SOS Help save our lovely Lychgate

The Lychgate was erected as a Monument to the men of High Halstow Parish who lost their lives in the service of this country during the First World War. Generations of brides and grooms have had their photographs taken in the gate on their wedding day. Sadly, after 100 years, it needs some urgent attention. Meeting Resume – 09/09/2020

A virtual Parish Council meeting was held on Wednesday 9th September, where it was attended by five parish councillors and three members of the public. During this meeting the members acknowledged receipt of two new planning applications and three new decisions.

It was understood, from a report prepared by the Chairman, that the RSPB were against the Medway Council HIF Bid (where the Councillors had been previously led to believe the RSPB were on board).

The results of the ROSPA report (an annual independent play inspection report) were discussed. It was acknowledged that Cllr R. Collins had already carried out the majority of the minor repairs listed, however a further concern was raised by the inspector in regards to the condition of the swinging basket joint. The members unanimously agreed to replace this part, where Cllr R Collins and Cllr G. Crozer agreed to fit it.

The use of off-road vehicles at Forge Common was discussed, where the members agreed that signs should be placed at either entrances and or exits to prohibit this issue from reoccurring.

It was noted that the Clerk had applied to three separate contractors to invite them to bid for tender on the newly updated village grounds maintenance contract. She informed the members that she had placed a closing date for applications for the beginning of October.

The members learnt that the repairs to the Cricket Club fencing had been undertaken. They also agreed that they would erect a new metal fence behind the football net, to prevent further damage by rogue footballs.

The RS41 footpath was discussed, where the Chairman Cllr G. Crozer informed the members that Medway Council had now cleared the site and installed a new stile. He advised that owing to the works the terrain of this footpath was now very rough, accordingly he advised that he had been back in touch with the district council to ask if they were able to provide any warning signs.

The siting of two newly proposed dog waste bins were discussed, where it was established that these bins would be organised and placed into use by Medway Council within the next couple of weeks.


The members received thee internal committee reports, which came from the High Halstow Road

Reps team, the Environmental Group and the GDPR Working Party. It was acknowledged that owing to the COVID-19 pandemic that there had been no external committee meetings.

It was acknowledged that there had been an error on the front page of the last High Halstow Times (which sadly had only been picked after the publication had been printed). Accordingly, the members made further arrangements for additional proof reading before the next edition was printed. The Clerk also made arrangements to provide the outstanding electronic minutes to keep the members webpage up to date.

Finally, the members discussed the issue of cars parked on the junction of Christmas Lane and The Street, they agreed to invite Medway Council and Ward Councillor, Phil Filmer, to visit the area, to see the issues first hand and to establish the best course of action.

The next meeting was scheduled to take place on Wednesday 14th October, via Zoom, starting at 7.30pm (where of course everyone is very welcome to attend!). The meeting finished after an hour and a half.



Village Hall

We have been asked about the reopening of the Village Hall and can update as follows:

We are very much aware that the Doctors Surgery although a limited service is a valued service and an important service at this time so any attempt to reopen must take the issues and concerns from the surgery into account

As a result we will initially be trying to find solutions with the regular hirers of the hall and as such have asked them to complete a form to help us work through the various issues. We are anticipating a number will not return currently due to the restrictions that would be required to be in place

Not all the forms have come back yet so have not a complete picture and will extend the deadline for the form to be completed until 10th October

We are also trying to work through the guidance from ACRE but as I am sure you are aware with the ever increasing changes in rules and regulations, trying to keep up with this is proving time consuming and concerning that we stay compliant

The Hall Committee though cannot see how it will be able to take one off bookings for the foreseeable future meaning there will still not be any parties including children's parties whilst this pandemic is still going on

We appreciate that this may not be the answer you wish to hear but would hope you would understand the situation we find ourselves in

As soon as we hear anything else we will let you know

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HIF Bid Challenge Update

As part of the HIF bid submission Homes England says that they required, and were given by Medway Council, "**letters of support**" from various bodies including our Local MP Kelly Tolhurst and the RSPB.

Having spoken to Kelly Tolhurst MP and RSPB, they have both confirmed that Medway Council did ask them to provide letters of support for the HIF bid. However, their replies were not "letters in support"; instead they raised significant reservations as to the sustainability of the bid. RSPB stated "We were asked by Medway to formally support the HIF bid, which we declined to do."

Our solicitors have asked Homes England to provide copies of the claimed letters of support and to explain why the HIF bid was accepted in the light for the negative High Level Feasibility report which revealed that the infrastructure would be likely to adversely affect international protected species and habitat .

To date we have had no response but will continue to press them to give us straight answers to our questions. We will let you know if we get a reply; straight or otherwise.


