chairman and the committees of (Personnel Finance, School Liaison, Village grounds maintenance, Recreation ground.). Thanks too to Brian Williams for (Finance, KALC, Footpaths, Recreation ground, and village grounds maintenance). Gary Jarrett for (Kings kitchen Surgery, Finance, Personnel Planning, High Halstow School liaison). Bill Khatkar for (Planning, Finance and Police Liaison). Linda Atkinson for (Allotments, Planning, HHT, website, KALC and neighbourhood plan). Ray Collins for (Planning, Finance, Rural Liaison, Recreation and Memorial Hall, Footpaths, Trees, and Forge common). Martin Andrews for (Personnel and Police liaison). Mick O'Hanlon for (Personnel and Neighbourhood Plan).

I'm sure by now you all will know Cat Bloomfield, our New Parish Clerk. This meeting will mark the end of her first year. Thank you Cat for your effort and understanding during this first year.

I thank Jack and John on your behalf for keeping our streets clear of rubbish. I must point out neither Jack nor John are responsible for the rubbish we find on the periphery of our village, the major roads do not fall within their remit. have again been asked to re-instate our litter-picking group (project 90). We should re look at this in the coming months to see what can be done. It's a good way to exercise for 90 mins and gives you a great sense of wellbeing and job well done!!

May I pay tribute to two members of our community who served on this council and have passed away in this term. Peter Dall and Lesley Munday. Both were very active members of our community.

I first met Peter when the late Doug Hutchison introduced me to the Village Hall Committee back in the last century. He was a regular at the Red Dog in all the time I knew him.

Lesley of course will be remembered for her passion for the children of the village. She was a founder and leader of the youth club up until a few years ago. I know she was glad to see that the club continued to flourish under the new management. Lesley and Peter were both heavily involved in the refurbishment of our Village Hall and saw great changes during their lifetimes, they will both be missed.

I'm pleased to see that both our Halls are doing well and are an important asset used and loved by very many of the community. They are a glowing example of community in action. During a village consultation in 2000 they were identified as the most important village assets. The community was collectively involved in raising some £174,000 for the Village Hall through direct donations and fund-raising events. This ultimately constituted almost 40% of the total cost of refurbishment. This Parish Council was pleased to contribute over 25% whilst the remaining 35% was raised from external grants by Medway Councils Rural liaison, Veolia Environmental Trust, Kent Downs & Marshes Leader Programme, Garfield Weston, and other Local Charities.

The Halls have played a major part in housing many of our local clubs and it's inspirational to see so many of these local clubs and groups flourishing within our village.

The past year has seen many changes to the operation of the Parish Council with the adoption of new Standing Orders. Other policy documents are the subject of work in progress and will be brought forward in due time.

This of course is the Annual Parish meeting immediately before the elections.

In this new 4-year term we will see some changes to the make-up of the Parish Council. Two councillors are standing down and there are ten candidates for the nine parish councillors required, so this year it is great to learn there will be an actual election. It is one of most important aspects of the society in which we live.

I give special thanks to Councillors Martin Andrews and Mick O'Hanlon who has served admirably during the last 4-year term, we will be sorry to see them go and wish them well for the future.

It was just over a year ago that it was confirmed during the consultation of the latest Local Plan that Medway Council intend changing the face of the Peninsula forever. They plan building 12,000 new homes mainly in Hoo and 700 in High Halstow. I'm afraid that the overriding business for the next 4 years will be dictated by the history of this last year.

Our village is about to double in size from 800 to 1500 homes with the development of the land between Christmas Lane and Britannia Road.

Because of Medway Council's insistence on developing the Peninsula in preference to other more suitable areas of Medway, there has been an absence of a Medway Local Plan since 2003. The Lack of a Local Plan has allowed predatory development to become rampant on the peninsula. Our much loved Deangate Ridge Golf course has been closed and its future as a community asset hangs precariously in the balance, protected only by the adjacent SSSi and the Deangate Community partnership's (DCP) registration of the site as an "Asset of Community Value".

