

At last, the government's Covid rules permitted organised walking groups to become active and we took advantage of this with our first walk of the year from Godden Green near Sevenoaks into and around Knole Park on Sunday 9th May. We selected this partly on the basis that its wide paths and open spaces allowed for socially distanced talking as well as walking.

There is good on-road parking at Godden Green outside the Buck's Head pub where nearly 20 of us congregated on the warm sunny day – a real rarity so far this spring. From there the footpath into the park took us through lovely areas of bluebells to the park's "Pedestrian Entrance Alpha". Shortly afterwards we needed to pass across the golf course which was busy that day with a competition with another club. Along the route to Knole House we passed large numbers of sika and fallow deer that were totally unbothered by passers-by. Apparently, there are about 350 in the park overall. At the

moment, their largely grey colour gives them good camouflage against the many tree trunks that lay across the ground as the victims of past storms.

After just over a mile, we came to the large austere Knole House that was taken from the Archbishop of Canterbury in 1538 by Henry VIII to use as a hunting lodge – quite a lodge! After passing the house on a short stretch of the Greensand Way, we walked along the Broad Walk and then the Chestnut Walk which are long, straight, wide tracks that were perfect for safe socialising. After returning towards the house, we started to complete the second loop of our figure of 8 walk. This part of the route proved a little more difficult to follow since the public footpaths that we tried to follow deviated in an unmarked fashion from the many tracks around and across the golf course. So, after a short "detour" we were re-routed by a kind golf steward to the correct path that took us up the only hill we encountered and out of the

> park close to Sevenoaks Preparatory School and its extensive playing fields. From there we had a short walk along a narrow road back to the cars.

With our little detour the walk was about 6 miles and seemed to be enjoyed by

all. Most of us took the opportunity for a little more socialising with a drink outside the Buck's Head.

High Halstow Parish Council Resume April 21st 2021

A virtual Parish Council meeting was held on Wednesday 21st April where it was attended by seven (7) Parish Councillors, one (1) Ward Councillor and one (1) member of the public. During this meeting the members received a report from Ward Councillor Ron Sands concerning the new 'Customs Depo' that had opened on the Isle of Grain and reports of a 'hit and run' on a car that had subsequently been written off, following an incorrect turning taken by a Thamesport lorry.

The Parish Council learnt of two (2) new planning applications that had been submitted since their last meeting, where comments in regards to one of these applications was agreed to be passed on to Medway Council. They also discussed in detail five (5) new decisions, of which it was noted that four (4) had been passed and one (1) had been declined.

A report from the Neighbourhood Plan committee confirmed that the members' design code still had room for improvement after the documentation had been professionally assessed by Urbed. The Councillors voted and collectively agreed to continue using the services of Urbed to aid with the finalisation of their plan. Additionally, and in order to provide a united front against the developers, the members agreed to elect two representatives from the Parish Council to attend Hoo Parish Council meetings, where in turn two members from their Parish Council would attend High Halstow Parish Council's meetings.

They discussed in detail the two

quotes sourced for a more durable surface to be installed under the basket swing in the Recreation Ground, where it was recognised that this project would be funded by Section 106 funds. After careful consideration the members agreed to proceed with one of the two quotes, where it was confirmed that work could commence after the funds from Medway Council had been received.

It was accepted that owing to a rise in inflation that the Parish Council had applied a 10% increment to their fees, payable by Taylor Wimpey, to upkeep their green spaces. It was also recognised that the developer had granted permission for the Parish Council to instal additional seating on the land, via means of the installation of wooden benches.

The members discussed the preferred material for new village notice boards, where it was confirmed that 'oak' was the more favourable option. It was agreed that a further quote to refurbish the existing boards would also be sought before any final decisions were made at the next meeting.

Owing to further adaptations to the newly installed gates along the RS40 footpath it was advised that the right of way would be closed until 10/05 whilst the new alterations were made. The members confirmed receipt of two new trees, that had kindly been gifted by a Parishioner and planted. The Parish Council spoke of a new watering programme for the saplings, where a member volunteered. The condition of the new bus shelters windows was addressed, where it was confirmed that this task would be added to the list of 'things to do' by the volunteers at the next Saturday morning community event.

The members received both internal and external reports from the High Halstow Community Support Group, the Environmental Group, the GDPR & Policy Working Party, the Rural

Liaison Committee, High Halstow Primary Academy and Friends of St Margaret's.

It was established the Village Hall was planning to reopen on the 21st June, owing to a relaxation in the COVID-19 restrictions, where it was established that the hall could only cater for up to 30 people at one time initially. Similarly, it was confirmed that the Memorial Hall would not reopen until after 21st June, where the hall could only house up to 20 people at one time, allowing for social distancing measures.

Owing to a change in legislation, discontinuing the use of virtual meetings from Friday 7th May, the Annual Parish meeting followed by the Annual Parish Council meeting was brought forward to Thursday 6th May from 7.00pm.

The meeting was closed at 9.25 pm.

A resume from the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting will be published in the next edition of the High Halstow Times, owing to the decision not to hold a Parish Council meeting in the month of June.

Memorial Hall

We are pleased to announce that the Memorial Hall will REOPEN for use from Monday 21st June. Following the Government guidelines to reopening all users will have signed a contract with details of all safety measures in place, and procedures to be followed.

Our hall has stood empty for over a year so it will be lovely to see it open again for the benefit of our village. Please remember the most important HAND FACE SPACE and we will be able to continue to open up for all of our Clubs and groups.

Tribute to Martin Mitchell (September 1968 – 8 March 2021)

Dear High Halstow,

Sadly in late February, we lost a caring member of our village community, a loving father to Millie, Rosie & Pippa, Son-in-Law to Irene & Bob and my husband.

Those that knew Martin knew him as such a kind hearted, smiling, larger than life character. He had lived in High Halstow for nearly 20 years and had been an active member of village life including time as a Parish Councillor, member of the Hall Committee and supporter of many village events over the years. Many will also have known him as running the karate club in the village since 2015.

Martin had suffered ill health for many years and required medical attention due to an existing condition in late February, but

during his short stay in hospital he contracted COVID which was too much for his body to cope with. Although he was a fighter he lost this final battle on 8th March.

Regrettably, I too contracted COVID and whilst trying to cope at home, was admitted to hospital

myself later in March with breathing difficulties. I would like to personally thank members of the community who have supported my family during this impossibly difficult time with words of kindness, offers to get shopping, food hampers and even providing meals delivered to my door. It meant the world to me knowing they were all being so well taken care of whilst I was lying in a hospital bed unable to do so myself. Living in such a wonderful village is a blessing at such times of crisis and I thank you all from the bottom of my heart.

Martin will be missed by so many people and my family would like to thank all those who had sent their condolences.

"Off to University?"

The High Halstow Relief in Need charity (Reg. No. 250996) has a number of bursaries available to students going to University for the first time. The bursaries are normally available each year for a maximum of three years while studies continue. The bursary includes an arrangement for a student laptop from a local supplier.

A copy of your placement offer and course registration confirmation will be required before the bursary can be issued.

Second and third year students should apply in subsequent years when they receive confirmation of acceptance onto their second or third year course.

The scheme is available only to students living in the parish of High Halstow at the time of application.
