Legal Action Update

You will remember last month we had a response from Medway Council in answer to solicitors letter. We were not absolutely satisfied with the response although it did seem to indicate that signing the Grant Determination Agreement for the HIF would not mean that passing the Local Plan was a forgone conclusion.



We can now confirm the Grant determination agreement between Medway Council and Homes England was signed on the 28 July 2024.

Subsequently Medway Council has released some of documents they refused to release prior to the signing of the agreement.

One of those document contains a high Level Ecological Assessment of the route the new **Sharnal Street** railway line will take.

Although the report was only "high level" (i.e lacking in detail being based on a desk top study and a single "walk

over") the conclusion is particularly interesting and says;

"The route passes through, and close to, a series of designated sites of international importance for over wintering and breeding birds. Construction work and additional train movements could have an adverse effect on bird breeding or the foraging value of parts of these sites. Bird surveys, as well as noise and air quality surveys will all need to be undertaken before these potentially adverse impacts can be assessed. If adverse effects are found to occur, there are limits to how these can be adequately mitigated, which should be seen as a potential risk to the Scheme as a whole.

Consultation with the Local Planning Authority and Natural England should therefore commence at the earliest convenience to address the following constraints relating to designated sites -

- The western section of the scheme currently impacts directly on Ramsar and SSSI designated sites. Consultation with Natural England is required to determine the feasibility of this scheme and to explore alternative options.
- Due to the proximity of the Site to the Thames Estuary and Marshes SPA, it is also likely that the scheme will be subject to a Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA) to assess the potential impacts on this European Protected Site as well as for the Ramsar designation.
- Consultation will be required with Natural England for the entire scheme as it lays within the SSSI Impact Risk Zone for several SSSI's.

In the light of the information now released we are keen to see all of the reports especially those initially requested and not yet in the public domain. Armed with this information we wrote to Homes England via our solicitors asking for the conditions of the agreement between themselves and Medway Council. Unlike Medway Council, Homes England have so far been quite open in their response and have confirmed the following:-

The Grant Determination Agreement sets out the terms and conditions for Medway Council to receive grant funding for the proposed infrastructure, the scope of which is set out below:

Infrastructure Item 1 - Road A Relief Road linking the A289 west to the Hoo Peninsula. Capacity improvements at three junctions on the Hoo Peninsula that would service the new developments and link to the Relief Road. Improvements to the A289, including enhancements at three roundabouts to improve traffic capacity.

Infrastructure Item 2 - Rail A new railway Station (Sharnal Street Station); Improvements to the existing Grain railway line; A new Medway Chord and mainline connection; and Re- signalling of the existing line.

Infrastructure Item 3 - Environmental Improvements Strategic Environmental Management Scheme ("SEMS") Establishment of blue & green networks protecting landscape & ecology designations, providing active travel links, & maintaining settlement boundaries. 4 SEMS zones across the Hoo Peninsula will deliver: 10,000m of hedging (habitat, shelter & movement routes) 4,000 hedgerow trees 1,000 parkland trees: 10 ha of native woodland/ community orchard 150ha of wetlands 365ha of nationally important habitat protected from residential/ recreational pressures and disturbance Interpretation facilities

Infrastructure Item 4 - Project Delivery Resource An internal project delivery resource to project management the delivery of Road, Rail and Environmental Improvements detailed above.

As part of this Agreement, Medway Council must satisfy certain standard and scheme-specific conditions to ensure that the HIF funded infrastructure can be delivered before it is able to draw down any funding towards the infrastructure set out within the agreement. A number of these conditions relate to town planning, including the adoption of the local plan, as that is a key milestone amongst many in bringing forward the proposed infrastructure and the subsequent housing being unlocked by it.

a. A specific environmental assessment was not undertaken during the assessment of the scheme as matters of this nature are assessed in detail through the town planning system.



- b. As part of its submission to the Housing Infrastructure Fund, Medway Council was asked to demonstrate support from local stakeholders, and to provide information relating to on- going engagement with the community through the local plan process. The former included letters of support from MPs, Highways England, South East Local Enterprise Partnership, RSPB and Network Rail. This was assessed by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government.
- c. Homes England will use Section 19 of the Housing and Regeneration Act 2008 to grant financial assistance.

As we go to press we have again written to Homes England to ask to see further documentation.

and

Albert Alfred Izaby Service number 2088793 Kings Own Royal Regiment (Lancaster) 6th Battalion. Died 16th April 1941. Age 34 years.

Son of mark and Emma Izaby of Gravesend.

Inscription:- If all the world we're ours we'd give it, yes, and more to see the face we loved come smiling through the door.

We will forever remember that they gave their lives for the world to live in peace. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.

sure like me your heart goes out to those who have had to endure this difficult crisis with small children in a high-rise block of flats, without the benefits and blessings we have enjoyed. But I also know that the response of so many of the members of our community to this situation has been admirable. People have volunteered to help others booth in and outside our village, with the Road Reps, though wHoo Cares and many other groups. You have donated dozens of boxes of food to the Foodbank, and hygiene banks and other organisations that have reached out to people who are struggling. 
We'll meet outside the Village Hall and look forward to seeing you there.