Medway Council now talk of securing a government grant in an attempt to bolster and qualify the Local Plan by applying for 170 million pounds for Peninsula access improvements to the A228 at Four Elms Hill (which is already dangerous with 37 fatalities to date and under investigation for its bad air quality) and the building of railway stations at Sharnal Street and Hoo.

There will be further opportunity to comment on the proposed Local Plan before it goes to the Inspector. I would strongly advise you to comment when the opportunity arises as it is most important, we tell the Inspector that Medway Council is excluding suitable alternative sites in favour of the Peninsula. Sustained development on the Peninsula relies on access infrastructure changes to make it feasible. If predatory development is allowed to continue prior to the Local Plan the existence of that development could negate the feasibility of the Local Plan. We could be left with too much development without adequate amenity or infrastructure.

This year the Parish Council has approved the development of our own Neighbourhood Plan. This will give us a say in the way High Halstow is developed between now and 2035. Once adopted it will form part of the Council's Local Plan.

The Neighbourhood Plan should give us some influence on the type of housing, design of the properties and how we would like the village to grow in the future. When I say "we" I of course mean the whole of our community. You may have already taken part in the Neighbourhood Plan process at the drop-in meetings held towards the end of last year. On Monday night (8 April) The Parish Council approved the engagement of an expert planner to help further development of the Plan and its submission for approval and adoption into the Local Plan. You will have further opportunity to take part very soon, in the meantime please continue to enjoy living in High Halstow and please remember to vote in the Elections for both our local Council and this Parish Council.

Waste Services

Medway Council have maintained a weekly collection service for both waste and recycling and are still receiving high scores in customer satisfaction surveys. The weekly collections will continue when the waste and recycling service transfers to Medway Norse in October. Litter is still a large problem even though litter bins are provided both by the Council and fast food outlets.

Medway Council will continue to provide a free service at the household recycling sites for Medway residents even though KCC are to start charging at their sites

Highways

The Highways department has again carried out many repairs to potholes, pavements, car parks and also resurfaced many major routes. In Christmas Lane, I convinced Southern Water that they had a leak that was causing ponding on the road and then arranged for resurfacing to be carried out.

Transport

The excellent service provided by ASD to Holcombe Grammar School and Strood Academy continues, as does the subsidising of certain bus services to and from the Peninsula.

Road Safety

Educating primary school children in road safety as both pedestrians and cyclists is the main priority for the Road Safety Team with very encouraging results. The establishment of walking buses at various schools helps to reinforce the message.

General

My ward improvement fund has been spent on very good causes including a donation to High Halstow WI towards the excellent new village sign.

I opposed the closing of Deangate Ridge Golf Club which I felt was a valuable asset to the Peninsula and I continue to support the swimming pool complex and libraries which are available to all.

Medway Council still maintains the lowest Council Tax in Kent

I would like to thank all the members of the Parish Council for all that they do for the village

Football Annual Summary

High Halstow FC are coming to the end of their 2018-2019 season. Having enjoyed cup (winning 3 cups including the Kent Junior Cup) and league success finishing 3rd in Division 4 last season, High Halstow were promoted to Division

2. Currently 4th in their league with 1 game left to play of the season they have adjusted well to playing at a higher level, their best cup run this season stopped with a quarter final loss in the Quarter Century Cup. Plans are underway for next season and as always we are looking for players for next season, so if you know of anyone who wants to play competitive men's football next year contact Thomas Pauley.

Youth Club Annual Summary

Since the club reformed last year, we have managed to keep a core of volunteers which has allowed the club to open on a weekly basis, this has meant we have maintained on average of 28 children om a weekly basis. The Christmas party was a great success with 48 children present plenty of games were played which was enjoyed by everyone. We also had an enjoyable Easter event where plenty of chocolate was eaten. as the club has a stable cash balance, we are looking to provide a variety of different things to keep the interest of the children.



wHoo Cares has now been in operation for 2 ½ years and we are growing from strength to strength each year. We are currently supporting almost 100 Partners (clients) and have 37 Community Supporters (volunteers). We currently have 4 Partners and 6 volunteer Community Supporters in High Halstow.

As a reminder, we support people who are socially isolated or vulnerable and live on the Hoo Peninsula (ME3 postcode). We work with our Partners (clients) to identify activities that will make a difference in their lives and promote independence. This could be

something like having one of our volunteers pop in for a coffee and a chat once a week, help to do a fortnightly shop or accompany them to a medical appointment. Or, it might be something as simple as introducing a person to the local coffee morning or bowls group to meet like-minded friends and neighbours. We work closely with local communities, groups and organisations as well as other local and national organisations in order to achieve the best results for our Partners so if there is another organisation out there that we think could help someone, we will sign post them to it but, importantly, we will follow up with the signposting to make sure it's what the Partner needs/wants.

This last financial year, we provided 3777 hours of support to our Partners including over 1600 hours of befriending support and almost 1,100 transport visits to a range of locations including doctors & hospital appointments, shopping, support groups and community activities.

In December, we had our second Christmas Meal in High Halstow with twice as many attendees as the first year. The feedback was very positive and there are plans to do it again this year

Funding is always a challenge and so the Parish Council's grant was very much appreciated this year. We continue to look at ways to increase our income without having to depend on grants. We are still working on our plans for a community transport service — unfortunately, this has taken longer than expected but it is still being progressed. We are also working in partnership with a local recruitment agency to support people on the peninsula and Medway to be registered and employed as Personal Care Assistants.

High Halstow Community Lottery

Since its inception in September 2016 the HH Community
Lottery has gone from strength to strength. Villagers may
know that we have a Committee of 3 and we meet regularly to
discuss not only to agree on prize amounts for the game and
fund applications but of course, the way forward.

Unfortunately, not everyone in High Halstow has taken up the baton with me but we do have a fluctuating player base. We are still treading water because we do have players drop in and out but the number of players is still above 200. This gives us a healthy prize fund of over £1,000 each month and cash towards the charity part of the game.

The game is open to everyone to play because it's a public lottery with a license from Medway Council. We have players in HH, Hoo, Stoke, Allhallows, Cliffe, Strood, Wainscott, Maidstone, Faversham, Welling and Barnehurst.

The prize fund has gone from the initial £500 to a £3,000 Christmas jackpot in 2018. The prize has settled at around £1,400 for the past couple of months.

Total won so far is £41,160.00

We have been able to provide funding to:

- £1,000 The Primary School for playground equipment
- £250 HH Primary PTA for equipment hire for Summer Fayre
- £1,000 Women's Institute towards the new village sign
- £1,000 HH Cricket Club for new matting
- £800 HH Memorial Hall for a new shed for storage
- £500 towards new bridge in Britannia road
- £1,200 Purchase of Materials for Armistice Day Poppies
- £1,000 Friends of St Margret's Church allocated towards Restoration of Church window
- £500 Stay & Play Group Start up Fees
- £2,000 High Halstow Primary Academy Allocated Funding towards School Library redevelopment, furniture and books.

This makes a total of £9,280 for High Halstow causes since its inception.

Our aim for our lottery is for it to grow and enable us to increase the prize fund.

The maximum we can provide in a prize is £20,000 per month – which is attainable with more players. With more marketing on social media we are hoping to reach a prize of £2,000 by later this year.

High Halstow Hikers

Our walk at the beginning of April was mainly along the top of the North Downs overlooking Wye and the surrounding area to the West. We had good weather and firm paths throughout the route that started from the car park serving Wye National Nature Reserve. We followed the North Downs Way until just before the Wye Crown, a large feature cut into the chalkland that can be seen for many miles. The circular route involved a byway that was shared by a group of about 15 courteous (I mean it!) motorcyclists and a bridleway that was being used by a large number of horse-riders on a cross-county event. But most of the walk was through quiet woods with the Spring flowers

beginning to display at their best and across lovely pastureland. As we neared the end of the walk, we passed through the very well kept Pett Street Farm and climbed a gentle but long hill back to the North Downs Way to view the extraordinary Devil's Kneading Trough a deep bowl-shaped cutting into the Downs. This dramatic viewpoint is sometimes



described as Kent's top beauty spot; it was certainly very impressive at our visit. The photograph shows some of our walkers at the lip of the Trough.


